Groom Tigers Win Bi-District Friday

Groom Tigers maintained their composure Friday night throughout the game as the Tigers were able to slam the door on Allison each time it seemed the Antelopes were picking up momentum. But the Tigers were able to keep the pressure on to defeat Allison for the bi-district win 82-74.

Groom advanced into Tuesday's night game in Borger against Gruver with a 19-10 record.

Mike Conrad and Jeff Fields combined for 49 points and Groom fought off Allison in the second half for an 82-74 Class 1A bi-district win Friday night in Pampa.

The Tigers were leading by seven, 44-37, at halftime when the Antelopes came out with a fullcourt press that created several turnovers. Allison was able to score eight unanswered points and tie the score at 54-all on Ronnie Hall's layup with 2:25 to go in the third quarter. However, the Antelopes were never able to get on top as the Tigers held on to a 59-56 lead going into the final stanza.

Groom started the fourth quarter with a seven-point run-a short jumper by Jay Britten, a 3-pointer by Conrad and an inside basket by Richard Jenkins-to give the Tigers a 10-point bulge.

"Their press rattled us a little bit and allowed them to get back in it," said Groom head coach Jay Lamb. "I called time and emphasized taking care of the ball more and slowing it down."

Allison crept within five, 70-65, on a pair of Hall free throws with 4:32 to go, but

that was as close as the Antelopes would get. Conrad hit back-to-back jumpers and Britten scored on an offensive rebound to push the Tigers out to an 11-point lead with 2:26 to go.

"Allison was quicker than us for the most part and we're going to have to improve against the press if we're going to get much further," Lamb said. "I felt like we did a pretty good job of rebounding, but we went to sleep underneath the basket a few times."

Jenkins finished with 15 points to go with 28 for Conrad and 21 for Jeff Fields. Britten had 16 points before fouling out with 2:92 remaining to put four Tigers in the double-digit scoring column. Fields tossed in five 3-point goods white

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

The opening quarter held promises of the game going right down to the wire as the two teams tied for the lead four times. Allison led by 2 at the end of the first quarter, but Groom went on a nine-point run before halftime and Allison was never able to regain the lead.

Groom hit 50.7 percent (34 of 67) from the floor, while Allison connected on only 37 percent (23 of 62) of its field goal attempts. But some early foul trouble by the Tigers gave the Antelopes the upper hand from the free throw line. Allison was 19 of 25 for 76 percent, while Groom was six of nine for 67 percent. Groom didn't go to the foul line in the first half; Allison was six of nine in first-half free throw attempts.


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Richard Jenkins Recipient Of D



A native of Carson County, Mr. Dauer was born in White Deer and graduated from White Deer High School. He was well known for his breeding of Hereford cattle, having worked with Herefords as far back as 54 years ago.

The 1980 Fort Worth Stock Show was dedicated in recognition of his work in the cattle industry. In 1988,

he and his family were awarded Farm Family of the Year by the Panhandle Chamber of Commerce. He was a 4-H project leader and was named the Outstanding Farmer of the year by the Texas Farm Bureau. He was an honorary member of FFA and was a founder of the Carson County Agriculture Building.

Dauer helped establish the Carson County Junior Livestock Show. former president of the Top of Texas Hereford Breeders Association, where he served on the executive committee and board of directors. He was presented the Hall of Fame Publication by American Cattle Breeders Association, where he served on the executive committee and board of directors. 

Zeldon Jenkins is the local team's leader and sponsor for the competition.



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
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

change in Social Security regulations will make it more attractive for people over 65 to delay retgiring. Credits which are given

for each month that a person over 65 delays retirement, increase to 7/26 of 1 percent per month, or 3.5 percent per year. The 1990 rate change begins a series of increases over the next 18 years, which will bring the rate to 8 percnt per year in 2008.

These percentage increases, known as delayed retirement credits are applied to a person's 65 benefit rate. For a person who continues to work several more years after turning 65, the increase can be substan-

Increasing the rates of the delayed retirement credits is a result of 1983 Social Security amendments designed to encourage seniors to stay in the workforce. The amendments also gradually increase the full retirement age when credits can be applied from 65 to 67 for people reaching 62 and older in the year 2000 and

Even though they plan to continue working, people should be sure to sign up for Medicate close to turning 65.

If a person is eligible for a benefit increase because of delayed retirement credits. it will be automatically calculated on his or her record after processing of the annual work report.

Property Owners Need To Apply For Exemptions

Many eligible property and mobile home owners have not applied for exemptions that can lower taxable The homestead values. exemption is a one-time application. However, if you have changed your place of residence within the past year, you must reapply for the exemption. To qualify for a residential homestead exemption and/or over 65 exemption, you must own or buy the home on January 1, 1989. The home or mobile home must be your principal place of residence.

convalescent home resident who owns a home is eligible if she/he has every intention of returning to that home, even if the house is being rented out at the time of application.

The homestead exemption also applies to mobile home owners. One does not have to own the land where the mobile home is located in order to be eligible for this exemption.

The following types of exemptions are available to property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District:

General Homestead-Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption for assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control. The county and school district may also offer up to 20 percent exemption of the remaining value of the homestead for 1989. This is a local option exemption.

Persons 65 or older-Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes.

And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owing in any one year one house and yard cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979, or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later. White Deer and Groom City also offer local option over 65 exemptions.

Disability Exemption-Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor-Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount depends on the percentage of service-connected disability. Documents verifying disability are required.

Agricultural-Use-Land which is being utilized for agricultural purposes may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified land owners hold the option of having an agricultural or open-space land valuation applied to their property.

Update On Child Safety Seat Usage In Rural

Counties

In December, Carson County Extension Agent, Donna Gatlin, and eight volunteers conducted a child safety seat usage survey. It was part of a statewide Extension project to measure rural child safety seat usage for children from birth to four years old. The nubers are in-and in Carson County 28 percent of the children observed were correctly restrained according to the law. In Texas the law requires that children birth to two years of age be restrained in an approved child safety seat and that children two to four age be resu either in an approved child safety seat or a seat belt. Surveys completed each year in 14 Texas cities indicate that 45.5 percent of urban children birth to four

years old are being restrained correctly.

In Carson County there are 443 children birth to four years old. If the survey percentages hold true, that means that 124 Carson County children were riding protected that day; but 319 were riding unprotected! It's important for parents to know that the children who unrestrained or incorrectly restrained are at high risk for injury or death due to an automobile Let's make a accident. difference in Carson County, buckle up your children and yourself each time you leave the house.
