



ACT scores are accepted by virtually all U.S. Colleges and Universities, including all League schools. The Ivy League schools. The ACT is not an aptitude test - it is an academic achievement test that measures students on what they learned in high school. Because it is surriculum-basked, curriculum- basked, colleges use ACT scores for more than admissions decisions - they use scores to place freshmen into classes that the students are academically prepared to handle. For admissions decision, colleges us ACT scores along with a students high school high school oint average, courses grade point college pres extracurricular activities and other information. The test fee is \$25 (\$28 in Florida).

Act's website (www.act.org) has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order test prep materials such as ACTive Prep, an interactive CD-ROM that contains practice tests with instant scores and study plans to prepare for the real test. A free sample test is available from high scho school called "Preparing for the ACT Assessment".

The ACT is only given in 13 state in


Arizona. September California, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Nevada, North Maryland, Pennsylvania, Carolina, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas and Washington. The ACT Assessment is given 5 times per year in all 50 states and in the number one college entrance exam taken by high school students in states. There are four sections to the exam:
English Reading, Math,
and Science. The ACT



The well, which has the capability and is certified to pump up to 500 gallons of water per minute, will be a boon to the city residence as if the city residents as it makes the current water system more reliable with much faster recovery

The project began with a grant obtained 5 years ago form the Texas Department of Housing and Commerce.


