Minister Speaks About Church

"Young Black Minister Has Hard Time In Lubbock"

Many people believe he became a minister because of his father, Rev. A. L. Davis - former pastor of St. Luke Baptist Church -- but if you talk to Rev. Roy P. Davis, he'll tell you that it cidn't happen that way.

"If I had become a minister just because my father wanted me to be a minister I would really be scared of that. I didn't choose to go into the ministry. If it was left up to me, I would have been a doctor or lawyer so that I could attain a high social status. However, I was called by God to become a minister. I know that without a doubt."

Rev. Davis recently returned to Lubbock after attending school in New Orleans. When he first moved from Lubbock, Davis says he left with a burdened heart. One of the things that troubled him most was the fact that the doors of churches in East Lubbock are closed to young ministers.

"Every young minister desires to have a church. That is his goal. But sin, satan and the willfulness of the people sometimes will not permit that to be so. The young minister in East Lubbock has no where to preach or to pastor except on youth days or special occasions because people set the qualifications above the young minister. Young ministers can see the need in the community but are not able to produce anything because of the simple fact that the qualifications are far above them - because the people say they want someone who has experience. The young ministers have been shut out."

Another problem that troubles Davis is the lack of direction given by the church to the community's youth.

"There is so much jealousy, envy, and corruption in the church and young people are looking at the church and they say that if that's the way the church is, then they can't handle it. Young people in the community are desiring to know Christ but we as ministers have forgotten that it is our duty to serve them and not be served."

Davis said he would like to meet with the young people of East Lubbock to let them know what God has to offer them.

Davis concluded that many of the communities problems could be solved if the people of East Lubbock would seek Christ.

"The people are not of fellowship with God. Nothing is going to improve in East Lubbock or the churches until the people come back to the

Shephard, who is running as a Republican for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 6, says that President Reagan is not an enemy of the black community and is not a racist. Shephard says he is trying to convince blacks in the community and state to vote for good Republican candidates.

"I'm not trying to convert Democrats into becoming Republicans. I'm trying to get black people to vote for good Republican candidates. I don't think blacks should feel guilty for voting for a Republican just because they have always voted Democratic."

Shephard says he is in full support of the Reagan administration policies and that he appreciates the President giving black Republicans access to his office and staff.

"Even though Democrats control the black vote, it took a Republican President to bring a black from Lubbock to the White House," concluded Shephard.

Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

The recently enacted legislation continuing the minimum benefit for those eligible prior to 1982 also contained a provision which expanded the scope of Social Security number fraud and increased the penalties for conviction.

Prior to passage of this legislation, criminal penalities were provided for: (1) knowingly and willfully using a Social Security number that was obtained with false information, (2) using someone else's Social Security number, or (3) unlawfully disclosing or compelling the disclosure of someone's Social Security number. The crime was considered a misdemeanor and the penalty involved a fine of up to \$1000 or imprisonment for up to one year or both.

The amended law expanded misuse of Social Security cards by making it unlawful to: (1) alter, buy, sell or counterfeit Social Security cards or (2) possess a regular or counterfeit card with the intent to sell or alter it.

The provision also made all unlawful acts affecting the Social Security number or card a felony, rather than a misdemeanor. It increased the maximum fine for contiction to \$5000 and the maximum prison term to 5 years.



February Black Awareness Month

Last week, we started a series on Dr. Carter G. Woodson, Dr. Woodson was an elementary school teacher, high school principal, teacher, college professor, and dean of the college of liberal arts at Howard University, and at West Virginia State College. He retired from teaching in 1922 to devote all of his time to research and writing. He had organized the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History in Chicago in 1915, contending against the prevailing white authorities that the Negro had an important past and had contributed to the mainstream of civilization.

In 1916, the association was incorporated and the first issue of the Journal of Negro History was published. Because of his determination and stauch belief in the ultimate acceptance of the Negro through established historical truths. Dr. Woodson is now venrated by scholars of both races and has rightly earned the title of "the fathers of modern Negro histrography".

More famous slaveholders, St. Thomas Aquinas, Italian theologan, Christopher Columbus, Italian navigator, Martin Luther, German reformation leader, Alexander Hamilton, U. S. Statesman, Ulysess S. Grant, 18th U. S. President. The man who led the Union in the Civil War that ended slavery himself owned slaves. In 1848, when he married Julia Dent in Missouri, she owned one slave. She received a second as a wedding present, and late acquired a third one. Grant, in his own name, brought a slave named William Jones from his father-in-law and later *******

Last week, we talked about Career Day activities and this kind of thing but the more you look around at the organizations who sponsor Career Day and world of work programs. You seldom see a self employed Black on the program. The total picture should be painted. It's good that Blacks work for major white institutions, but that's only half the picture. What about R. J. This would include such people as barbers, beauticlans, there's Jimmy Hoover, private contractors, Marshall Taylor, Watson Childress, Charles Gibbs, and other self-employed blacks. All blacks don't work for white folks. Paint the total picture for our youngsters to see. What about the two major black financial institutions -- i. e. 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

"New Federalism"

Dear Editor:

As the President and other government officials move toward "new Fuderalism" and cut social well are programs to balance the federal budget, most Americans, including blacks, believe that high taxes and budget deficits are the results of too many black people receiving too much money from government assistance programs.


Fortunately, Ebony magazine published last month some very significant figures from U.S. government sources. Those figures indicate that blacks receive less than one-third of the total American dollar spent for social welfare

programs: Of the total 30 million spent on Social Security. Retirement and Survivor's Insurance, blacks receive only 9.1% while whites receive 89.4%. Blacks receive only 8.6% of the total 30 million spant on Medicare while whites get 88.7%. Of 2.2. million spant on Velerans Compensation and Pension, whites receive 81% while blacks get only 10%. Blacks receive only 27.5%, and whites 64.2% Security Income. Only 11 million dollars go to Aid lax cut," Otto Eckstein, noted economist is

to Families with Dependent Children. Whites receive 51% of that while blacks get 42%. Of the 22.3 million spent for Food Stamps, blacks receive 32%. Blacks get 44.1% and whites 55.9% of the total 23 million spent for Medicaid. Thirtyone million dollars is paid for Public Housing of which blacks receive 47.1% and whites, 38.4%. Social Security Disability is funded in the amount of 4.7 million dollars 16.5% of which goes to blacks and 81.5% to whites. White Americans receive 54% of the 5.3 million that is spent for Education for the Disadvantaged; blacks receive 34.5%. For Unemployment Insurance we spend 2.8 million of which blacks get only 16.7% while

whites receive 78.5%. The facts are quite different from the picture we usually see in the newspapers and on television when the issue of welfare is discussed. Twothirds of American social welfare dollars go to white American -- quite a revelation -- no?

That's what Ronald Reagan said when he disclaimed any responsibility for the national recession. "Our administration is a clean-up crew for those who want on a non-stop binge and left the tab for us to pick up," the president

"Ed Meese did it!" That's what White House Lides Michael Deaver and James Baker said when they were asked who decided to repeal the policy begun by Richard Nixon that denied tax exemptions to segregated schools.

"The news media did it!" That's what Richard Allen, former national security adviser, said after he was asked to leave his job in the Reagan White House. Allen departed after having neglected

to report gifts of \$1,000 in cash and a wristwatch or two. There is nothing new about the ability of elected and appointed officials to saddle others with responsibility for past mistakes that create current unpleasantness. Today's eaders will always try to blame the mess we're in on those

rascals of yesterday who they persuaded us to throw out. All of this gives the impression that our government is directed by a never-ending stream of incompetents, each digging a deeper hole that someone else will have to extract

And it makes you wonder who's in charge.

They must all look alike

Remember when President Reagan thought that Sam

Pierce, secretary of housing and urban development, was someone else? The president greeted the only black member of his Cabinet as "Mr. Mayor."

This kind of confusion about the identity of ethnics occurred under Jimmy Carter, too. Rep. Norman Mineta, D. Calif., was invited to sup at the White House with the president and the prime minister of Italy because someone thought that the congressman was of Italian, rather than

Japanese, ancestry.

Now the Reagan White House has done it again. The White House recently sent Mineta a photo taken at a Christmas party for members of Congress. The accompanying note said that Mineta would probably want to keep the photo as a memento.

But that act of generosity puzzled the California congressman, for the photo showed a smiling Ronald Reagan with Sen. Spark Matsunaga, D-Hawaii Maybe the White House thinks that Mineta collects pic-tures of other lawmakers of Oriental extraction? Or that

he's the mayor of Honolulu?

Right-wing Republicans want guilt in civil-rights cases to hinge, in part, on the "intent" of the employer who denies a black man a job or the "intent" of the a size legislature whose reapportionment plans prevent black voters from participating fully in the electoral process.

"Intent" is impossible to prove unless the guilty party admits that race was a motive for his actions. Few of today's racists will admit - publicly, at least - that they believe in racial superiority. That is why supporters of the House-passed version of the

Voting Rights Act renewal are asking that "effect" rather than "intent" be the guide for determining guilt in voting discrimination cases. So, are we to judge Ronald Reagan's first year in office by

his "intent" or his "effect"? If the president were graded under the latter test, he would clearly be found guilty of: - Trying to make it more difficult for black people to

- Reducing the living standard of a sizable portion of the black population while inflicting proportionately less damage on the white population;

- Limiting the employment opportunities of blacks and women by removing and weakening equal-opportunity regu-

lations; and, - Producing a foreign policy that ignores the legitimate national, economic and political claims raised by the worldwide underclass and of supporting totalitarianism when its victims' skins are dark.

If that's the "effect," what else could the "intent" have (NEW: PAPER ENTERPRIER AUN.)
