

Groom Grocery Store Burglarized, Losses Total Over \$1,000 In Receipts

The Groom Grocery fell victim to a burglary in the early hours of Tuesday morning. It is estimated that over \$1,000.00 in cash and checks were taken as well as some cigarettes, a

safe and a two wheeled cart.

The thieves ripped a hole in the wall in back of the building going through several layers of steel siding,

ply-wood sheeting, sheetrock and paneling to gain entrance.

They pilfered through the freezers and produce refrigerator. They also pried the safe off the wall and used the 2-wheeled cart belonging to the store to haul it off.

Deputies found tracks leading away from the store and across the alley.

"It's very upsetting," said store owner Sharlene Lewis. "We give items away free when someone is in need. It hurts to think of someone doing this."

Lewis is hoping that insurance will cover repairs to the building, but she doesn't think it will cover her lost receipts.

Sheriff Loren Brand is leading the investigation.

Groom Tigers Still Undefeated In District Play

The Groom Tigers remained undefeated in district competition after they blasted past Ft. Elliott, 68-31.

Groom's Junior Varsity played most of the game against Ft. Elliott's J.V. (Ft. Elliott does not have a varsity this year but will next year).

The Tigers had 20 first downs compared to Ft. Elliott's 7. Groom rushed for 389 yards on 33 carries. Ft. Elliott carried the ball 28 times for 80 yards. Groom completed 7 of 10 passes for 130 yards. Ft. Elliott completed 7 of 17 for 139 yards.

"I was very pleased with everyone through this game," stated Coach Larry Reid. Our younger kids got to play most of the game which will be a great advantage for them when they face this same team next year. Several of these younger players showed that they can really make a contribution."

Justin Ritter ran for 4 carries and 107 yards, scoring two touchdowns in the process, on a 36 yard and 48 yard run. He also had a 45 yard punt return for a touchdown.

Toby Burgin rushed for two touchdowns and 62 yards. The scoring came on a 46 yard and 9 yard run. Toby had 3 unassisted tackles.

Dean Fields rushed for 63 yards on 11 carries scoring a touchdown from the 4 yard line. He had two unassisted tackles.

Jamie Shuck had a very good night pulling in 91 yards rushing. He scored a touchdown on a 9 yard carry. He had a 13 yard kick off return and 10 unassisted tackles and scored an extra point on a pass from Wyatt Weinheimer.

Evan Crowell scored on a 7 yard run and added 50 yards rushing on 6 carries. He had 13 solo tackles to his credit.

Justin Homen scored on one of his two carries. He had a total of 16 yards rushing.

Brad Sustaire threw 2 for 5 for a touchdown and 62 yards. He had two unassisted tackles.

Scott Weinheimer received for 36 yards and had one solo tackle.

Sean Crowell received a 26 yard pass from Brad Sustaire for a touchdown. Crowell added 2 sacks to his stats for the evening. Defensively he had 2 sacks and 5 solo tackles.

Josh Evenson had 5 passes for 68 yards. He tallied 4 solo tackles and two punt returns for 5 and







Lovett Memorial Library Awarded Grant Of \$4293.

Library in McLean has been awarded a Tocker grant to be used for the purchase of reference materials. The Tocker Foundation, a Dallas-based family foundation, promotes public libraries in communities of 12,000 or less. The updated referenced books and materials which can be purchased with grant funds

will be beneficial for all the areas library patrons. The library will also be able to add areas of reference that have not been available. The total amount awarded to the library is \$4293. The ever increasing cost of reference books and expanding amount of

made it difficult for small libraries to stay current. The funds from this grant will supplement the funds budgeted for the library by the City of McLean and Gray County.

This year the Tocker Foundation reviewed more than 120 grant applications for funds to be provided to libraries for projects that will benefit the community. Ann Williams, Librarian of Lovett Memorial in McLean was successful in receiving funds from the Tocker Foundation for McLean's library.

Mrs. Williams will begin selection and purchase of reference books within two weeks. New material will begin to be available by

mid-December. The grant will also fund furniture for the Internet access computer.



Local Districts To Develop New Farm Programs

Farm Bill, the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) #125 with headquarters in Pampa, along with 3,000 other

lead the way in developing federal conservation programs and initiatives to improve soil and water resources at the local level," said Troy Ritter, Chairman of the Gray Co. SWCD.

"After years of applying SWCDs in the nation, has top-down program been given the charge to management approaches in

programs, the new 1996 Farm Bill establishes a driven process, locally coordinated by conservation districts, to guide the state and nation's agricultural conservation efforts. It provides tremendous opportunities for local people to become involved in assessing local soil, water and other natural resource needs, setting priorities, developing conservation policy, providing technical support, accepting program applications and approving conservation plans upon which cost-sharing will be based," Ritter added.


According to Ritter, the process deals with developing a list of priority

areas and concerns for the long range Farm Bill program for Fiscal Year 1998 and beyond.
