McLean Woman Severely Injured In Car Accident

Ronda Kay Hensley, 48, of McLean lost control of her Ford pickup truck when she was traveling east on U.S. Highway 60, a mile east of Pampa. Adverse weather conditions were blamed for the accident.

On Wednesday, December 4, at about 1 p.m. Ms. Hensley's 1996 Ford F-150 went into skid. It slid into a bar ditch, on the south side of the road and slammed into a tree.

conditions Snowy hampered the rescue effort. Ambulance personnel Pampa firefighters and Unit employees Jordan worked against the elements for more than hour extricating Ms. Hensley from the wreckage. The impact was focused on the driver's side of the vehicle. The dashboard was pressed onto the chest of the victim

The rescue effort was a complicated and often-frustrating affair. Rescue personnel encountered various problems in addition to the adverse weather conditions. Even removing the top of the pickup truck failed to free Ms. Hensley.

She finally had to be pulled out over the back seat. The rescue officials were aided by bystanders who blocked the victim from the freezing wind using blankets and coats. It was fortunate the Ms. Hensley was dressed in thermal coveralls and a coat which likely saved her from hypothermia.

Ms. Hensley was taken to Pampa Regional Medical Center suffering from multiple injuries. Her condition was described as critical. She is an employee of the Jordan Prison Unit.

McLean Shelter Not Helter Skelter

McLean's Red Cross Emergency Shelter provided essential and welcomed assistance to more than 25 stranded, weary and distressed travelers caught in the midst of Tuesday's "Ice-Capades 2002."

At approximately 7:15 pm, prompted by extremely hazardous road conditions, the Gray County sheriff's Department notified Mindy Reeves. McLean's Red Cross Emergency Services Coordinator, to open the McLean Shelter Facility. By 7:30 pm the shelter was open, whereupon distressed motorists began arriving almost immediately and continuing throughout the night ferried by some very busy State Troopers.

Air mattresses and blankets were provided to all who wanted to sleep, or at least he down. Families were provided private sleeping rooms, the open dormitory was provided a degree of privacy by making cubicles; using folding tables laid on their sides. Although certainly not the Ritz, it looked mighty good to some weary and bleary-eyed people. Some of the guests were able to catch some very refreshing winks and were appreciative of the provisions that were provided

provided.

The well-supplied pantry and kitchen provided much more than just food for thought. However, there was much food for thought expressed by many grateful folk in many sincerely appreciative ways. I'm sure that some will forever remember that friendly little town in Texas that helped.

Council Has Busy Agenda

The City Council of McLcan met in regular session Monday, December 9th, 2002 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with an invocation by Lavon Watson at 6:05 p.m with the following members present: Bob

Martin, LaVon Watson, Jim McDonald, Doyle Lee and Joe Lamb

Others present, Toni Bohlar, Jim Adams, Chet Bohlar, Allen Mixon, Mindy Reeves, Dan Eggers and Boots

The minutes of the November meetings were approved with one change to the special minutes concerning

the time that the council entered into executive session.

All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated.

Sewer Plant -No progress, clay pit too wet, waiting for it to dry out so that work can begin.

City Water - Test results for nitrates came back at 3.9, well below the accepted level.

The council voted on a community service training policy that states employees will only be paid for time off for training seminars, i.e. fire dept., only if the agency head certifies that the training is necessary to keep the employee employed in his/her current duties.

The council voted to accept the Bank of Commerce bid as the City's depository for the next two year period, beginning January 1, 2003 until December 31, 2004.

Joe Lamb entered the meeting at this time.

The council voted to approve Ordinance #2R7 setting the sewer rates as follows; All residences abusinesses that use under 20,000 gallons of water a month will be \$8.00

All residences & businesses that use over

20,000 gallons a month will be \$10.00.

Outside the City limits:, customers utilizing the sewer system will be as follows:

Residences & businesses under 20,000 gallons a month will be \$10.00

Residences & businesses over 20,000 gallons a month will be \$12.00

These rates effective beginning January 1, 2003.

The council voted to approve Ordinance #288 setting the water rates as follows-

Customers inside the City limits of McLean will be charged as follows:

Minimum charge 0 - 3000 gallons will be \$9 50 and \$1 00 per thousand thereafter 3001

4000 \$10.50 4001-5000 \$11.50 etc.

Customers outside the City limits of McLcan will be charged Two Dollars (\$2.00) per meter more than the rates for users in the City limits.

These rates effective beginning January 1, 2003.

The council voted to give full time employees a \$100.00 Christmas bonus and full time part-time



New Tests On The Horizon For 2002-2003 School Students

Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) became effective on September 1, 1998. As a result, the state aligned the Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) to reflect changes in the curriculum. The alignment of the TAAS to the TEKS was reflected in the tests administered in the spring of 2000. The TAAS was administered for the last time during the 2001-2002 school years. Beginning in the 2002-2003 school year, students take the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS), a morecomprehensive, challenging examination than the TAAS.

The objectives and student expectations addressed on the TAKS are taken directly from the TEKS. The TAKS program, like the TEKS curriculum, is vertically aligned, meaning

the tests become more ngorous as students advance from grade to grade.

The TEKS outline the "scope and sequence" of what students are supposed to learn at each grade level. The TEKS indicate what students should learn and when they should learn it. The TEKS replaced the Essential Elements (EE's), the prior curriculum/scope and sequence used in Texas.

The original Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tested specific skills found in the EE's. Later, the TAAS was revised to address specific skills found in the TEKS.

TEA rewarded and penalized schools and districts based on their TAAS performance and the same will be true of TAKS. Exemplary ratings on TAAS earned additional funding from TEA. In 2002, TEA awarded about \$500,000 to various districts for gains in performance.

The TAKS is a more-comprehensive, more-challenging examination than the TAAS. The objectives and student expectations addressed on the TAKS are taken directly from the TEKS. The TAKS also includes different question types than those found in the TAAS and attempts to ask questions in

Children in Grade 3 during 2002-03 must pass TAKS reading assessment to be promoted to Grade 4. These same students must satisfy additional requirements in Grade 5 in 2004-05 and in Grade 8 in 2007-08.

Grade 11 tests required for graduation include: (1) Mathematics, including at least Algebra and geometry with the aid of technology; (2) English language arts including at least English III and writing, (3) Social studies including early American and US history, (4) Science including at least biology and integrated chemistry and physics.

A new exit-level exam will be administered and will be required at Grade 11 beginning in the 2003-04 school year.

These changes reflect the educational attitude stressed by President Bush in saying, "We will leave no child behind."

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Food Establishments Must Have A Certified Manager

Statistics indicate that food borne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a food borne

During the legislative session, a statute was amended that allowed the Texas Department of Health (TDH) to require each food establishment to have one certified food manager.

Recently, the Texas Board of Health adopted rules to implement this Eating statute. establishments have already received a letter from the Texas Department of Health regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of Health must have one certified food manager. A deadline for certification set by the Texas Department of Health is March 1, 2003. food manager certificates will be valid for 5 years.
