The McLean Tigers limited the Fort Elliott Cougars to one second-half touchdown and went on to improve their six man District 1-A record to 2-0 and dropping Fort Elliott to 0-2

McLean led 38-22 at the half before out scoring Fort Elliott 14-6 in the second half. The Tigers, 3-4 for the season, were led by running back Brad

Visitor comments from Shandee Tolleson inquiring if the amount of the budget supposed to be published. amendments answer is no, they not have to be ished, but the published, but the amendments are to be recorded in the minutes, which is public record.
