



"SWCA provides 75 percent of the cost of the installation of eligible conservation practices on private lands. The Farm Service Agency will disburse cost-share funds

to the participating

Water Soil and Water Conservation Assistance authorized under the provisions of the Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 conservation provision will address the current backlog of conservation applications and other program request and afford an opportunity for others to apply for program assistance

"Nationwide, there about twenty million dollars budgeted for Soil and Water Conservation Assistance this year, Coffee explained. Funds are distributed to states using an allocation formula based on 29 environmental Soil and Water Conservation Assistance is carried out in consideration of those areas of the state that are Quality Incentives Program 2001 priority areas and the National Reservation Reservation outside of Environmental Program (CRP) Longleaf Pine Conservation priority areas.
