**ELIGIBILITY FOR
SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY
INCOME**

If you have limited income and resources and are age 65 or older, or blind, or disabled, you may be eligible for monthly Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. SSI is a Federal program that makes payments to persons with limited income and resources who are aged, blind or disabled.

A blind person whose vision is less than 20/200 with glasses, or who has tunnel vision of 20 degrees or less should consider SSI. But, you cannot have much income nor own much property. But, you can own your own home. There is no minimum or maximum age for people who are blind or have a disability.

You should apply for SSI if you cannot work because of a physical or mental condition that is expected to last at least 12 months or result in death. A child under 18 is eligible if he or she has an impairment comparable to one which would prevent an adult from working.

People can get SSI even if they have other income. Many people get Social Security benefits and SSI. The amount of a person's SSI payment depends on how much other income he or she has. Income includes Social Security benefits, salary or self-employment income, pensions or annuities, or any money received, as well as housing and food paid by another person.

In 1990, a person can have countable income of up to \$406 a month and still get some SSI payment. An eligible couple can have income of up to \$599 a month still get some SSI payment. Social Security doesn't count all income, however, so you may be able to get SSI even if you have more income, especially if you live in a State that adds money to the SSI checks or if most of your income is from working.

In addition to income limitations, a person cannot have resources of more than \$2000. The limit for couple is \$3000. Resources include savings and checking accounts, bonds, stocks, life insurance, real and personal property.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will conduct a public hearing on Tuesday, June 19, 1990, at 7:00 p.m. The hearing will be held in the Heritage Room of the M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium, 1000 N. Sumner, Pampa, Texas. The hearing is being held to afford the public the opportunity to discuss the proposed

improvements for State Highway 70 in Pampa. The proposed project will run from State Highway 152 north to 21st Avenue.

The proposed project consists of widening the existing four lane roadway to four lanes with a continuous turn lane, curb and gutter and parallel parking lanes. It is anticipated that a small amount of additional right of way will be required at the major intersections along the route in order to accommodate new traffic signals.

Information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way, maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and design, the environmental assessment and the tentative construction schedule for the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineers office, located at

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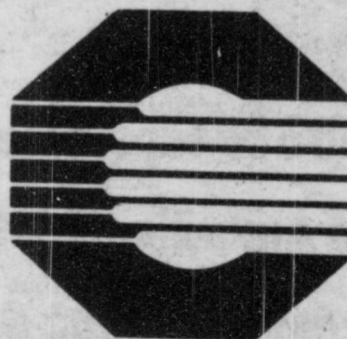

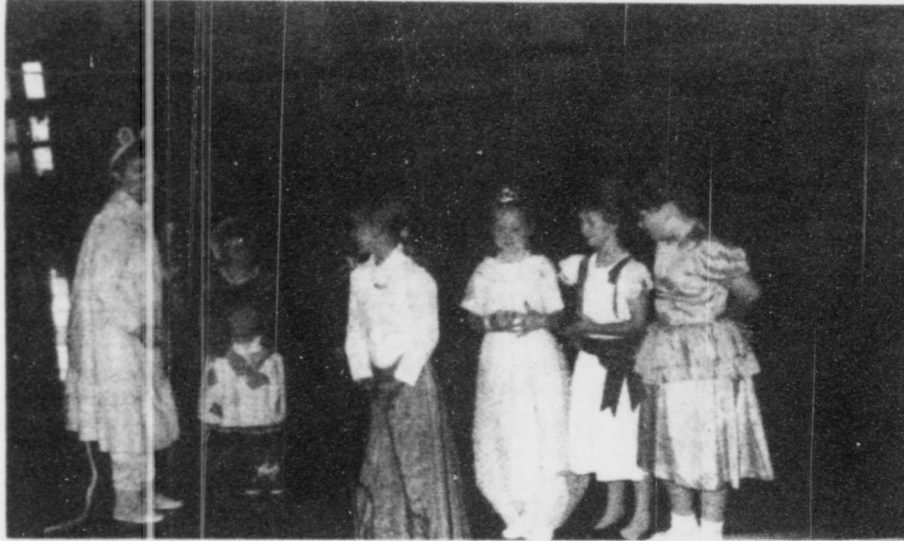
The Groom Elementary classes planned several activities the last week of school.

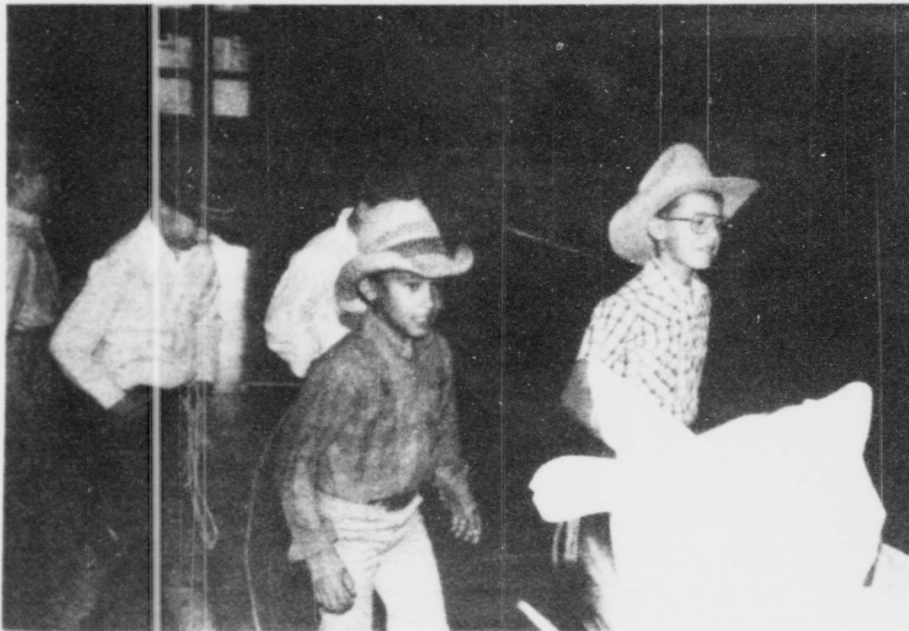

just temporarily store it."

"A dump is a dump; it's taking someone else's unwanted trash and trying to find a place for it," said Carl Looten, who farms several miles east of the proposed site. "It's not right for the community. They're taking something nobody wants and trying to find a place that will accept it for its economic benefits. There's not any economic benefits to a dump."

Frances Sinclair, another landowner close to the proposed site, joined Mrs. Millican at the May 14th meeting of Carson County commissioners. They had been invited by Judge Roselius to help explain the situation to the Court so that everyone would be updated on it.

"The location of the facility is the disagreement here," Roselius told the Court. "The Environmental Protection Agency (E.P.A.) is serious about cleaning up the environment and I agree that it should be done. They don't want this hazardous waste. They don't want it poured down the drain, dumped in the bar ditch, in fields or lakes. They want it taken to a certified disposal area and is disposed of in the proper manner."

"This thing is coming ... it's here. I'm for cleaning up the country and Carson County, but I don't like the idea of someone coming here where we have good land, good water and good people and taking advantage of our geographical location."

When asked why he thought the investors chose Carson County as the site, Roselius said he saw four reasons: 1(They have access to the property (owned by Dr. Howard Berg); 2(I-40 has been designated by the government as a hazardous waste cargo route; 3(It's close to Pantex; and 4(In Carson County, they have only about 1,600 people who might not agree with the location, compared to something like 125,000 in Potter County.

Roselius told the commissioners that he had driven around the east part of Potter County, adjacent to Carson County, and had seen several locations with For Sale signs that seemed to be just as well suited for the facility as any in Carson County.

In regard to the facility's economic impact on the county, Roselius said that it would employ between 6 and 10 people and "that's not much economic impact."

Commissioner Smith, in whose precinct the site is located, asked the burning question: "What can we do to stop it?"

Basing this reply on legal aspects which he had discussed with County Attorney Ed

Grant Awarded To Cancer Center Research

Allen Edmundson, Ph.D., director of the x-ray crystallography lab of Harrington Cancer Center's new Research Institute got good news last week in the form of funds to complete this grant year in the new lab plus funding for next year, and additional funding for the five years following that.

Edmundson's grants, called M.E.R.I.T. awards, are given by the National Institutes of Health and only the top one percent of scientists in the U.S. receive this funding. M.E.R.I.T. (Method to Extend Research in Time) status gives Edmundson uninterrupted financial support and frees him from time-consuming paper work involved in traditional grant renewal applications so he can devote his efforts to research. M.E.R.I.T. status is not applied for but rather awarded to researchers in recognition of their consistent commitment to excellence demonstrated in previous research.

Edmundson says he received the first M.E.R.I. award given in 1986 from the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health to the intermountain west region during his years at the University of Utah. He was also one of the first awardees when the NIH program began. Edmundson's award marks the first time Harrington Cancer Center has received an NIH grant.

Among the research Edmundson and his team will pursue include correlating the structure and function of antibodies. We'll continue our studies of multiple myeloma (multiple tumors of the blood), arthritis and lupus erythatosus, says Edmundson from his desk in the new lab.

The award gives



Edmundson \$144,000 to finish this grant year. An additional \$340,000 has been awarded for next year with \$230,000 of that designated for direct use. His M.E.R.I.T. award has also been approved to be extended from July 1, 1991 to June 30, 1996 for approximately \$1-2 million.

Edmundson earned his Ph.D. from Rockefeller University while working with Nobel Laureates S. Moore and W.H. Stein. He did his post-doctoral work with Sir John Kendrew, Nobel Laureate in the Laboratory of Molecular Biology in Cambridge, England.

Recruiting local researchers is one of the methods Edmundson uses to make Amarillo a recognized scientific hub nationally and world-wide. Top science students from Texas Tech, WTSU and other area schools have the opportunity to be research assistants in the x-ray crystallography lab.

our backyard."

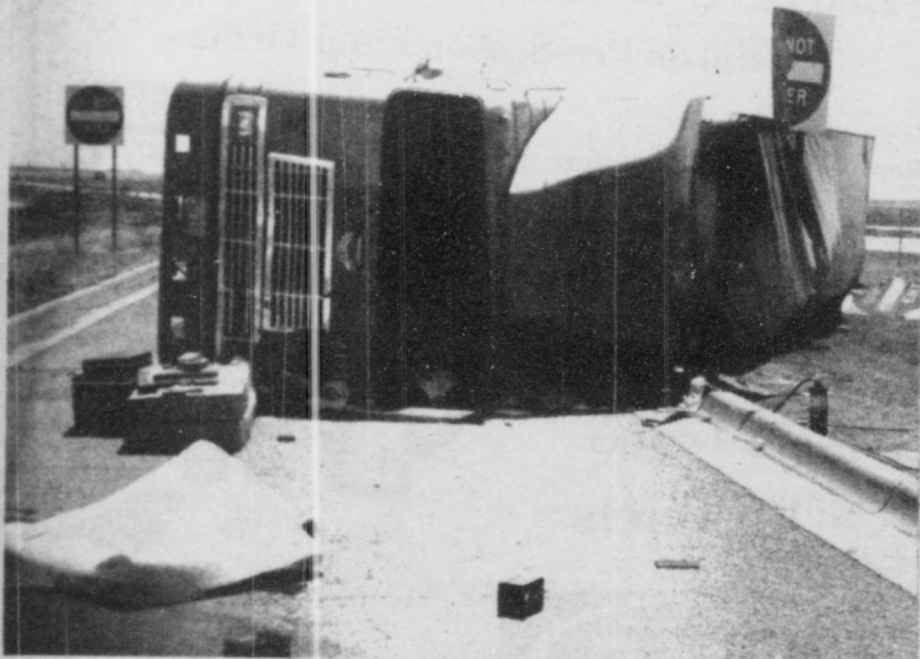

A truck overturned five miles west of Groom, Monday morning spilling a small amount of hazardous chemical, sodium nitrite and injuring two men.

John Waits, DPS Officer, said the chemical is extremely flammable and

harmful if inhaled.

The men were transporting sodium nitrite from a Dupont Plant out of

Oklahoma City. The driver of the vehicle was admitting fatigue, he swerved to stay on the road and overturned

the truck.

The Groom Ambulance Service used the jaws of life to release one of the injured and then transported both of them to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Their condition at press time was unknown.

County Residents:

Dump It Somewhere Else - Not Here!

Some Amarillo investors are planning to build a hazardous waste storage facility in Carson County.

Owners of land near the proposed site object to the choice of location.

Carson County commissioners have sided with the landowners.

Now is the time for other Carson County residents to speak up.

And that's the situation in a nutshell.

A letter addressed to "Landowners Adjoining Plot 16, Section 27, H & C Survey, Carson County," and dated February 20, 1990 was received by Lee and Sonya Millican, informing them that "an environmental hazardous waste storage facility is being planned for a 71 acres plot, fronting I-40 and Farm Road 2161."

Although the idea "looked good on paper," Millicans asked their neighbors if they, too, had received a notification. Their investigation concluded that only one other landowner (a Mr. Abecrombe in Amarillo) had been notified. They later learned that it was not necessary that more than two landowners be officially

notified via mail. The "less" they learned about others knowing about the proposal, the more they wanted to know.

Another letter, dated February 6, 1990 and addressed to the Texas Water Commission, surfaced. This writing said, in part, "ECHO-TECH, Environmental Waste Management Co., Amarillo, has formed a company for the purposes of hazardous waste storage, management consulting and brokerage of hazardous waste materials" and it plans to build such a facility in Carson County, 21 miles east of Amarillo.

On Thursday, May 3, approximately 20 Carson County landowners met at Conway to voice their concern over the situation with County Judge Jay Roselius and Boyd Deaver, assistant manager of the Texas Water Commission office in Amarillo. Those landowners wanted to know more about the facility and about their rights in the procedures.

In its letter to landowners, Eco-Tech said, "The project is a facility for the storage and shipment of hazardous

waste materials out of Texas and the Panhandle area. The first phase ... is for the construction of one warehouse storage facility and an office." The warehouse will store the waste for up to a maximum of 90 days, and then ship it to one of the two incinerator points for disposal.

The plot is 600 feet by 600 feet with a 7-foot high security fence around the entire site. A security guard will be on duty 24 hours a day, according to Eco-Tech.

Deaver told the group that the facility will act as a brokering firm. He explained that it may presently cost \$500 to \$700 per drum for individuals to have their hazardous materials hauled off, but the price could be reduced to \$100 to \$200 under this type of facility. The idea is to provide a collection point so that incinerator companies in Louisiana and Houston would be able to pick up a truckload rather than individual drums, thereby lowering the cost to the generator of the waste.

The plan talks about one facility initially and expanding to four warehouses, each

Survey: 1989

Record Year For Fed Cattle

Feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) during 1989 fed the highest number of cattle on record, according to SPS's annual Fed Cattle Survey.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,468,350 head of cattle, a 2.5 percent increase over the 1988 total of 5,335,603. The previous record was set in 1987 with 5,406,975 cattle fed.

The survey also showed that the one-time total capacity of area feedlots in 1989 was 2,785,475 head, up from the one-time total capacity in 1988 of 2,758,662 head.

"The 1989 study shows how important cattle feeding is to the area's economy," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and wholesale marketing. "Although prices for feeder cattle remain up, 1989 was still a record year for this area."

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey covering feedlots in its service area. The electric utility serves a 52,000-square-mile area comprising the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, and southwestern Kansas.

Additionally, the survey found that 4,694,852 cattle were slaughtered last year at 13 beef-packing plants in the SPS service area, Krupnick said. The facilities have an annual slaughter capacity of 4,818,320 head.

Each year feedlots and packing plants are very cooperative in supplying information for this survey, and we really appreciate that," Krupnick said. "We continue to receive requests from across the United State for this survey, and it helps highlight this area's agriculture and food-processing industries."

The report also shows that the total number of feedlots in the area has grown to 117, and the one-time capacity of these lots is still on the increase. The report also includes a chart on the 10-year history of fed cattle and the one-time capacity of surveyed feed lots, as well as information on the number of feedlots with 5,000 head capacity or above and a county breakdown of lot capacity and numbers fed.

Commissioners Discuss Handicap Assessability

Carson County Commissioner's Court met in regular session Thursday, May 24, 1990 with all members present.

Following the approval of the minutes, Judge J. R. Roselius informed the court that in order to meet the requirements for eliminating architectural barriers the court would need to comply with the additional requirements set forth by the State Purchasing and General Services Commission. Those requirements include supplying a handicap parking area, signs at all entrances directing public to handicap entry, and removing all water fountains, and replace with those that are handicap accessible.

Other changes of original plans call for double walling of the engine room, installing a glass in the metal door of the handicap entry, and doing some demolition work after working hours. Total costs for all modifications will be \$6,209.00.

In other action the court discussed the selling of an asphalt distributor, but decided it would be more beneficial for the county to keep this piece of machinery.

The court also approved an updated version of the Carson County Emergency Management Plan and discussed operation of this program. Carson County's Plan serves the town's of White Deer, Skellytown and Groom.

The EPA guidelines concerning hazardous material was also discussed before the court adjourned.

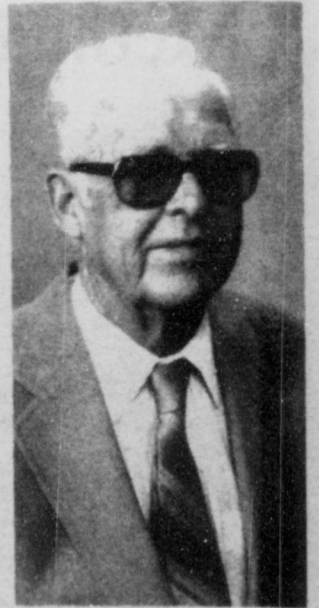
