Edelman Urges Public to Say "No" to Reagan's Budget

Marian Edelman, Executive Director of the Children's Defense Fund, terms both the Reagan 1982 budget and the proposed 1983 budget as a battle about whether we will continue to invest money in the young, in families, in the needy, in working men and women or whether we will invest in the rich and more and more arms which lead to economic and moral bankruptcy.

Ms. Edelman gives Mr. Reagan a grade of "F" for 1981 on his care and concern for the nation's children; a grade of "F" on his 1982 actions and 1983 proposals will repeat that rating. The grade is based on performance standards: fairness, compassion and honesty, thrift with taxpayers' money, careful process and analysis, and concern for the future. All of these characteristics, we would like to develop in our children. If they are to develop these, they cannot follow the examples set by the Reagan Administration and leaders who support his economic policies.

The report of the Children's Defense Fund (CDF) shows how the Reagan budget cuts the programs critical to children's welfare. These are: education, handicapped, mental health, head start, child nutrition, job corp, child abuse, juvenile justice and runaway youth, maternal and child health block grant, aid to families with dependent children, and all programs that aid youth. These were cut by \$10 billion in 1982 with an additional cut proposal for 1983 of \$8 billion.

CDF says that President Reagan, with anecdotes and carefully selected "facts", has painted the Federal government all bad; state and local governments all good; the private sector efficient, defense spending sacrosanct, and domestic spending for the poor "inflationary and uncontrollable."

The report has listed ten Reagan myths as justification for his austere budget cutting:

1) Social programs for the poor are the cause of Federal budget deficits. The public has been told that if these programs are cut, and fraud and abuse are cut out, the economic problems will be solved. What he has not told the people is that these programs constitute only a

small portion of the federal budget. He failed to deal with the public about the enormous defense increase and the huge tax cuts in the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 which lowered the federal government receipts by \$750 billion.

2) We are going to put people back to work again and decrease dependency. Of course the President has not offered any concrete measures for raising employment.

3) Rising tide lifts all boats. The Reagan administration is lifting all yachts but not the leaky boats of the poor and working people.

4) Government is the problem. Federal programs have been costly failures. The majority of these federal programs for protection of the poor which President Reagan is tearing down were not originated with the 1960's war on poverty but started back with past Presidents, just under different labels, beginning with Abraham Lincoln in his "rations"—just another name for food stamps, and succeeding Presidents have instituted educational, medical, school lunch, foster care for children, mental health and work programs.

5) State and local governments will be able and willing to pick up responsibilities now performed by the Federal government. This shifts unacceptable burdens to already struggling state and local governments.

6) Private sector will meet employment needs and pick up the social responsibilities dropped by the Federal government. Since the cut in public service employment, only one third have found jobs, and many of these were in state and local governments rather than private sector.

7) Volunteers can plug the gap left by the Federal government. While volunteers do make an important contribution, they cannot replace the federal support that is being taken away by the Administration.

8) The Federal government has grown too big and inefficient. State and local governments are more efficient. In the past 15 years, the real growth was in state and local governments. In 1980, 13 of every 100 labor force

workers worked for state and local governments. So the federally funded human services programs which were operated by state and local governments can be charged with the responsibility for waste and fraud.

9) We are getting government off the backs of citizens. The Administration is de-regulating businesses and giving states no guidelines. It is re-regulating the poor.

10) The New Federalism is New Reality. There were many agencies and programs set up after the Civil War to help the freed slaves. However, because of fear on the part of many whites that blacks were beginning to make some political and economic progress, it was decided that these agencies and programs were no responsibility of the Federal government. So "states rights" took control. The hard, long and bitter fight began; many blacks were killed, jailed, victims of water hoses, police dogs, bombings and burnings. Mr. Reagan's "New Federalism" is carrying out his campaign statement made in a speech in Mississippi; that he favors states rights. Certainly his actions give comfort and aid to the most conservative elements in the nation, and the civil rights fight will have to begin all over again, if his Federalism is not stopped.

Mrs. Edelman urges all citizens to prevail upon their Senators and Representatives, friends, and organizations to say "No" to the Administration's cuts in these social programs. BIG GAMBLING WANTS A BIG HAND IN BINGO

Definition of Gambling: to risk or bet something of value on the outcome of a game of chance, etc.

What's the difference? Whether the bet's on Bingo, cards, sports results, or anything else, if money is involved, it's gambling.

There are three basic considerations of gambling.

1. There must be a prize or payoff in money or merchandise.
2. The awarding of prizes must be largely by chance.
3. Eligibility for prizes must depend not only upon the chance taken but on a payment of consideration in either money or merchandise by the person who desires to participate.

If there is no payoff, if there is no risk, if there is no payment of money or merchandise by the participant, gambling is not involved.

The citizens against gambling are not against games and specifically not against the game of Bingo. But we are against legalizing any form of gambling -- no matter what the game or who benefits.

Gambling is gambling, and legalizing it doesn't change its character. Legalizing gambling does encourage gambling and can make a compulsive gambler out of a person who really had no desire to gamble as long as it was illegal.

Legalizing any practice doesn't make it right, and gambling has never been recognized as a morally acceptable practice. It has been tolerated because it has benefited those who have been winners and it has benefited those who have conducted the gambling operations and the taxing or licensing authority. It doesn't seem to matter that some people are losers and can ill afford the temptation that gambling brings.

The great Anglican church leader, William Temple, said "Gambling challenges that view of life which the Christian church exists to uphold and extend. Its glorification of mere chance is a denial of the divine order of nature." When people turn to gambling to provide for their needs in life, or to increase their income, they have turned to another god. They have turned their back upon the God of the Bible who is the God of purpose and order. The goddess of chance or luck has become a favorite in our day. Those who know and worship the true and living God reject her.

If you say, well, it really doesn't matter whether or not we legalize Bingo, you're forgetting what gambling is all about.

Consider carefully the implications of this issue, and then vote against gambling and legalizing Bingo at the election next Saturday, April 3.

So we failed to file our contribution/expenditure. That's no reason for this punishment!

You need to make your decision and vote!

News From Home Folks

It deals with what blacks who are all-too-often little recognized are doing to promote full participation in American life by black Americans. It is thus a source from all of our readers for unsung heroes...and is designed to be a challenge for all of us to keep on doing our very best.

The Black Chronicle (Oklahoma City, Oklahoma) featured this article which gives some helpful hints on how to reduce stress by eliminating old time-wasting habits. This article should be of interest to black Americans Across the Nation.

Old habits and new positions are strange bedfellows, contends Dr. Dennis Mott, professor and head of administrative services and business education at Oklahoma State University.

"What works in one setting, won't work in another, but people are inclined to take old habits to their new positions. However, the new

position may demand delegation, organization and planning skills that weren't necessary in the old position.

"In order to handle the extra responsibilities, too many managers just try to increase their work pace. This results in increased stress and poorer quality of life as well as a poorer quality of performance," Mott says.

He contends that the best way to comfortably adjust to a promotion is to begin using time-management techniques and to eliminate old time-wasting habits. In order to simplify this transformation, he makes the following suggestions:

—Spend the last 15 minutes of every day planning for the next day. A simple prioritized list of things to accomplish is sufficient. A strict time budget will only discourage you.

—If you don't get everything on the list completed, carry the unfinished items over to the next day, but think about why you didn't get them finished.

—Don't take work home except on rare occasions when it is necessary. You should be able to do your work at the office dur-

ing work hours.

—Work ahead during slack times to avoid a crisis later.

—If you can't talk about trivial topics like sports in moderation, don't talk about them at all.

—Prioritize your work by deadlines and importance. This prevents items from getting lost, avoids crisis and helps you to enjoy work more.

—The first time you complete a task in your new position, organize it so that it's easier to do the next time. Things cycle so you'll probably do the same kinds of things year after year," Mott says.

Oil Sanctions: South Africa's Weak Link

(For Classroom and Group Discussion)

Following are excerpts from a paper submitted to the International Seminar on an Oil Embargo against South Africa, held in Amsterdam. The seminar was organized by the Holland Committee on Southern Africa and the Working Group Kairos, in cooperation with the United Nations Special Committee against Apartheid. The paper was issued by the Centre against Apartheid in its "Notes and Documents" series, no. 15/80.

Africa is the only country in the world which has embarked on the commercial production of synthetic oil. The first oil-from-coal plant, known as Sasol I, was opened in 1955. Its output is just under 5,000 b/d of oil products, which constitutes about 1 percent of South Africa's oil requirements in

1978. Sasol II, a considerably larger plant, was opened in 1980. Once full production had been reached in 1981, the output from Sasol II was expected to be around 45,000 b/d.

How long could South Africa survive a cut-off of oil imports?

The period during which South Africa could survive a cut-off of oil supplies would depend on four principal factors: the size of the country's existing stockpiles; the output of oil-from-coal plants; whether current exploration efforts lead to the discovery of exploitable oil deposits; and the extent to which oil consumption could be reduced.

Stockpiles. South Africa has been building up its strategic stockpiles of crude oil for over a decade.

Oil stockpiling is very expensive, both because of the construction expenses and because of the costs of tying up capital in the oil which is stored. Most countries therefore maintain relatively small stockpiles. But South Africa, because it has been subjected to persistent threats of an oil embargo, probably holds the world's largest oil stockpile, measured in terms of how long it would enable the country to survive.

The size of South Africa's stockpile is a closely guarded secret. But utilizing a variety of sources, the Bailey and Rivers report estimated that the country's stocks in mid-1978 would have lasted about one and a half years (at prevailing consumption rates), which represented a stockpile of roughly 158 million barrels. Since then, additions to stocks have been very few because of the cut-off of Iranian supplies. It is therefore unlikely that South Africa's stockpile now exceeds 200 million barrels of oil.

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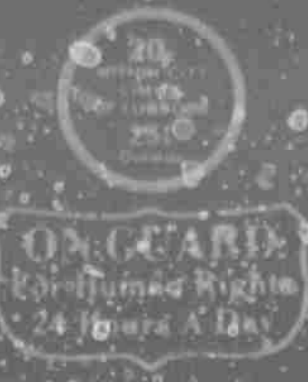

Lubbock Voters Go To Polls Saturday

On Saturday, April 3rd, Lubbock voters will go to the polls to elect school board and municipal candidates. Also on tap is the question as to whether charitable bingo will become a reality in Lubbock.

Thus far, the primary concern of candidates seeking city offices are future growth of the city and its water

supply. Two candidates running for Place 3, Dr. Marjorie Orr and M. J. "Bud" Aderton contend that most of the problems faced by the city are related to growth. Mr. Aderton added that the city's growth will be enhanced by a third water supply. Mayor Pro Tem candidates Bob Bishop

and Alan Henry are also concerned about city improvements. Bishop states that the citizens of Lubbock should have a voice in decisions being made about Lubbock's future, and not just one or two people. Henry states that he will continue to work hard for the future growth of Lubbock, and the growth of business in

the city. The four candidates seeking the mayoral post are concerned, primarily about meeting the city's future water needs. Merl Rose and Ginger Beall both question the feasibility of the Justiceberg Water Project, while incumbent Mayor Bill McAlister and Victor Cargile both believe

that the project is in the city's best interest for future water supplies. Meanwhile, there are six candidates seeking two positions on the Lubbock Independent School District Board. School board candidates have been featured at several forums. Some issues that have been raised in those discussions on academics and athletics and sex education. Kathy Smith has stated that spending policies in the area of athletics need to be reassessed. Dan Seale says that monies can

continue to be spent on both academics and athletics and in greater amounts, if waste is cut from the district's budget. Both Roy C. Jones and Don Oliver, running for Place 7, note that athletics have a place in student life and funding should not be cut. All candidates agreed that sex education belongs in the home, but that most parents aren't taking that responsibility.

County's Plan Approved

Last Friday, the U.S. Justice Department approved Lubbock County's plan for redrawing county commissioner and justice of the peace precinct lines despite objections of minority community members.

County Judge Rod Shaw said when the plan was submitted last fall that the redistricting effort had created a majority of minority

residents in one precinct.

The action approved by commissioners created a 58 percent minority precinct in county commissioner Precinct 3, in the northwest quadrant of the county.

Minorities maintained that the Justice Department has leaned in the past toward the creation of a precinct

with a 60 to 65 percent minority population.

Shaw said there remains a possibility of civil action against the county's plan, but he added that he would like to see the May 1 Primary be conducted without turmoil.

Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

As a result of legislation enacted in mid-1961, Social Security student benefits will be phased out for those attending post-secondary schools. When student benefits were first provided in 1965, the rationale was that young people, 18 to 22 years of age, who were full-time students were as much dependent on their parents for their support as were children under 18 years of age or disabled. It was assumed at a time that students lost a source of support when a parent retired, became disabled, or died. However, the benefits were not related to any educational expenses incurred, to school performance, or to financial need.

The situation today is markedly different from what it was 15 years ago. Since that time, a number of programs have been established to provide assistance to college students based on their families' financial condition. Among the Federally funded educational programs now available are the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, National Direct Student Loan Program, and Guaranteed Student Loan Program.

The change in the law will affect about 600,000 post-secondary school student beneficiaries — 65 percent in 5-year colleges and 23 percent in 2-year colleges. The remainder attend technical, graduate, and business or secretarial schools.

The new law defines an educational institution as an elementary or secondary school. Benefits will not be paid to students who are attending a post-secondary school after April 1982.

Benefits to students who were entitled as of August 1981 and were attending a post-secondary school before May 1982 will be phased out in order to minimize the financial impact on those whose plans for pursuing their education were based on receipt of Social Security benefits.

Additional information about changes in the law regarding educational benefits can be obtained from any Social Security Office.

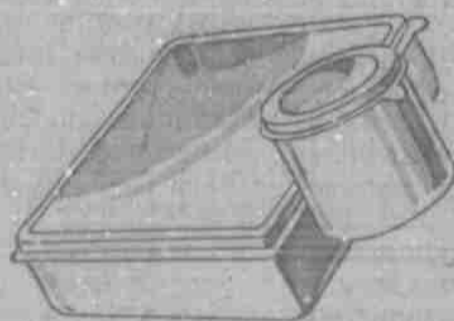

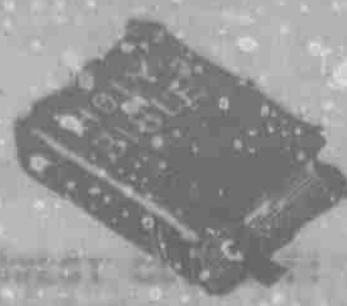

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SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

The Lubbock Digest invited all candidates running for the Lubbock School Board to answer eight (8) questions.

Only five of the candidates replied to our request. Here are their answers:

What are your qualifications and why did you decide to run?

Kathy Smith, Place 4
I have two school age children, Kelly, 14, and Matthew, 9. I am a 2 term PTA President, Cub Scout Den Leader, a member of the Lubbock Educational Alternative to Drugs committee, and a parent-classroom volunteer with more than 800 hours of work in school. I have enthusiasm, energy, and the time to serve as trustee.

Montiv Marie, Place 7
Lubbock resident, 36 years, State Board of Education Advisory Commission; Member LISD School Board 2 1/2 years; Manager of Schneider, Bernet & Hickman since 1970; Former Chairman of Board & Trustee of St. John's Methodist; Former Southwest Lubbock Rotary President.

Roy C. Jones, Place 7
A qualified tax paying citizen. The need for the Board to be exposed to the thoughts of another race. The opportunity to have "Representation along with our taxation." Community Advisory Board; SPAG; President of the Lubbock Branch of the NAACP; Eastern Little League Board member.

Don Olive, Place 7
\$6 thousand dollars more than the educators. Our District needs to study the salary increase on a percentage per year.

I think the evaluation program needs to be re-studied to see if the desired intended goal is accomplished. I support the teacher, Administration and Committee in their efforts to solve present problems and iron out the differences - yet there is always room for improvement. I'd like to see our teachers involved in preparing and directing the evaluations guidelines to be used.

Discipline is a problem not only in Lubbock Public Schools, but the homes, city as well. Our children are as if pleading to be told, corrected and disciplined.

Busing is a crutch used world wide when school integration is a topic of discussion. This is a self made problem that our District has been fighting with for far too many years "Separate - but equal" promises years ago placed us in this spot today it is time to stop wasting tax dollars in the court room to prevent equality and justice for all. I believe we should do whatever is required in order for all children to function equally in our society under the law of liberty justice for all!

What do you feel will be your greatest asset to the Lubbock School Board?

My reason for running are closely related to my qualifications. I am deeply concerned that my two children get the best possible education and the knowledge I have gained by learning as I worked in the schools will be very useful as I serve on the school board. I believe parents and others who believe as I do should be represented. I believe in our public schools. I think my greatest asset is the first-hand awareness of many of the problems in public education gained through my work at school over the last four years. I have had the opportunity to see our schools from a close working relationship with many teachers, principals, and parents.

Past experience on the School Board.

The magnet programs have filled a void which was needed. They have worked exceptionally well and I am committed to them. After we fulfill our obligation to the students who have enrolled for the Western Cultures Course we need to reconsider our participation in that course.

Teachers in the LISD received their largest pay increase in history in 1980-81. An effort has been made by the School Board to get them and keep them among the best paid teachers in Texas both by pay increases and indexing.

The new evaluation process is just that. New Modifications were adopted in November and additional modifications will be made to streamline the process. We have excellent teachers but we will always try to make them better.

Great strides have been made in the discipline in the Lubbock Schools in the last few years. The development of the in-school suspension program and Project Intercept have helped immensely. The recent move by the board to close Jr. High campus for next year should help also. When dealing with approximately 30,000 students there will of course always be some problems.

The parents of Lubbock overlooked their differences, banded together and made the best of a situation which was forced on our community. Integration has been a good experience in Lubbock because of this; and with the help of the citizenry it will remain so. Busing is an expensive, non-productive, time consuming endeavor and there has to be a better answer. We have met with the Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, and Speaker of the House trying to affect the busing endeavor by the Federal Government, so obviously I support legislation that limits busing. We have used magnet schools very effectively to limit forced busing and an extension of this idea would be a possibility.

What innovative programs do you support and why? Which ones do you dislike and why?

I support the Iles, Hutchinson, and Lubbock High programs. I think they have been effective in many areas. I am very pleased that Lubbock is adopting the gifted and talented program. This will give the talented and gifted students in each elementary school some of the individual attention they need.

Yes, I do support a pay raise for our teachers. I would first like to explore the possibility of further raises and benefits from existing sources. This will require close examination of all departments and I think accurate job descriptions for all school employees would be one useful tool in budgeting our funds efficiently.

The evaluation instrument must be shortened and simplified to make it less time consuming. The evaluations would be more fair and effective if principals were the primary evaluators. I would like to see the number ratings replaced with "meets competency," "needs improvement" and "does not meet competency."

I have not given this as much study as I plan to. So I am not aware of the prevalence and extent of the more serious problems of discipline in our schools. Teachers should encourage self discipline. Punishment should be equitable and fit the misbehavior. I think Project Intercept is effective.

Do you support a pay raise for teachers? If so, where will you find the funds to have such raise?

I have nothing to add at this time. The magnet programs are useful and it could be time to take another look at boundaries.

I believe busing in Lubbock has been a positive experience for those people. There are natural concerns that we all share such as safety, expense, and the loss of neighborhood group activities. I do think that while it is a part of our school system we should all work together to make it successful.

Would you make any changes in the current system of teacher evaluation?

Do you think there are discipline problems in the Lubbock Public System which are not being handled correctly?

Do you have suggestions to further eradicate vestiges of segregation in the Lubbock Public Schools?

What is your position on busing? Explain.

Forty-two months as Director Lubbock City Health Department which gave me inside knowledge of Lubbock City government and how it operates. I am familiar with all sections of the city and their problems. I have visited all areas of the city. I have a working knowledge of other government and voluntary agencies that provide services to people. I am committed to represent all of the people and not a special interest group. My entire career has consisted of problem evaluation and development of appropriate solutions.

A survey of community development areas could be utilized to determine the highest needs. Community development funds would not be used for fire engines nor for softball fields that had been rejected by the voters in the bond election. The one million dollars, proposed by the City Council and passed in the bond election for a new City health department, is totally insufficient for a city over 200,000 population. CD funds could be used for two community preventive health centers -- one in Arnett-Benson area and one in East Lubbock. These centers would be satellite health departments and provide prenatal, family planning, well child, immunizations and community nursing services as well as environmental health services. Community development funds could be used to develop senior citizen programs in some public housing units.

I am in favor of our zoning laws. The problem has been that zoning laws have not been administered in a uniform way with adequate input from the people. All laws and codes should be administered in a consistent way without favoritism throughout the city. The City should provide for effective management of public housing which would promote more cooperation from tenants and pride in neighborhoods. The City should cooperate with and encourage voluntary agencies to provide services in public housing. Some public housing should be adapted to provide the special service and programs for senior citizens. I favor single district members of the City Council in order that all citizens be represented.

Lubbock has grown entirely too large for the four member City Council which was established when the city was founded. The city could be divided into four quadrant districts with one member elected from each quadrant and four members at large who would provide eight council people in addition to the Mayor. There is no way that the mass transit system with its high operating expense can survive as the federal funding dries up. The mammoth buses could be sold to a large city where they would be filled and replaced with 16 passenger vans. Scheduling every 10 minutes during the peak rush hours would encourage more ridership and less driving of private automobiles. No one will ride the bus when it requires 2-3 hours out of 24 to get to and from their destination.

A Task Force, made up of experts such as law enforcement persons, lawyers, judges, psychologists, ministers, sociologists and leaders of all sections, should study means of crime prevention, including citizen involvement. More police should be assigned to crime prevention and surveillance and fewer to issuing traffic tickets for minor violations and drivers license checks. Problems which will come with accelerated growth of the city combined with loss of services and programs which have been federally funded. This is compounded by the City Council and

administrations' insensitivity to the needs of the people in their planning. Plans should be made to provide services as well as streets, sewers and parks.

There is no way that community services will be continued when federal funds run out. It is time that the City re-evaluate its policy of using local revenue sharing funds only for capital improvement. Some of these funds could be diverted to maintain community services.

There is no question that the railroad and street intersection at 34th and Quirt are among the worst anywhere. I cross the intersection frequently when I go to Green Fair Manor for Clinic and am fully aware of its hazards. An overpass is certainly needed there.

Community pride in east Lubbock would contribute to stabilization. This could be accomplished through recognition of the area as a contributing part of the city and listening to the needs of the citizens. Provide equal city maintenance and services. Enforce city environmental codes to improve appearance.

I see no reason why Quirt Avenue should not be renamed. Just because something has not been done in the past is no reason for not doing it if it is appropriate in the present.

The Human Relations Commission has enough functions and responsibilities mandated in the ordinance under which it was established. There is a loss of effectiveness due to lack of direct communication with and reporting to the City Council. This is true of most city boards and commissions. Kent Hance, our U. S. Representative, is more accessible and responsive to the citizens than our local elected officials.
