Court Case Clarifies Career Ladder

The Groom Independent School District has paid nine teachers who previously qualified for career ladder level II the minimum increment of \$1,500.00. The career ladder implemented in 1985, following legislative changes in school law, as a means of attempting to award teachers merit pay for above average performance.

The nine teachers in the Groom School District who have been placed on career ladder level II in past years are Zeldon Jenkins, Janetta Lamb, Leatrice Reck, Georgann Hinson, Pam Hutsell, Steve Hutsell, Shirley Fields, Susan Burgin and Donna Forbes.

The last legislative session attempted to modify the career ladder policies by requiring that a district set olicy and the evaluation

necessary for placement at the beginning of each school year. Teachers would then be placed according to their evaluation received during that year.

A recent court case, however, resulted in a ruling that the legislators erred in the wording of the law, with some interpretation holding that the placement should be on the current year's

evaluation and other interpretation that the placement should be based on the year just prior. Across the State of Texas, there were many different methods employed by districts attempting to comply with the law.

Advancement to level II or to level III on the career ladder will now be based on the evaluation received the prior year until the legislature meets again and attempts to change the process.

The Groom school district trustees voted in June to pay all teachers placed on level II the maintenance payments and to defer discussions of new entries onto level II or onto level III. The conclusion of the court case regarding the wording of the law and the ruling concerning the method of placement make possible further discussion of the career ladder placements.

Previously the district had one teacher on career ladder level III: Judy Babcock, who, as principal, has since become ineligible for career ladder status.

Placement on Career Ladder Level III mandates a further minimum payment of \$1,500.00 to the school employee.



The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

A course in hunter education has been scheduled for Saturday, July 21st from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, July 22nd from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. in the Groom High School Agriculture Classroom in Groom, Tex., according to Fred Britten, Education Hunter Instructor.

"According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's mandatory requirements, starting September 1, 1989, those persons whose date of birth is during the period September 2, through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course in order to hunt in Texas. Effective September 1, 1990, the age group affected will be those whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1974-- and so on. By September 1, 1993, all hunters born on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas. However, any individual

may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements," according to Fred

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bow hunting handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival," Fred Britten added.

Students 12 years of age and older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Parks and Wildlife Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification.

Instructors for the course

will be Charles Burk and Fred Britten. Students will need to have \$5.00, their social security number and have a parent or guardian signature at time of registration.

Farmers Say Farm Bills Lacking In Key Area; Amendments Needed

Members of the Senate Agriculture Committee may have anticipated a respite from farm bill debate after the committee wrapped up its version of the bill during late-night session Thursday. But by early Monday morning, dozens of farmers were already barnstorming Capital Hill telling the Members what they like, and don't like,

about the legislation. The National Farmers Union members say now that the House and Senate versions of the new 5-year farm program are ready for floor debate, they want a series of amendments attached to the bills that would enhance commodity prices.

One such amendment would raise farm program loan rates. During a briefing session Sunday, NFU President Leland Swenson said higher loan rates would not only enhance farm income by raising market government money in denti-ency payments. "The argument against raising loan rates is that it would make us uncompetitive in world markets," said Swenson. "But, the market price of some commodities is already below the world

price, and we have the Export Enhancement Program to help us maintain and build market share."

During the committee mark-up stage, NFU had pushed for farm bill language that would raise loan rates, and repeal the so-called "Findley Amendment," a provision of the 1985 Food Security Act. Secretary of Agriculture to lower loan rates by as much as 20 percent per year. Both agriculture committees modified their versions of the Findley proposals during the debate.

The Farmers Union

members are also asking that farm program target prices be indexed to inflation. "Without indexing, and with the freeze in target prices that's in the legislation now, farmers will get further and further behind over the life of the bill," said Swenson. The NFU president pointed to Congressional Budget Office statistics indicating that for net farm income per farm to remain at 1988 levels under a support price freeze, 500,000 farms could be forced to leave the sector. "The pie will simply get smaller and smaller and







Changes In Social Security Benefits

Over the past couple of months, we have received many calls from Social Security and Supplemental Security income (SSI) beneficiaries wondering why they did not receive a notice telling them about some change in their benefits. For example, they asked why they were not told about the change in the cost of Medicare or the increase in their benefit amount. Since Social Security always sends a notice to beneficiaries when there is a change in benefits, we wondered too.

As we looked into the problem, we discovered, in most cases, the reason the caller had not received a notice was because we did not have a correct address. Most of the callers had direct deposit and since their benefits went directly to the bank, they had not told social Security when they moved.

If you receive Social Security or SSI benefits, be sure to tell Social Security when you change your address, even if your benefits are sent to the bank or other financial organization for direct deposit. We need your address to send you information about your benefits. And we may need to contact you to make sure you continue to be eligible for benefits. If we cannot locate you, we may stop your benefits until we can locate

It is easy to report a change of address. Just call Social Security. The Toll-Free telephone number is 1-800-234-5772.

Carson County Produces Historical Video

"M.H.W. Ritchie. The JA Ranch" is the latest historical video to be produced by the Carson County Square Museum House Panhandle, Texas. The documentary, narrated by Mr. Ritchie, grandson of the ranch founder, Cornelia Adair, is a fifty minute program divided into two parts. Part one is the history of the founding of the ranch and part two looks at the modern JA Ranch. Much has been written about the

JA Ranch but the release of this video will enable the public to know the true story of the ranch and its development.

Mr. Ritchie carefully delineates the story of the million acre ranch and the gradual leasing and selling of acreage to meet the changing ranch operations of the twentieth century. Vintage film and pictures from the JA Ranch make this video one of the best ever produced by the Museum.
