

# <u>It's now official -</u> <u>2005 cotton crop</u> <u>sets county record</u>

The highly touted 2005 South Plains cotton crop, earlier labeled a new production record by most experts, is earning new kudos from county gins and producers. Three county gins, Tokio CoOp, Yoakum County CoOp and New Tex have finished the long ginning run, and two of those plants have announced new ginning records.

Tokio CoOp reported last week they had a few remnant bales to process, but the official count at that time was 37,618 bales. They produced 36,643 last year.

Yoakum County CoOp established a new production record, turning out 51,598 bales, comapred to the 2004 run of 37,618 bales of cotton.

New Tex Gin also set a new record, 66,768 bales, easily besting their 8 year average of 35,078 bales.

These numbers do not reflect ginned cotton produced at Sun Cot gin because so many of their customers grow cotton in neighboring Gaines County.


# Plains Lions get City Hall update Multi-projects on weekly agendas

City Administrator Terry Howard was guest speaker at the February 16 meeting of the Lions Club, and he made an upbeat report on a number of ongoing projects.

Howard reported the City has advanced another step toward economic development progress with a new housing grant. Applications will soon be accepted from interested residents who wish to improve their existing housing on owned property in the city limits. The grant would allow three new 1,300 square foot houses to be constructed on applicant owned sites. The old, sub-standard houses would be destroyed and removed before construction would begin. The new homes would be valued at \$55,000 each, and would meet all standing governmental requirements. Howard said applications will soon be available for qualifying low-income residents who are interested in improving their housing. The three qualitying familes would be selected by the Council members. Howard told Lions and guests a serious effort is being made to bring a new business firm to Plains. The Dollar General Corporation has for some time now been trying to select suitable highway frontage property for construction of a new store here. They are in the process of building a new Dollar General store in Denver City. The City Admonistrator said a property owning citizen is in Turn To Page Two, **City Hall**

From One, City Hall negotiations with Dollar General on the price of the property, which, hopefully, will lead to the new business coming to town in the near future.

A Lions Club member asked Howard if rumors were correct about Sonic studying Plains as a possible site for one of their drive-in operations. He said the rumor had ben going for some time, but discussions with Sonic executives indicated that probably won't happen for a long time, if ever. " In their site-selection process they pay no attention to daily traffic number surveys, they rely strictly on population figures of a town, then the particular groundsite. We just don't have enough people to interest them."

Howard reported work should start sometime this Spring on the new City watertower. Final approval of the \$250,000 grant for the project has cleared, with the city expected to fund some \$150 to \$200 thousand of the total cost. The new tower will

replace the old, condemned tower because of interior coating with lead-based paint.

Howard also reported the City recently completed installation of the new lift station in Sulphur Draw just off Hwy. 214, a project costing some \$96,000. Flooding of the facility in recent years has been a major concern, as sewage from the entire town must go through the station to be pumped uphill several miles to treatment facility tanks.

From 1, Commissioners mated to cost \$3,337. It was suggested by Judge Brewer future inspections could be scheduled for the jail and courthouse elevator during one trip.

Judge Brewer read a letter to the court from Teresa Howard, the County Human Resource Director. Howard announced her resignation from the position allowing her to accept the same position with Yoakum County Hospital. She expressed her appreciation for the cooperation shown by the court and all department members. She has been employed by the county Winkles Grain and Fertilizer a 15 years.





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

## Labor Department reports lowest level of new claims in last five years

AUSTIN-U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, a member of the Small Business, Joint Economic and Budget Committees, made the following statement Thursday regarding the new figures released on jobless claims and continuing optimism and growth in the American economy: "Despite critics' efforts to discredit the current expansion, it is clear that the American economy is strong. This is a testament not only to the millions of dedicated Americans across the country, but also to the sound pro-growth and tax-reduction policies of the Congress and the Bush administration.

"The American workforce is stronger than ever. And for those who continue to preach economic doom and gloom, well, it's hard to argue with 4.5 million new jobs, increased productivity, growing consumer confidence, and record homeownership."

According to a Labor Department report Thursday, weekly jobless claims have plunged to their lowest levels since September of 2000. Initial claims dropped 35,000 to 291,000 in the last week.





Four point four million man hours, 505,460 meals, 184 days of work for 1,005 people equals a great deal of hard work and labor of love for those who volunteered for disaster relief with First Baptist Church of Plains this past year.

As part of Tsa Mo Ga's international affairs program on Global Volunteers February 13, Connie McWhirter presented the amazing statistics of the work locals have been a part of in the Texas Baptist Men's Disaster Relief program. Local lay men and women assisted in relief for almost six months this year in areas of the United States hit with hurricane, tornado, and flood destruction. Last year several groups worked in Sri Lanka to help victims following the tsunami. McWhirter was also on one of those trips and gave members information about the work that volunteers do to assist those in need.

This past year, teams have spread from Orange, Texas; Alexandria, La.; to Florida to cook meals and provide assistance for those affected by storms. McWhirter, who says she is "proficient in water and green beans" arrived home early one Friday morning from one town to receive a call to leave for another destination within the next day. She included stories of meeting other volunteers from other denominations and volunteers from neighborhoods who came just wanting to be of help.

The First Baptist Church offers training sessions several times a year for those who want to be a part of the work. Not limited to Plains, the teams have members from Sundown, Loop, Levelland, and Brownfield residents attended a recent training.

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
