ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment government reimburses the federal expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for The proposes.

The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

## City Council Sets Taxes

The McLean City Council net in its regular monthly session on September 13 at City Hall. Members present vere Mayor George Green and Aldermen Dale Glass, Wayne Bybee, Martha Jo Eailey, and W.C. Simpson. In one of the major items of business, the council approved the second and final reading of Ordinance No. 333, setting the ad valorem $\$ 100$ valuation. 28.63 cents per $\$ 100$ valuation. Last year's rate was 29.6 cents.
A public hearing on the proposed 1988-89 budget vas held. No members of tie public appeared to offer comments. After a brief roview of the figures, the council approved a $\$ 557,670$ budget for the coming year. Of this amount, $\mathbf{5 4 1 8 , 2 0 0}$ vill go into the water, sewer and gas fund to maintain and operate those systems. A. portion of this money also $g$ ges toward salaries of city employees.
The main source of revenue in this portion of the badget comes from collections for the use of the city's s swer, gas and water facilities.

The remainder of the budget, $\mathbf{\$ 1 3 9 , 4 7 0 ,}$ will go into the General Fund which is used to fund various city departments such as the park, cemetery, refuse department, fire department, Lovett Library and the Ambulance Service. Revenues ouncil, page 8
