Austin -- State Senetor John T. Montford today Intorduced Senate Bill 271, "The Vicims Bill of Rights", relating to the rights of crime victims and the effect of those rights on the availability of bail and release to parole for defendants.

Senator Montford said, "It's time we started considering the rights of the John T. Montford victime of crimes. For too long now, only the answers this ploblem by criminal's rights were

specificially "listing the considered. S.B. 271 rights a crime victim has." The rights listed in this oill include the right for adequate protection from harm or threats for cooperating with law en-

forcement and prosecution efforts, the right to be informed of all relevam court procee ings, the right to provide pertinent information concerning the impact of the crime by testimony or written alutement prior to senteneing of any offender, the right to have personal property expeditiously returned when no longer needed as e.)dence, the right to be notified of all parole hearings concerning a defendant in the crime victims case. proposed bill is a movision that would stiow a court, judge, magistrate or officer taking ball to consider the safety of a victim when ball is being set.



#### Vernon is a Traitor!!! -

Vernon Jordan, the long time civil rights activist of the 50's and 60's, a man this writer met back in the days when the movement was going strong which was a vivid and verbal force with the NAACP and he was even a dynamic worker on the NAACP's paid staff, has made a change.

This writer saw vernon in the early 70's at a National OIC Convocation in Washington, D.C. and he made a moving speech. A speech that touched everyone in attendance. Later at various meetings across the nation, Black leaders, on the national level, would put Vernon down and clost of them had lost respect for him.

At various meetings across the nation, people complained about Vernon not visiting the Urban League programs in various cities but instead played golf and partyed in pent houses while poor ghetto kids looked and waited for **mim** at the Urban League Centers across the country. It was hard to see the change in the firery civil rights activist who had worked hard with the NAACP in the 50's and 60's and then replace the late civil rights leader Whitney Young, Jr, as director of the National Urban League.

The high point of the matter is new Vernon is a volunteer for the Legal Defense fighting the NAACP pited against former U.S. Senator Edward Brooke. The suit the NAACP and the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund, Inc. The case Itself is bad for the civil rights movement. The NAACP has hired former Senator Edward Brooke to represent the organization. Vernon volunteered his services to the Defense Fund. Last May the 73 year old civil rights organization filed. suit in U.S. District Court to stop the Defense Fund from using the letters (NAACP). The two old friends separated for tax purposes in 1957. The NAACP says it tried to avoid the fight and is pressing it "with extreme reluctance." It contends the Defense Fund can survive a name change and quotes from Romeo and Jullet to make a point: "whats in a name that which we call a rose by any other name would smell sweet." The Defense Fund contends it's like a parent, child relationship that turns sour. It accuses the NAACP of recruiting on birth rights almost as if the Bible was rewritten to have Issac take back the blessing he gave Jaceb.

The NAACP, in a legal paper, says "the appropriate allocation of credit for the success of the civil rights movement in the 1950's and 1960's is a magic point of contention. Former U.S. Senator Edward W. Brooke has been a strong, effective force for human, civil rights and the poor and underprivieged but because of his political affiliation (republican) and his soft spoken but very effective memory he has been averabolised. Acgreat Black leader he has allways been, a true brother, and a great effective politician. This writer will never forgive Ted Kennedy for helping defeat this courseous Black Senator.

Home Again - It is good to be back in home again in Oklahoma and in Boley where we first saw the light of day a few decades ago. Most beliringers do not have to be reminded that yours truly was born in a town that at that time was about 100 percent black but today. only 98 percent after 75 years of ups and downs and all arounds as one beliringer put it once.

Booker T. Washington once described Boley as a "noble experiment" in finding out if Blacks could really govern themselves. There are a number of Black communities in Oklahoma but Boley has often been described as the largest all-black town in American to day. At one time, the town of Boley once boasted of two banks and a number of manufacturing enterprises but today this is no longer true. The banks have folded and only one manufacturing enterprise is left-- The Smokorama Manufacturing Company that is well known in many parts of the world today. It makes barbeque units.

Most of the all black towns (once about 14) have just about gone to the walls today and the town of Langston remains as Oklahoma's second largest all black community with Langston. University, a state supported institution of higher learning for Blacks, keeping the town alive to say the least.

My late sainted Mother, Mrs. Nodie E. Tieuel at the time of her death several years ago, was in business here in Boley for nearly seventy years and my only sister, Mrs. Theresa T. Tieuel Spann still maintains the general merchandise store here in her memory in spite of the fact that she is principal of the Boley Elementary School. There is plenty of room here for black business men who can prove that Booker T. Washington's statement can be answered: yes.

As aforementioned-largest employers here in Boley are the Lee Manufacturing Company and the State Training School for Boys. There is a modern telephone system and the Boley Interdependent School System has recently completed a beautiful new gymnasium and elementary school that is a credit to a small town anywhere.

Boley was founded as a place Blacks could find relief from oppression and segregation in the days when it was at its worst in this country, bellringers point out. Today most of the founding fathers have passed on and a new generation looms in the horizon. Lovely modern homes are everywhere and many of the young people living in Boley commute to Oklahoma City and Tulsa and other area towns for employment. Tax rates are low here and the greatest need is for development of the business section and there are those who say: It will pick up in the not too distant future. Here are a few thoughts from those who live and breach in this historic town where members of the late Pretty Boy Floyd gang met their fate when they attempted to rob one of the banks here: Ashley, (Veteran leader and e-lucator): "Our greatest need is a more concerted effort on the part of our younger people to plan and work for the future of our towr. There are encouraging signs from them but we need more". Sam Wilcotts (Mayor) 17 years: "Our growth has been stable in the past several months and we hope to keep growing as our limited finances will enable us to do so. Theodore McCormick (veteran business man and former councilman): "We need younger leadership that is dedicated to the task of providing for our own. We must prepare to turn the reins over to those who see a future for a town that can continue to prove that Blacks can do a job all on their own.

Here is the sentence **Wwin or lose at either, hewever, the important thing is that all of us respect the final outcome and work together, responsib 1 y, to elect**  Segregation was the law of the land in the 1940's. However, Blacks successfully forced the Army Air Force to open its doors for the training of Afro-Americans as combat priots. Davis, Jr., recall this critical period of the experiment, which nearly signaled the end of Black participation as combat pilots in the Army Air Force: "One of the primary reasons that the 99th usan, t getting kills in the beginning was due to the type of work that was assigned to them," explains Col. Edward Gleed, Operations Officer for the four squadron fighter group.

He continues, "I'm speaking of close support, what we call interdiction work, where they do drive bombing and strafing up near the enemy front lines of the ground troops. Therefore, they didn't come in contact with enemy aircraft. It was only after they started varying their type of work, sometimes escorting medium bombardment aircraft like B-25's, that they were able to get into the areas where the enemy was. This is why the general public and the War Department were discouraged with them, they weren't getting the kills and this seems to be the criteria that a fighter unit was judged by, the number of kulls."

After a stateside controversy and a Senate hearing, the experiment was given additional time, but on a larger scale. The all-Black 332nd Fighter Group was sent overseas also. The pressure to succeed had become enormous and the implication very obvious: The performance of the Black pilots of the 99th and the 332nd in combat would determine the future role of Blacks in military.

While the Tuskegee Airmen fought the Luftwaffe, they also had to fight another enemy: racism at nome. The "Double V" was a recurring symbol during the period. It stood for victory over racism abroad and racism at home



The Mystical Black Leader

When will the next great Black leader come along to lead Black people to freedom? This quection has been asked frequently as Black people seek a "Savior" to lead them to the Promise Land. The unfortunate reality is that no "greater leader" is likely to emerge on the scene to provide a solution to the worsening situation of Blacks in America.

No leader is likely to emerge because the media controls the national image of newsmakers-Black and white. The media is not likely to provide national publicity for a Black person and produce thereby, a "disruptive" influence on society similar to that which occured in the 1960s. If they appear on television, you know about them. If they don't appear on TV, you don't know that they exist. No Martin Luther King, Jr., Stokley Carmichael, H. Rap Brown, or Maicom X is likely to ever again receive broad national promotion and publicity....unless it is due to a disreptuable act.

While one waits for Black national leadership and anticipates whites to be punished for their sins, the situation worsens. While Blacks Day "What goes around comes around" and expect a mystical angel to force retribution upon racist America. Blacks lose more and more jobs. While Blacks express interest in each other's astrological signs, every social sign recusents more and more unhappiness. Blocks can look to the heavens for satuation but it is only their sweat and organization here on earth that will bring Blacks closer to "freedom."

racially discriminatory white businessman for being racist, but, that is exactly what blacks are doing when they continue to patronize such businesses. Why do, Blacks continue to spend millions and millions of dollars annually in support of racism but presist in complaining about it? You give him power when you buy his goods. He can open more stores with the money that you spend, and discriminate against more Blacks.

The most powerful weapon that Blacks have in their arsenal is their ability to boycott unfriendly merchants and bring them to their financial knees. The name of the game in America is money. When Blacks cause a business to lose money, that business will quickly respond in a positive manner to Black Interests.

This simple weapon has worked for many years and was the major reason for civil rights success of the 1960s. Yet, it is seldom used and is advocated by only a few organizations. But, it is fne key to success and racial justice.
