

Mission Cable Subscribers May Lose KVII Programing

Groom Cable subscribers may have to learn to live without Pro News and Len Slesick's weather and Rush Limbaugh as Channel 7 (KVII) and Mission Cable cannot come to terms. With the new deregulation, local T.V. stations are allowed to charge cable companies broadcasting their signals. At this time Channel 7 is the only local channel attempting to do

this. Rick Wall district supervisor for Mission Cable stated that negotiations were still taking place. He was quick to add that if Groom lost KVII, the company (Mission Cable) would add something in its place. "At this time," he stated, "No decision has been made . . . we still have 7 days (as of Tuesday) to work something out."

Jim McCormick, program manager of KVII was contacted by The Groom News. His secretary stated that he was unavailable for comment.

Roll Back Election Set For Oct. 30 ... **Board Approves \$1.25 Tax Rate**

The Board agreed to

The Groom Board of Trustees met in regular session last week. Don Lyles, vice president was absent. Also attending was Ken Sweatt, Judy Babcock, Debra Addy, Curtis Downs, Susan Burgin and Annetta Childress.

Trustees Burger and Britten made the motion to adopt \$1.25 as the district tax rate for 1993, servicing the 93-94 budget. This will necessitate a roll back election to be held on October 30, 1993.

Superintendent Sweatt conducted the public hearing on the status of Groom I.S.D. as a recognized school in regard to the Texas Education Agency's assessments of statewide Academic Excellence Indicators. No action was required.

incorporate TASB Policy Manual Update No. 44 into the District's Policy Manual, stating that "the Board adopts and rescinds policy statements according to the instruction sheet included for TASB Localized Update No. 44.

After an executive session the Board voted to adapt the contract of teacher/librarian aid Leslie Crowell to include one period daily for the 1993-94 school year to implement the English as a Second Language Program in the District, and deleting one period daily from librarian aid duties, resulting in 4/7 teacher and 3/7 aid, at Step 1 teacher pay, and Step 3, Aid III, in accordance with the District salary schedule.

With Ken Burger voting no the board agreed to alter the contract of Jay Lamb for the 1993-94 school year only, to allow for monthly payment of \$100.00 in lieu of the current contract policy for provision of a

house at 210 Kirkman Avenue on which a taxable value of \$1,800.00 per annum is placed, with the current policy to prevail from the inception of the 1993-94 contract until such time as the 210 Kirkman Avenue premises are vacated, at which time the addendum to contract will be effective.

In an unanimous decision the Trustees voted to rescind the motion passed on April 13, 1993, regarding the painting of the activity

In other business: A discussion was held on the dress code and the dress code adoptions processes. The Board also requested a waiver from TEA regarding a certified teacher for the English as a second Language Program.

The district includes Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties.

Shelton will serve until the next general election.

A native of Childress, he earned a bachelor's degree in 1987, attorney for the City of Clarendon since 1990 and Assistant District Attorney of the 100th District since January, 1993. He is a member of the State Bar of Texas and currently serves as president of the 100th District Bar Association.

Shelton belongs to numerous civic and community organizations including the Donley County Chamber of Commerce and the Clarendon Lions Club. The appointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

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

Carson County Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brand, Sheriff The Carson County Jail is currently holding thirteen persons. Eight of the inmates are incarcerated for felony offenses while five are charged with misdemeanors. The felony offenses include: Criminal Mischief over \$750, Parole

Violation, Falsification of Government Records, -Burglary, Criminal Trespass, Possession of Methamphetamine, Possession of LSD and Failure to Appear (Jumping Bond).

Two persons were transported to Amarillo for

Mental Health Evaluation by Carson County Deputies. The persons were involved in separate incidents which resulted in law enforcement involvement.

One subject was arrested in White Deer after the Sheriff's Department was called to investigate a disturbance. The subject

was arrested for Public Intoxication and resisting arrest after becoming combative with Sheriff's Deputies.

A California man was arrested in Groom after taking beer from a convenience store and consuming it on the premises after the clerk

refused to sell the beer. The subject had a lengthy history of arrests out of the State of Texas. This arrest was brought to us by the Texas Highway Patrol. While law enforcement generally has a way of presenting officers with a great diversity of persons and personalities, I must say that Troopers Davis and Longway of Groom have the unfailing capability to locate and detain some of the most unique individuals we have had the duty to incarcerate.

While some of the arrests that come from Interstate 40 are often newsworthy, they are certainly nothing that we take lightly. We know that some very dangerous persons travel through our county enroute

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Texas, through

its own error in the law abolishing County Education Districts regarding computing 1993 effective and roll-back tax rates, requires that the Groom Independent School District pay all costs of a roll-back election when adopting a tax rate in the exact amount of the 1992 tax rate, said tax rate being \$1.25;

RESOLUTION AND ORDER

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Groom Independent School District Board of Trustees, acting in regular stated meeting in open session on the twenty-first day of September, 1993, and upon motion duly made and seconded:

(1) that an election be held in said school district for the voters of the Groom Independent School District to vote FOR maintaining the school with the exact 1992 tax rate of \$1.25; or AGAINST the Groom School 1992 tax rate of \$1.25 and rolling said rate back to \$1.18173;

(2) that the election shall be held on Saturday, the thirtieth day of October, 1993. (October 30, 1993.)

(3) that said election shall be held in the office of the Superintendent of Schools, located in the Groom Independent School District building located at 304 West Third Street, City of Groom, County of Carson, and State of Texas; and, further, that the polls at the above designated polling place shall, on election day, be open from seven o'clock, A.M., to seven o'clock, P.M.;

(4) that early voting for the above designated election shall be conducted at the School Business Office located in the Groom Independent School District building at 304 West Third Street, City of Groom, County of Carson, and State of Texas, and that said place of early voting shall remain open between the hours of eight o'clock, A.M., and four o'clock, P.M. on each day for early voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the twentieth day prior to election day, that day being the eighth day of October, 1993, and continuing through the fourth day preceding election day, that day being the twenty-sixth day of October, 1993; and shall further remain open for emergency voting procedures as outlined in Texas State Law including, but not limited to, the hours of seven o'clock, A.M. until 12:00 noon, on limited to, the hours of seven o'clock, A.M. until 12:00 noon, on election day on the thirtieth day of October, 1993;

(5) that the State of Texas has no scheduled or standard election days which would conflict with the election day here called; and

that Groom Independent School District incorporates portions of Precincts 101, 102, and 401 in Carson County; portions of Precinct 202 in Armstrong County; portions of Precinct 102 in Donley County; and portions of Precinct 202 in Armstrong County; and that the interests and convenience of Groom Independent School District early and/or absentee voters and voters in person will be best served by holding the election at the traditional site for such elections in a separate election from the county precinct elections;

(7) that Flora G. 

Trade Union Announces Support For Pantex

On September 16, 1993, the Texas AFL-CIO and the trade union council governing the Pantex Nuclear Weapons Plant announced their support for current and expanded research and other missions at Pantex through U.S. Department of Energy's proposed reconfiguration of the Nuclear Weapons Complex. Pantex is located 17 miles east of Amarillo.

The announcement was made on Thursday, September 16 at a 1:00 p.m. press conference held at the Carpenters Local Union Office at 702 South Madison in Amarillo. The

potential expansion and its positive impacts were discussed by Joe Gunn, President of the Texas AFL-CIO, and Ronnie Payne, President and Chief Steward of the Metal Trades Council, Amarillo, Texas and vicinity (which includes Pantex).

At issue is the question whether Pantex, which is under fire from some quarters, will increase its operation and employ thousands more workers, or whether its doors will be shut, throwing thousands of workers into unemployment.

Mr. Gunn and Mr. Payne also endorsed the myriad of federal, state and local agencies with safety and environmental oversight responsibilities at Pantex. Additionally, Mr. Gunn and Mr. Payne urged that strong community support for the Pantex Plant must continue throughout the Department of Energy's assessment of the nation's nuclear weapons facilities process.

Mr. Payne who represents more than 1,100 union members working at the Pantex Plant, commended the officials and agencies with safety oversight responsibilities. He said that safety is considered in every aspect of the job, and cited a provision in the labor agreements which allows workers to refuse work on a job if the refusal was based on the belief that the job was not safe. Payne added, "We're

proud to play a part in this

historic reduction of the

nation's nuclear weapons stockpile. And remember that we are the people with the most to gain economically and the most to lose in safety. Having worked at Pantex for more than ten years, I believe I the fourth quarter. know the facts. I am convinced that the current plant operations are safe and that expansion can be accomplished in an environmentally sound fashion."

Payne also said that the Department of Energy has changed over the years from "production first" to a a "safety first" orientation. He said, "When you hear 'The new DOE' or the 'The culture change', as far as we are concerned, you can

believe it. In a strong statement of support by the Texas AFL-CIO, Joe Gunn also warned about complacency on the part of Amarillo area residents with regard to the

future of Pantex. "The Department of Energy has definitely included an option to close Pantex as part of its Programmatic Friday, October 1. Environmental Impact Statement Notice of Intent," said Gunn. "The Nevada Test Site has been added as a candidate for many of the
