The last games of district basketball for Groom teams were held Tuesday evening of last week when Amarillo Christian made their way to Tiger country.

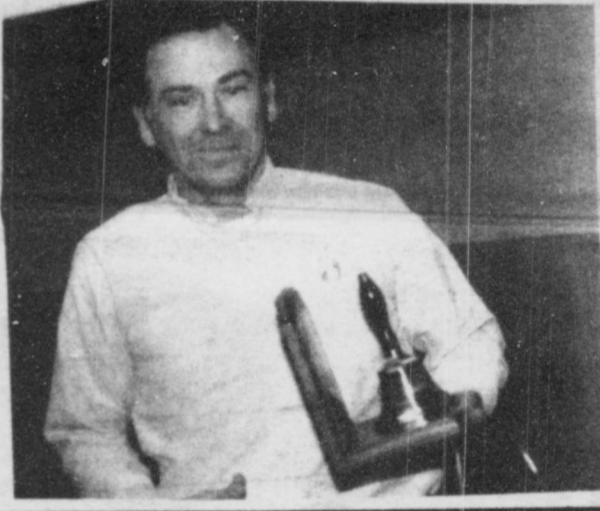
In the boys game Mike Conrad lead the team in points with 23 points marked up on the scoreboard. Second in leading points was Jeff Fields with 14 points.

Dickerson Sentenced To Life

Thursday, January 18, Judge Forbis announced the sentence of life in prison for Jackie Dickerson, 52, of Howardwick for the stabbing of Lonnie Greene.

Lonnie Greene, 32, of Groom was awakened on the morning of August 14, to find himself being stabbed four times, once in the shoulder, on the head, in the temple of the head and a defense wound to his hand. The stabbing occurred between 1:00 and 1:30 a.m. at 108 Choctaw Ave. in the residence of Joyce Greco. Greene was asleep in the house when the suspect Jackie Allen Dickerson, entered the house. Greene was able to escape

with the knife in his head. He ran out the back door and down the street about two blocks to 207 Martin, residence of Sheila Cline.

Authorities arrived at 207 Martin at 2:17 a.m. Greene and Greco identified Jackie Allen Dickerson as the assailant. Greene was transported by Groom's Ambulance to Northwest Texas Receiving Center.

Jackie Allen Dickerson was arrested one hour later in Howardwick, after a warrant from Judge Max Wade was issued. Arresting officers were State Trooper Gary Davis and the Donley County Sheriff's Department.

Mr. Hill was born in Lipscomb County. He was a cowboy and a stockman in the Roberts, Hemphill and Lipscomb area. He later was a carpenter with his brother, William Robinson Hill Jr., for Hill and Hill in Amarillo. He was a member of Carpenters' Union Local No. 665. He was the owner of the Palisades Hunting and Recreational Lodges at Durango, Colo., and Pagosa Springs, Colo.

DPS Weekly Report

First Half of January 1990

This truck was driven by Rois Eben Hooper of Stigler, Okla. Gary Weber was issued a citation for Fail to Control Speed. Both trucks remained upright after impact.

01-20-90-Trooper Greg Eatmon stopped a TTST for speeding on I-40. The driver, John E. Wirtel was found to have an outstanding warrant for Felony Theft. The warrant was out of the St. Louis, Missouri area. Wirtel was arrested and taken to Panhandle and released to the custody of the Sheriff's Office. School Administrators Launch Campaign For New Revenue Sources To Fund Public Education

The Texas Association of School Administrators, a statewide organization with more than 1,850 members representing more than 90 percent of the state's school districts, announced today the launching of a statewide campaign to convince Texans that additional revenue sources are needed to meet the goal of equitable and adequate public education in Texas.

"The Texas Supreme Court had ruled that our school funding system is unconstitutional, and it is clear that we will need more revenue to ensure our children an equitable and adequate education," said Wayne Blevins, the association's president. "We do not pretend to have the absolute answer to the problem, but we are mounting a strong effort to rally support for predictable and dependable revenue sources to meet the needs of Texas schoolchildren."

Blevins said, however, that a lottery should not be considered as a solution to the funding shortage. "The lottery is neither as predictable nor as dependable as revenue from fees or taxes," Blevins said. "We cannot support any proposal that puts the future of our children's education on a shaky foundation."

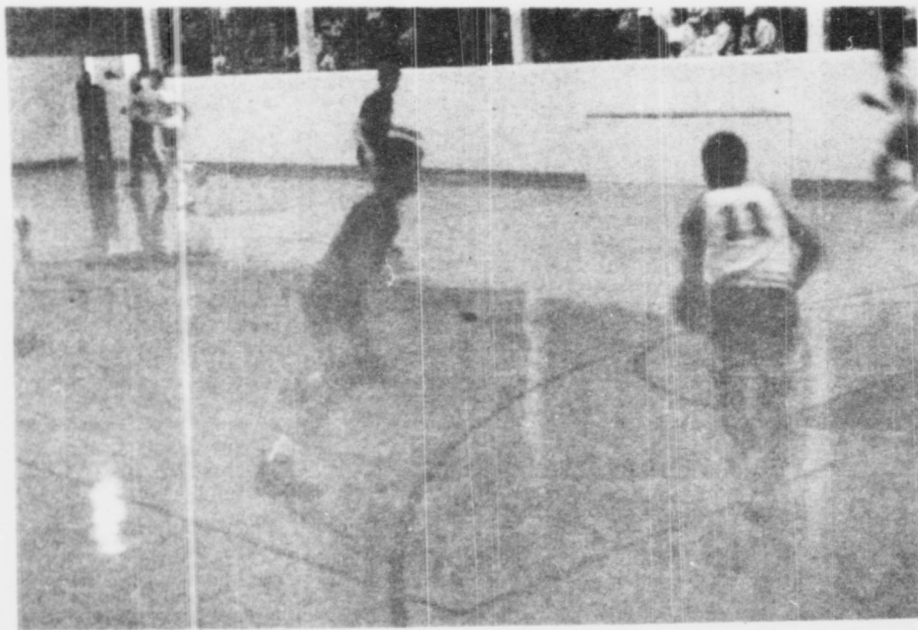

Groom Tigers started out slow marking up only 7 points in the first quarter, while Claude gained their lead with 19. In the second time frame Groom gained with 25 points close behind

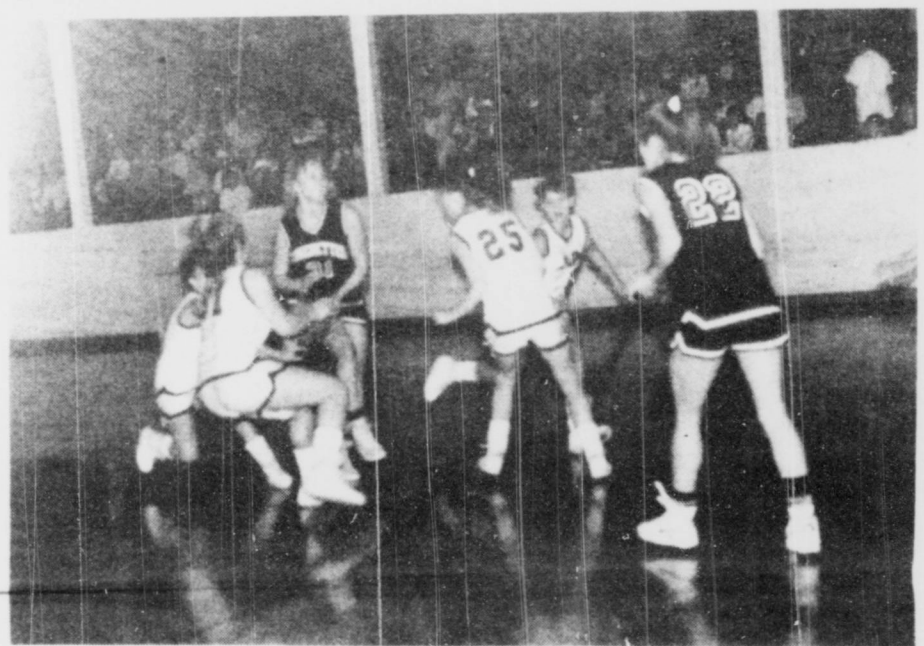
Claude with 36. Energy ran low in the last half as Claude seemed to leave the Tigers behind. The final score was Groom 51 and Claude 77.

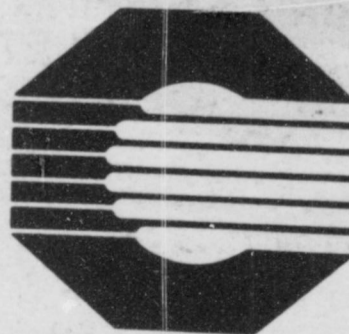

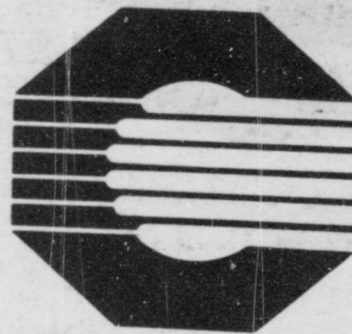

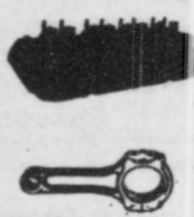
