## Assistance

A new conservation provision called Soil and Weter Conservation Assistance is now available for farmers and ranchers in Gray County "Soil and Water Conservation Assistance. or SWCA, provides cos sharing to help farmers install conservation practices on their land, said Hack Coffee, Natura Resource Manager with the USDA Natural $\begin{array}{lr}\text { Resources } & \text { Conservation } \\ \text { Service. } & \text { SWCA }\end{array}$ provides 75 percent of the cost of the conservation practices of private lands. The Fam Service Agency will disburse cost-share funds to the participating
landowners." Soil and Water Conservation Assistance provisions of the Agricultural Risf
Protection Act of 2000. The conservation provision will address the current backlog of conservation applications request and afford opportunity for others to apply for prograp assistance.
"Nationwide, there about twenty million dollars budgeted for Soil and Water Conservation Assistance this year
Coffee explained. "Funds are distributed to the states using an allocation formula based on 29 environmental factors. Conservation Assistance is carried out in areas of the state that are outside of Environmental Quality Incentives Program 2001 priority areas and the Nation: Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) Longleaf Pine Conservation priorify areas."
Persons applying for Soil and Water Conservation Assistance must own or control the land and agree Cattlewomen Hold June Meeting, Scholarships
implement specific eligible conservation practices. The contract period is from five to ten years. The maximum lotal payment per participant for SWCA shall not exceed $\$ 50,000$. "The federal share shall be 75 percent of the cost of an eligible the cost of an eligible practice based on the percent of actual cost, or percent of actual cost with not-to-exceed limits, or flat rates," explained Coffee. "The Soil and Water Conservation Assistance program is available to eligible landowners and agricultural producers."
