Groom Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on August 26, 1997. Attending the meeting were Barry Fields, Tony Treadwell, Dennis Babcock, Pat Britten, Adela Kotara, Tony Britten, Tim Case, Ben Ingham, Joyce Hutsell and Danny Chisum.

Minutes from the previous meeting were approved with a correction as follows: Adela Kotara abstained when voting to make the State National Bank of Groom the official school depository.

The Board discussed

long range plans for maintenance and upkeep of the building and grounds. No action was

taken as a result of the discussion.

The Board went into executive session at 9:00 pm and returned to open session at 9:40 pm. No action was taken on issues discussed in executive session.

The School Board adopted the budget for the 1997-98 school year in the amount of \$1,559,005.

The Board unanimously voted to pay all bills and amend the budget as necessary.

feel they have significantly improved. Our offensive game was really improved over the previous week. We are really intensifying our work on those areas that we are still making those type of inexperience mistakes."


Reid went on to say that he was very pleased with the teams mental attitude and effort.

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McNiels Celebrate 50 Years Of Marriage

McNeil (originally from Groom) and Guy E. McNeil (originally from Denton) celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary August 15, 1997 in El Paso, Texas where they are both retired. This marriage has lasted 50 years in spite of the fact that it started with a

series of omens which may have caused less stalwart couples to change their minds. 1) In 1947, two years after WWII, there were few big weddings with traditional white bridal gowns so the bride wore an ice-blue lame tea length gown. She ordered a corsage with a white orchid. The florist

by mistake sent a lavender one which clashed with her blue dress.

2) The owner of the china shop where she had purchased her china died. This is significant since in those days, the bride had to purchase the complete set of china within a year of the initial purchase. Therefore she had to complete her set within a few months instead of the annual time frame. Just a few years later her Lennox pattern was discontinued.

3) After picking up the wedding cake in Amarillo, mom and dad placed the cake on the back seat of the car for the drive back to Groom. After a stop, the cake fell off the back seat onto the floor. Luckily, it was salvaged by a talented relative.

4) No one remembered to bring rice to throw at the wedding. However, my grandfather, a wheat farmer, remembered he had a full truck of wheat nearby. So wheat was thrown instead of the traditional rice.

5) My mother's uncle, a Catholic priest who was slated to perform the marriage ceremonies died before the wedding. Another priest in the local parish presided instead.

Some facts about my parents:

Guy B. McNeil served in WWII in a PBY squadron for three years in north Africa. While in Morocco, he played craps with Humphrey Bogart. The Madcats (acronym) still have reunions.

He achieved his bachelors of arts from North Texas, his masters in education from Sul Ross College and his doctorate degree from the University of Colorado at Boulder.

He is retired from the public schools in El Paso where he served in administration as the Director of Research and Evaluation.

At the young age of 50, he became a private pilot. He has flown into Mexico, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Colorado.

He is responsible for

his eldest daughter, me, (Peggy McNeil) passing all my math. In first grade, I didn't understand the decimal system. If my father had not shown me that the tiny dot stood for the ten sticks which he drew out, I would have missed the basic building block of the numerical system.

Philosophically, my dad gave me some advice that has served me well during my life. When times are bad, think about some point in the future when things will be good. That way it helps to last through a difficult situation.

Bernadine Ledwig McNeil grew up in Groom and graduated from the high school class of 1942 which just celebrated their class reunion Groom Day. She attended. She was also the valedictorian of the class.

She was one of the pioneers of the Speech Therapy program in El Paso in 1946.

In 1964, she was the first speech therapist in El Paso to receive a Certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech Therapy.

She earned her Bachelor of Arts from Texas Women's University in Denton and her Masters of Arts from UT El Paso in 1978.

Because she has never been able to slow down, she is active with the Catholic Daughters of America. She was one of the original founders of the El Paso Chapter.

Philosophically, my mother believes that

"where there is life, there is hope." This phrase reverberates in my mind whenever I think there may not be a solution to a problem and gets me back on track.

Out of every dollar received at St. Jude's, 87% goes to current or future needs of the hospital. About 9.7% is used to raise additional dollars, and 3.5% is used for

Burton and Brown are the first female officers ever to be elected in the Groom Chapter.

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
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

City Council Approves Tax Rate Increase

The City Council of McLean met in a special session, Tuesday, August 26, 1997 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by Mayor McClendon and opened with an invocation by Sam Haynes at 7:00 p.m. with the following members present: Mary Dwyer, Gordon Sheplor, Ford Smith, Jr., Bob Martin, Sam Haynes, and Charles McClendon.

Others present were Garth Thomas, Alan Preen, Fred Smith, and Toni Bohlar.

Motion was made by Sheplor, second by Dwyer, to raise the 1997-98 Ad-Valorem tax rate to .422681. All voted in favor.

A transfer of \$31,876.58, from the Equipment Fund to the General Fund to pay off the motorgrader was approved.

It was decided that the landfill key will not be given out. Anyone needing in the landfill outside of regular landfill hours, and during regular business hours will need a City employee to go with them, when an employee is available. The landfill fee is to be paid at City Hall prior to dumping. All voted in favor of the motion.

The meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

"Making miniatures is the second most popular hobby in the world, behind stamp and coin collecting," Lankford said.

Aside from creating these miniatures, it is also a credit to his creativity that he does not work from pictures; rather, he works solely from his imagination. That way, he explains, "It can't be compared to real buildings and homes. They're created just the way I think they should be."

Mr. Lankford's work can be seen in five museums around the world that feature miniatures. They are in the United States,

England, France, and Taiwan.

Lankford also teaches classes on building miniatures. The end of this month will find him travelling to Connecticut, Chicago, and Taiwan to teach.

According to Lankford, every person who works in miniatures has a favorite, or specialty area.

"I like to do buildings and landscapes."

One thing that makes his creations so unique is that he writes stories to go along with his miniatures.

In the October 1992 issue of "Nutshell News", a haunted house that he created was featured, and the story that went along with it had these details:

"He (the owner) was a bootlegger. He was caught on the first day of Prohibition, 1920, I think," Bill explains. "They sent him up and forgot about him. That was 70 some odd years ago, and the house is showing some disrepair. He left it totally furnished, but people have come in and taken a few things."

"I like to put a story with everything because

this is life," Bill believes. The homes are built to

such precise scale that one can easily believe they'd be able to pull up in the driveway, just by looking at the pictures.

Bill just recently finished a village, complete with a rainstorm and all the sound effects. This prize is being prepared to ship to a museum in Taiwan.

The recent UPS strike almost put a damper on some of his projects, but he thankfully said, "Everything is okay now!"

One might think that a hobby like this would be time consuming, but Mr. Lankford explained most take only two or three days.

His next undertaking is something he is excited to begin. "It's almost like a fairy tale series. We'll have Gulliver's


Travels, Cinderella, Snow White, Alice in Wonderland, and something like a Faerie Village."
