Commissioners On WD Options Discussed For Library Construction

Carson County Commissioners' Court met on July 13, 1998 with all members present and the following guests: Leslie Rohan, John Cruz, Jeri Osborne, Jim Osborne, Addis Charless, Don Moniak, Terri Koetting, and Trish Neusch.

Minutes were read and approved and all claims were approved.

Commissioner Smith reported that he had recently purchased another "Bush Hog" mower for Precinct #2, and that he intends to sell two old mowers by auction.

Commissioner Britten asked that the county try to obtain 200 cubic yards of re-cycled asphalt for road maintenance in Precinct #1. Judge Roselius will submit the request to Tx.D.O.T.

The court discussed the number of "County Wide" fire calls during June and July. Most of the calls reported were caused by machinery and lightning. Panhandle Fire Department reported a few minor fires related to fireworks the Fourth of Groom, White Deer, and Skellytown reported none. Sheriff Brand reported it was a relatively quiet Fourth of July for the Sheriff's Department. Law officers were on duty and no arrests were made.

The court visited with Leslie Rohan, Architect John Cruz, and Contractor, concerning the construction of the White Deer Library. contractor informed the court that he felt if the county would eliminate six of the parking spaces, concrete borders on the west and north side of the proposed building, less expensive toilet fixtures, and lighting

could be constructed for approximately \$90,000.00. This would be if the county would do the dirt work. Mr. Rohan and Mr. Cruz were asked to list the proposed changes and return to court Friday, July 17th at 10:00 a.m. The court will then take action on the construction.

"We were happy with the proposal and we are confident a decision will be made Friday for the construction," stated Judge Roselius.

A presentation concerning the problems associated with the processing of plutonium was presented by S.T.A.N.D., "Serious Texans Against Nuclear Dumping." Mr. Don Moniak and Trish Neusch gave a slide presentation concerning the process and the various hazards that could be involved.



Among honors were Principal's Leadership Award, Texas Six-Man Coaches Association All-State Academic Team, and Who's Who.



Seymour aquifer. The average rise or decline, by counties, is shown on the following chart.

These figures have been forwarded to the Texas Water Development Board and entered into local records as a part of the water level history of the District. They will also be used to construct the annual decline map, for I.R.S. approval.



A LETTER FROM JUDGE ROSELIUS.....

According to the Texas Forest Service, of the 254 counties in the entire state of Texas, only 21 banned the sale of fireworks this year. Even with a fireworks ban, only aerial fireworks are banned. Other types of fireworks may be purchased and discharged even in counties with the firework ban. Therefore, a firework ban is not a total ban on fireworks.

Contrary to recent information, we did not receive a written formal request from the Panhandle Fire Chief to ban the sale of fireworks this year. Additionally, I did not send a written denial because we never received such a letter.

Profits generated from firework sales had absolutely nothing to do with the Commissioners' Court's decision not to ban fireworks. It is utterly ridiculous for anyone to think we would compromise the best interest of our citizens for another's profit. Protecting the citizens

We trust the citizens to use common sense when they decide whether to use fireworks. Some people will use fireworks even with a ban in place. Some people will use fireworks in an unsafe manner even in a rainy year. We have laws to deal with these people. As a matter of fact, these laws are just as tough, if not tougher, than firework ban laws.

In keeping with our conservative approach to county government, we believe you have the right to make your own decisions regarding fireworks. You have proven our decision was the right one. Panhandle reported only a few, very minor grass fires. The fire chiefs of White Deer, Groom, and Skellytown reported no fires on the Fourth of July.

We want to thank the people of Carson County, especially our fire departments and law enforcement officials, for making this a successful, safe Fourth of July.

Summer Vacation Driving

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety says vacation travel is as basic as one, two, three. First at night. This helps prepare the vehicle; other drivers to see us prepare the second. third, when driver; traveling, use your best attitude and skills.

Basic vehicle preparation includes checking belts, hoses, radiator coolant, motor transmission oil,

steering fluid, fluid brake and windshield solution. Replace wiper blades if needed and check the tires for wear and correct air pressure. Clean air roadside distress also. Trooper Snider also urges drivers to be sure all the lights are functioning properly.

Driver preparation calls for adequate pre-trip rest and be free of alcohol and/or other drug impairment, which includes medications that may affect safe driving. The driver(s) should be familiar with route plans and weather forecasts as well as possible alternate Trooper Snider recommends travelers to share travel plans with a family member or friend who would know how to contact the travelers should contact be needed.

When traveling, Snider encourages all riders to make proper use of safety belts. "Proper use of safety belts is as fundamental as a baseball catcher's protective gear, greatly increasing

ability to survive a collision, states Snider. Drivers are requested to use headlights during daytime travel as well as and ourselves to see others better and often quicker thus helping avoid many daytime collisions and misses. Additional travel tips Snider offers are; allow for occasional stops

yard Loader.


No action was taken on property that is needing to be cleaned up (city eye sores).

Many Veterans Unaware Of Benefits

over \$42 Billion were paid out in veterans benefits year, billions more went unclaimed in the past few years. Every year eligibility for benefits and the array of available benefits are changed and very few veterans or their survivors keep up the latest rules. with Because of this, and changes in their circumstances, many veterans, their families and survivors are now entitled to money and other benefits from the government even though they were not eligible in the past.

A study group of the Consumer Education Research Center, a 25-year-old national nonprofit consumer group

found that over one fourth of the money paid in veterans benefits goes to persons who never served in the armed forces of the United Most of these were related by blood or marriage to veterans but many were not. Others were members of the armed forces of countries who fought with us against our enemies.

Each year the Center compiles a book describing the latest rules on available benefits and how to qualify for those benefits. The 240 largepage Complete Guide To State Federal And Benefits For Veterans, Their Families, And Survivors with a forward by Sen. Robert Dole is \$19.87 (plus \$3 p&h)

Mr. Robert L. Berko, executive director of the consumer group, says that survivors veterans are unaware that they might be eligible to receive money, medical care, educational assistance, help in buying a home or other benefits. In fact, eligibility and benefits change constantly and some people ineligible in previous years are now able to start receiving money.

The study found that many people are unaware that they are considered dependents or survivors of veterans. These include those involved in illegal marriages, those who remarried after the death or disability of a veteran, children born out of wedlock to a veteran, parents of a veteran and even dependent grandchildren. Any of these may be eligible for benefits.

Mr. Berko says that the study questioned veterans about benefits and found that the majority were unfamiliar with most of the benefits now being granted under Federal and state laws. Even veterans now collecting were unaware of other benefits for which they were eligible and could be collecting.

For instance, disabled veterans can receive apparel allowances if they use wheel chairs, artificial limbs or any prosthetic device that can wear or damage clothing and, if they have a spouse in need of care, they can receive an allowance to pay

someone to provide that care.

Few knew that the Bureau of Veterans Affairs is required to send veterans any requests for bids on supplies or labor that are mailed to any other suppliers.

Other benefits the consumer found that were little known are:

A veteran (or dependent) can receive up to \$837 (40% in advance) if he or she will assist the VA in a work-study program while in an educational program.

Federal agencies are required to establish affirmative action plans to facilitate employment and advancement of veterans with any degree of disability. In fact some job classifications must be filled by eligible

Disabled veterans can obtain extra compensation of hundreds of dollars per month in addition to their 100% disability if they have certain specified disabilities.

"Even though Congress and the various state legislatures have provided for money and services to be given to veterans and dependents, "Mr. Berko states, "unless the people know they are eligible and apply they will not collect anything. Especially, now benefit eligibilities are probably going to be changed by Congress, it is important to apply and establish eligibility benefits right now.

As Sen. Bob Dole, a decorated veteran and one familiar with the bureaucracy, says in his forward, "Mr. Berko's book goes a long way in helping America's veterans cut through the red tape so they can receive the benefits they earned and deserve."



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
