





Carson County Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brand, Sheriff There are currently ten persons incarcerated in the Carson County Jail.

Sgt. Ray Davis is investigating the theft of batteries from a vehicle near Panhandle. Deputies Jeff Oldham and Larry Mendez responded to a domestic violence call in the Webb Bragg Addition and to a

shots fired call in Skellytown.

Oldham was Deputy called to Groom to investigate a suspicious person who had been seen in another person's car. The subject was located at a Groom motel and arrested for Burglary of a Motor Vehicle. Deputy Lovell

Kennard Deputies Oldham and Mendez assisted Gray County authorities and the Texas Highway Patrol with a pursuit of a stolen vehicle. The pursuit began near Shamrock and ended approximately three miles east of Groom when the suspect lost control and rolled his vehicle. Deputies deployed their tire deflation devices to keep the suspect from entering the county, but the suspect brought the stolen vehicle to stop without our assistance. The Groom Ambulance Service transported the lone occupant of the vehicle to Amarillo for treatment of minor injuries. He is currently being held in the Gray County Jail.

Our officers responded to a domestic violence call in

Mendez and Oldham had Fritch, several reports of cattle on the highways and calls of possible drunk drivers on U.S. 60 and Interstate 40. Our department received a call of a possible body in the median on Interstate 40 which turned out to be a transient who was sleeping.

A White Deer man

reported two of his vehicles as stolen, but further investigation showed that they had been towed away a violation of city for Area officers ordinance. were called to search for a possible DWI suspect near White Deer on U.S. 60. The suspect was located in Gray County near Kingsmill and found to be in possession of numerous prescription medications. The case involved a large sum of cash which was not disclosed to creditors during bankruptcy proceeding.

greatly appreciated.




