Felon Dies After Car Chase Ends In Crash On I-40

Wolcott, Indiana died after attempted to flee from D.P.S. troopers during routine traffic stop.

The wild chase began at the 112 mile marker on I-40 and continued eastbound, ending near the 131 mile marker Groom DPS Trooper Jeremy Wallace attempted to stop the man after observing that he was not wearing his seatbelt in violation of Texas law. The driver ignored Trooper Wallace's emergency lights and began speeding away when the siren on the patrol car sounded. With moderate to heavy traffic the Indiana man, who was later found to be wanted on aggravated drug possession charges, continued to bob and weave through traffic and in the process nearly hit several vehicles. Drivers along I-40 were forced to take evasive action to avoid an accident.

When the driver left the highway for the service road, Trooper Oscar Esqueda of Borger,

Marvin Miller, 36, of who was riding with Trooper Jeremy Wallace, shot out the left rear tire of the 1989 Plymouth mini-van. The vehicle continued until Trooper Esqueda shot out the right rear tire. Truckers set up voluntary road blocks by driving side by side down I-40. fleeing man passed them in the bar ditch and continued to refuse to

Troopers from McLean Chad S. Estes and Grant Hickman were contacted on the radio and set up stinger spikes across the interstate. After the man ran over the spikes, he lost control and ran head on into a parked semi-

Miller was killed in the crash. The truck driver was air lifted to Northwest Texas Hospital for treatment.

GISD Receives "Recognized" After AEIS Report

By Ben Ingham Groom ISD mailed its Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) report from TEA. The data in the report is used to give each school in the state of Texas a "report card." The data is compiled from the results of the TAAS test as well as, attendance rates, dropout rates, and a college admission table. Based on the above data, Groom has a school district rating of "Recognized." An Exemplary rating is 90- said sur 100 and the Recognized Ingham. level is 70-89.

Groom students attended school at a rate of 97.8%, and reported a "dropout" rate of 0.8% in grades 7-12 in the '94-95 school year. The TAAS results for all students in grades 3-8 & 10 were: 94.4% in reading, 92.1% mathematics, and 94.9% However, in writing. when the scores are broken down into all the sub groups, one group

"economically disadvantaged" 87.1% in mathematics. That was the lowest score made by a group of Groom students. But our campus report card can be no higher than the lowest sub-group.

"am very proud of the hard work and dedication of our students and teachers. efforts are a reflection of the high standards set by our community. We will continue to make every effort possible to become an exemplary district," said superintendent, Ben

meeting. The meeting is open to the public, and all interested persons are invited to attend.
