Fire Dept. Now Equipped With Second Truck

The Groom Community Fire Truck has returned, after a rebuild by Neal Associates in Waco. The existing chassis, a 1974 Ford two ton four wheel drive, received a new pump and bed to better serve the rural community and the city of Groom.

The truck was painted white to provide greater visability by the public. The new pump is better suited to fighting grass fires while

also being able to control structures fires. The bed consists many of compartments to carry much needed fire suppression and safety equipment. The water tank will hold 750 gallons and has been designed for easy replacement if the need arises, without replacing the entire bed. A small tank was built for holding special chemical to suppress and control hazardous high

explosive spills such as gasoline, diesel, and airplane fuel. The storage will also be used to carry rescue equipment, lighting equipment, and tools such as the Jaws of Life.

The design to the truck took in account the ability to reduce the key rate which affects the insurance rates paid by property owners. By now equipping the truck properly it could result in a

Decision Expected **On** Commissioner This Week

Carson County Judge J.R. Roselius said in a Monday morning interview that he expects to appoint a man to fill the unexpired term of Precinct 4 Commissioner before the commissioners court meets on Monday, December 11.

"I have visited with many people from the White Deer and Skellytown area and think I've had a strong signal of what they want done," he said.

The precinct 4 Commissioners seat was vacated on November 22, when Lee Lockridge submitted his resignation to Roselius. By law Judge Roselius has the responsibility of filling the position by appointment. The term expires at the end of 1990.

"People in Precinct 4 want the appointment made as quickly as possible," Roselius said, "I can understand that. They want to be

represented." "Several people, includ-ing Tracy Kotara, Plez Meadows, Dave Downey, Cohen Gallegly, Bob Lawrence, James Max Owens and Don Elledge have shown a definite interest in the job," he continued.

"I think I have about zeroed in on one, but in this business you can never tell what might come up tomorrow or the next day or the next to change things. I will let you know as soon as I make the decision, but I know it won't be soon enough for you to get in the paper (this week)... maybe Thursday or Friday."

Deputy Taylor Investigating Four Males

Carson County Sheriff's Deputy, Tim Taylor said he is investigating four white males for the Groom burglaries that occured November 25. Crimestoppers reported the burglaries Tuesday night but no further leaks or evidence has been recovered. Taylor asks anyone seeing or hearing anything on the Saturday night and early Sunday morning burglaries to call him.

Pheasant Season Opens, **New Laws In Effect**

December 9, is the opening day of pheasant season. That means the fields around Groom will be full of visitors hunting pheasant; some local hunters and every farmer in the area running around making sure his land doesn't get torn up.

With more farmers moving to CRP, the pheasant population is expected to soar in the next three to five years. That also could mean they'll be tougher to hunt.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wishes to remind hunters to practice

hunter safety. The law allows the hunter two cocks per day and four in possession.

A hunting license is required by law to hunt pheasant. All hunting licenses issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are valid only during the period September 1 or the is suance date, whichever comes later, through the following August 31. Hunters 17 years of age

or older, while hunting, must have on their persons a See Hunting, page 12

McLean Tigers Ends Football Season At Quarterfinals Game In Hamlin

McLean's path through the playoffs was blocked by Christoval in the six-man quarterfinals Friday night.

With the score tied 24-all, Kenny Rivard's two-yard scoring plunge with 9:23 to go held up for a 32-24 win for Christoval, which advances to the regional semi-finals next weekend. McLean closes out with a

12-1 record while Christoval, which is expected to advance into the 11-man ranks next season, stands at 12-0.

McLean, which was ranked sixth in the last state six-man poll, made only one turnover, but it was a costly one. The Tigers were going for the tying touchdown with 2:56 to go, helped out by a Christoval face mask penalty which put them on the Cougars' 34. McLean and Christoval were evenly-matched on both sides of the ball, but Barret felt the Tigers held the upper hand in the first half, even with the score tied at 16-all at intermission.

"They were beating us pretty bad with their flair passes in the first half and that had me worried." Barnet said, "But we made some adjustments in the second half that made a difference."

McLean did end up with more total yardage, 355 to 271, while Christoval had the edge in first downs, 15-12.

Christoval scored on its first possession of the first quarter after forcing a McLean punt. Shorty Montalvo put the Cougars in good field position when he returned the punt 29 yards to McLean's 36. Nine plays

According to the report the no pass/no play rule has had little, if any, impacy on student academic performance. "This may be due to the fact that McLean ISD has always had such a rule," the report states.

McLean students are active in UIL literary competition and each year the students qualify for the regional meet in areas such as science and debate. Students have attended the state meet and placed in the science contest.

On the TEAMS (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) examination, McLean students scored in the top 1/3 of the state in 1988-89. McLean tests grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 each year with the

TEAMS. The level of achievement on the SRA composite test is 67 percentile, according to the report.

In 1988-89, McLean ISD employed 22 teachers with an average of 13.9 years of experience. Twenty three percent of the faculty had master's degrees. Eight teachers were on the career ladder for the 1988-89 school year. McLean provides salary incentives for teachers with advanced degrees. The incentives are equal to 1 percent above base pay and \$100 in addition to the base

One of the goals of the state is that "a well bulanced curriculum will be taught so all students may realize their learning potential and prepare for productive lives." Curriculum is addressed in the report.

From 1987-88 to 1988-89, McLean ISD lost \$3.5 million in taxable property valuation, according to the report. Because of the loss of revenue, the construction of facilities is not practical, the report states. The average per pupil cost, excluding capital outlay for the 1988-89 school year was \$5,182.74.

Another goal of the state educational system is that parents and other members of the community will aid in the improvement of schools.

McLean ISD has active athletic and band clubs that meet on a monthly basis. And many community members serve on the various committees for the McLean ISD, according to the report.

Non residents must have similar documents issued by the agency in the state or county of which the person is a resident that is authorized to issued driver's licenses or personal identification certificates.

It is unlawful to hunt using someone else's license or to allow another person to hunt using your license. Taking of game birds is

limited to rifles, shotguns, or other legal firearms, and bow and arrows (pellet guns and other air guns may not be used to take game birds or game animals.

On June 1, 1988, Texas implemented a mandatory program requiring persons of a specific age group to complete the course before they can legally hunt in Texas. Generally, those born on or after September 2, 1971 have to complete the training, but the program is set up to be phased in over a five-year period (1989-1993).
