Perhaps the healing can begin for the Dr. Robert Britten family with the recovery of the body of 8 year old Benjamin, who was lost with his father and two brothers on December 14, when the group was duck hunting. All four most likely died of hypothermia when sudden winds capsized their boat on Lake Meredith.
Robert Phillip Britten, age 11 , was the first found on December 14, 1996. The father, Dr. Robert Britten was found later in the day. It was not until March 1 that 9 year old Patrick Carl was found.

The minutes of the April meeting were approved as read.

Sonie Bybee preserted Wayne Bybee's letter of resignation to Mayor Sam Haynes, who then read the letter to the City Council. The Council accepted Wayne's resignation with regret. Sonie also asked the Council to consider her to fill Wayne's place on the Council.

## Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information. Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.
