The volleyball tournament also began at 2:00 with the







SUBSTITUTE TEACHER LISTS UPDATED

Persons who are currently on the substitute teacher roster should check with Business Manager Joyce Hutsell to verify that their 1990;91 file contains the following: teacher certification, where applicable; a complete teacher-application; a notarized Oath of Office required for State of Texas teachers; and a copy of the high school diploma or latest college transcript showing completed hours of college credit.

School district policy requires that substitute positions are to be filled by the persons most qualified to do so. The updated files will assist district officials with

Wayne Carter Elected Deputy several months as a "break-in period" for everyone in

New Chief Deputy Wayne Carter has spent the last week at the position acquainting himself more with each of the Gray County Sheriff's Office personnel and surveying the situation.

Although Carter, 37, has been with the Gray County Sheriff's Office as a deputy since Jan. 1,1986, he has basically been only in the McLean area during the time and has not been as familiar with the day-to-day operations of the sheriff's office in Pampa.

Pre-kindergarten Sought

The McLean Independent School District is attempting to locate any pre-kinder-garten students who may qualify for a class preceding the Kindergarten year according to a release from the business office of the school.

According to Supt. Rex Peeples any child may be eligible if (1) the child will be four years of age by September 1, 1990 and (2) is non-English speaking or qualifies for free or reduced price meals according to the income eligibility charts published in this issue of the Groom News.

Any parents or guardians of children who may qualify under the two guidelines above should contact the school business offfice at 4th and Rowe Street, McLean, Texas 79057 or by telephone 806-779-2301 or 779-2671.

Sheriff Jim Free, who appointed Carter to the position effective July 16, said Carter was his choice based on his qualifications and experience. With the promotion, Carter's base salary increased from \$1,857.90 to \$2,008.40 monthly.

"He's an asset to the position," Free said.

Carter said, "Whenever we're needed, one of us will be available at all times. We want to be available for the public to come in if they want to talk to one of us."

The sheriff and Carter, who stands 6 feet 5 inches tall, met with the other deputies on July 23 to explain about Carter's new position. Since then, Carter has met individually with each of the deputies and has been riding with them on their patrols.

"We want the people to know we are there and we are efficient." Carter said. referring to a grand jury report on the sheriff's office last month that indicated the office was not efficient.

Carter, raised in Clarendon, first began his law enforcement career with the sheriff's office about 4-1/2 years ago. However, he was no newcomer to the field.

His father was a game warden for 16 years.

Prior to becoming a sheriff's deputy, Carter was a rancher.

The new chief deputy graduated from Clarendon High School and attended Clarendon College. He has lived in McLean for about 12 years. He has no immediate plans to move from his residence.

Until a different deputy is placed in McLean, Carter will help serve in the same capacity as well as chief

deputy.
"I grew up in law enforcement," Carter said, "Ifeel like I can serve the people better from here (Pampa sheriff's office)."

Free said that he will send each of the deputies to McLean for a week at a time to become acquainted with the people and the area. He said after all the deputies have had a stay in McLean, a person will be appointed to move to McLean and work that area of the county.

"We will still have 24hour coverage of McLean," Free Said. "We're not leaving them (McLean people). I would hope they would feel complimented a McLean boy was picked."

Most of the Old 66 stories so far tell of things that happen during good weather, but the Panhandle of Texas, through which all 178 miles of Old 66 crosses, is well known for its bad weather also. Ice storms, tornadoes, dust storms, and blizzards certainly made for and some dramatic humorous stories as well.

Monta Gene Smitherman remembers one trip to Amarillo with her parents, the Paul Kennedys. On the way home, a blizzard struck and finally stalled the car. Paul walked to the Rock Island RR track, flagged down the train, put Francis and Monta Gene on it, and they arrived safely in McLean later. Paul didn't get home for 1-1/2 days.

The Browns of Jericho, blizzard-stalled rescued travelers in a 4-wheel drive truck and carried them to their heated daru barn on their farm a few years ago. I don't recall how many people were rescued, but these efforts by people who lived along Old 66, certainly help make the heart and soul of Old 66 seem real to travelers. I remember coming home from the ranch in New

Mexico, in a Ford farm truck and finally having to stop in Conway at the little corner station which is still standing. I was cold ands tired and the police said the road to Groom was drifted over. I entered the store to find about 20 other storm victims. The women and children had gone to the station owner's house and the men remained in the station. We took turns sleeping on the floor, ate everything edible, chewed all the tobacco, smoked all the cigarettes, cleaned out the house and all the neighbors in about 20 hours. I'll bet the onwers were glad to see that storm let up.

I can't remember many people losing their lives, in our area of Old 66, but sitting out a blizzard is an unforgettable experience.
