



The activities were concluded by the children's track meet.





Last Wednesday proved to be a busy and, to say the least, interesting day for local law enforcement officers. A little after 8:00 a.m. Larry Swanson, a McLean resident, was driving into town from his home west of town when he spotted a white object on the side of I-40 near Exit 141. He approached the object and determined that it was a man clad only in a sheet. It turned out that the man, Peter Blaine Tittle, was a truck driver from Newport, Ky. The officers questioned him and got a consent to search the truck which was about 200 yards from the spot where he was first found. The search turned up some drug paraphanelia, several small plastic bags of a whitish, amber powder, believed to be meta-amphetamines, and a small bag of a green leafy substance believed to be marijuana, and two syringes.

Tittle was taken to the Sheriff's Office in Pampa and arraigned on possession of a controlled substance less than 28 grams. Bond was set at \$2,000.

According to Deputy Carter, the man said he purchased drugs in Amarillo and had taken them the night before. He said he had gotten out of his truck to go to' the restroom when the officers found him. As of Tuesday, he was still

in jail in Pampa pending disposition of his case.





Social Security Payments Due On Domestic Help

People in the panhandle area who employ household workers should know that they have the responsibility. to deduct Social Security taxes and to report the wages paid.

Any person who pays a household worker-whether a maid, cook, gardner or even a babysitter-at least \$50 in cash during a calendar quarter must deduct Social Security taxes. Failure to do so may mean having to pay a penalty in addition to any overdue taxes.

A calendar quarter is a 3-month period ending on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31. Payment of wager that average as little as \$4 a week would amount to more than \$50 for a calendar quarter an would have to be reported.







Attorney General Cautions Contributors To Know Their Charities

Year after year, the good citizens of Texas exhibit compassion and generosity by contributing millions of dollars to charities in the state. Consequently we have nearly 32,000 tax-exempt charitable organizations which control about \$16 billion in assets.

Texas is fortunate to have such ample resources devot-ed to helping those in need. Are those funds really being used for charitable purposes?

You may be surprised to learn that we do not know!

The State has no information and no method of routinely monitoring the income and expenditures of charities. The generosity and good will of the citizens of Texas are completely unprotected.

That is why I am supporting and promoting a bill filed in the Texas Legislature that would require charities and charitable foundations to file annual statements with the Texas Attorney General's Office.

The proposed legislation would require each charity to file a copy of its annual federal tax statement, plus basic information such as the names of trustees and the date of incorporation. Chaities which solicit funds from non-members would be required to segregate chari-table funds from membership fudns. The bill would prohibit

witel e pur oses for any othe poses for any other purpose. Any violations would subject a charity to loss of all tax-exempt status, plus possible civil penalties if a lawsuit is brought by the Attorney General. The bill would allow the

Attorney General's office to rountinely review and audit the charities in order to better assure Texans that their generous contributions are being used for the purpose for which they intend-

Religious organizations, private colleges and those charities with gross receipts of less than \$25,000 per year vould be exempt from the





Sheriff Believes Drug **Sniffing Pooch Could Be Beneficial**

Open letter to Citizens of **Carson County:**

On July 19, thru July 22, 1987, I attended the annual convention of the National Sheriff's Association in Fort Worth. One item on the agenda concerned illegal drugs

The United States Customs Service presented this part of the program. I per-sonally discussed this problem with the Customs Agents and upon learning that three major highways, I-40, 60 and 287, run through Carson County they made an offer to send a team to the Sheriff's Department to conduct a training seminar for local officers. This seminar will pertain to profiles of drug running vehicles and the type of people who drive them. They will also discuss the legal limitations that must be observed by the officers. One suggestion they made was to purchase a drug sniff-ing dog. If a vehicle is stopped and the trained dog indicates the presence of drugs then probable cause is established. 
