Rain Ends Drought, At Least Temporarily

Groom's long dry spell has at least temporarily ended after last week's rain and storms. The area received anywhere from $1 / 2$ to 3 inches of rain after a weekend of off and on showers.

Groom residents had a serve racking Friday night with tornado's bouncing around the area. Storm watchers blew the sirens to alert residents for possible danger.
Fire Chief Tony Treadwell reported that there was some confusion
about the early alert system. "When a tornado potted or reported by padar, the reported by will blow several, epartment of the severa, long blasts them sirens. If we leave them on continuously it burns the motors out. Sometimes we might need to blow them more than once in the same evening, stated Treadwell.
