Judge Rules In Favor Of Minorities

While Lubbook was having a record snow fall here last Thursday, a landmark decision was being made in the courts for the black and brown communities. In a retrial, where updated information was presented to U. S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward several weeks ago, he ruled Thursday, January 20, 1983, that the City of Lub book violates the Fifteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 as amended on June 29, 1982, in the election of cit. council persons.

LOIC Radiothon Here

(Editor's Note: The following is an interview with Bert McWilliams, executive director of LOIC, and doe Phea, Jr., job counsellor, about the upcoming LOIC Radiothon to be neld here Saturday, January 29, 1983, from 10 a. m. to £ p. m. over radio ciations KSEL and KFLB.)

What is the purpose of the radiothon?

"The purpose of the radir fron for LOIC is to collect enough monies to keep the operation running smooth, to be able to finance unemployed and underemployed persons in the city of Lubbock who are unable to find a good job.

What is a good job? "It is a job which allows a person an opportunity to pay all of their bills, and be able to have a little left over to be able to do some of the things they want to do. Which will include a vacation, repairs on their

automobile and ample good in their household." What caused LOIC to be without

necessary Funds? "The major thrust which caused LOIC to be without funds are: 1) totally dependency on the federal government, 2) lost in directions, by getting away from the basics, which were the concept of OIC of America; 3) lost contact with the entire community, i. e. churches and the public sector; and 4) we became a selfcentered operation with little concern for poor people.

Mas this self-centered operation demoralized the board and remaining steff?

"It did in the beginning until we realized that was like " having a baby. We had to bare the pains and then bare the baby, believe in the baby, and establish some capability of raising that baby or organization, so that everyone would be proud of that baby, namely the enfire community and churches. We lost the Pet Milk, and used a substitute which didn't work, nor will it work. It just can't work without the support of the total sector. You can't feed the baby on ego trips. The baby

LOIC Radiothon? 'Utilizing the resources of two local radio stations, namely KSEL-AM & FM and KLFB, local Spanish radio station. Local bur nesses, including 200 who have been contacted, for donations. A radiothon committee has been formed to be volunteers in the Lubbock community to reach the churches, clubs and organizations. We have set up five collection points to receive donations. A bank account has been set up for accountability. Expertise has been given from the State Comptroller's office for proper record keeping. The Mayor of Lubbock has proclaimed January 24 thru January 29, 1983 as 'LOIC Week.' And this will be made known during the broadcast which will originate at LOIC, 1701 Parkway Drive, from 10 a.m.

What is your goal to be raised? "The goal is for LOIC to collect \$29,000 on January 2)th. These contributions will be tax deductible for

"This money will last approximately five months. It will be used for the operation of the manpower program. This will also enhance the funding of a person-

With persons available at that time to pick up funds, will benefit our effort. Harold M. Chatman, the only Black to testify in the retrial, with tears in his eyes, said: "I'm so happy I don't know what to say about this landmark decision in Lubbock. It shows that you can accomplish scinething if you really stick to what you

believe." Rose Wilson, plaintiffs intervener, told the Southwest Digest "It was a long hard fight, but I'm glad It's over and I'm glad we won. All we have to do now is walt and see where we go from here."

"I've thought about a political opportunity in the past, and now that there appears to be one. I might seek office," says Wilson, "It could possibly be a city council post."

concluded Ms Wilson.

Attorney Mark Hall, one of the plaintiffs' attomeys, was very elated over the decision made by Judge Woodward. "We won a great case and we hope for the best of the outcome of this decision," he said.

Judge Woodward included two proposed plans for creating single member districts for the election of city council members. One is a fourmember plans for the city council and the other is for six members.

In his memorandum opinion, which reverses his earlier decision that favored the City of Lubbock, no doubt is a significant victory for the black and brown communities.

In analyzing the typical factors, the court looked into the following areas: the extent of any history of official discrimination, the extent to which voting in the elections of Lub-

bock is racially polarized. the extent to which Lubbock has used unusually large election districts. etc., is there candidate slating process and are minorities denied access to that process, the extent to which minorities in Lubbock bear the effects

discrimination in areas of education, employment, and health, have political campagns in Lubbock been characterized by overt or subtle racial anpeals, the extent to which mindrity groups have been elected to public office in Lubbock, has there

been responsiveness on the part of elected citizens to me parricular needs of minorities in Lubbock, and, was there discriminatory Intent present in establishing Lubbock's at-large system.

"Open Letter to Black Community"

To Whom It May Concern:

Printed above is a precinct map* depicting Judge 'Voodward's plan for a sixmember council and mayor in the case of Rev. Roy Jones et al. v. the City of Lubbock.

The judge's plan for a six-member council and mayor gives in District 2 a 36 percent Black, 36.6 percent Mexican American and 25.7 percent white district. The six districts have to be drawn proportionate to the population. That is, each district has to be roughly 1/6 of the population. Each district would elect one representative who must reside in that district. The vote would be by majority vote. The remedy is this kind of case must be consistent with the percentage of concentrated minority vote. The Voting Rights Act as amended is not intended to guarantee a particular minority candidate would be elected but was to prevent dilution of the minority vote (less opportunity than other members of the electorate to participate in the election process and to elect members of incir choice).

The overall black percentage of population in Luboock is 8.2 percent and the Mexican-American population is 17.9 percent. The ratio of Mexican-Americans to blacks in the east sector is over 2 to 1. Approximately 80 percent of the Clacks in Lubbock and about 77.8 percent of the Mexican-Americans in Lubbock live in the east sector reflected in the judge's proposed District 1 and proposed District 2. The proposed districts break down by percentage of race as follows:

District I White: 39.3 White: 7.3 Black: Black: Mexican-American 50.6 Mexican-American 36.6

With the law and these factors in mind, the attorneys in this case are calling a meeting for the black class to be held the Mae Simmons Community Center for all members of the black community (a designated class in this class action suit) on Monday evening 7:30 p. m. January 31, 1983, and a meeting for all the Mexican-American members of the community (a designated class in this class action suit) on Wednesday evening at 7:30 p. m. The meeting and discussions will be open to all members of the two classes (every eligible black and Maxican-American voter), but will be closed to all others and the media because the matters to be discussed involve pending litigation.

Social Security Tips

danuary represents a beginning and an opportunity for a fresh staff. Since Social Security affects the lives of everybody either directly or indirectly, its a good source for New Year resolutions. You can realize a netgain in your overall well being if you make the prosper regarding your Social Security this yeld

As a general proposition, I am going to recommend that the best New Year's resolution you could make is to resolve to find out more about your Social Security. Depending on your present age, this could mean anything from getting an estimate of your future benefits to getting a Social Security number. Essentially it means finding out your present status with Social Security and how It affects you now and in the fature.

Briefly I am going to list some specific steps you might take, again depending on your age and circumstances.

* Get a Social Security number -- Young people who haven't started their working life should know that theyn will need a Social Security number before they will be hired. Older workers should check to see if they still have their cards, and if not, apply for a duplicate. Most employers will not hire a person without a card and will not accept the number given from your memory. So if you plan to seek other employment during the year - a part-time or temporary job, for example - you could be sericusly inconvenienced by the delay and risk not getting the job.

* Check your earnings - We recommend that everybody check ther earnings credited to his or her Social Security record at least once every three years. This is especially frue if you change jobs frequently or hold more than one job at the time. About 5 percent, the wage reports from employers arriving at Social Security headquarters contain erroneous information - a wrong name or number - that creates a problem in crediting the information. A free post card for this purpose is available at any Social Security office.

* Find out what Social Security provides -- Many people don't realize that Social Security is more than a retirement program. It pays benefits to a disabled worker and his or her family: It pays survivors benefits to a deceased worker's family, and health insurance. benefits under Medicare to a worker of or over, or one who has been receiving disability benefits for 2 years or more, or to one having permanent kidney

* Find out how much your benefits will be - You need to have an idea how much your Social Security benefits will be if you are to plan effectively for retirement or to protect your family adequately against your premature death or disability. You can get an estimate or what your benefits would be at age 65 by calling Social Security.

Briefly, the benefits replace from 28 percent of the prior earnings of workers who have always paid taxes on the highest amount of wages subject to Social Security, to 55 percent for a worker who paid taxes on Federal minimum wage over his or her working life,

"In view of the court's finding in its original opinion that there was a history of official discrimination in the State of Texas and that these discriminatory practices and procedures were in existence in the City of Lubbock in the earlier years in the century, such factor points to the conclusion that the present lection procedures in Lubbook result discrimination," says the

It also stated: "The existence of such a high degree of polarized voting, on the part of all races in Lubbook, is a facfor strongly indicating that the rights of minorities have been abridged or diluted because of their race or color in the use of an atarge sustem."

The court concludes that the extent of past discrimination in such areas as education, employment, and health has, according to the witnesses on this subject, hindred their ability to participate effectively in the political process," continues the opinion.

In Judge Woodward's opinion; "In view of this additional evidence and in light of the past history of discrimination, including discriminatory enactments by the State Legislature, the court now concludes that the

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
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

"A Matter of Morality"

Last week, Judge Halbert O. Woodward ruled in favor of the minorfity plaintiffs which was a moral and just decision. If there would be any complaint, it would be the relief was not enough, with the area representative by city wide voting which could put a hand picked person from the minority community in office by the system. The bigot, racist argument is dilution of municipal government, taking away the right of choice for the city to choose its own type of electing officials. The present system, by design, discriminated against minorities, i. e. politically, economically and other ways. When one does not have political and economical power and clout, they are automatically left out of the decision making placess. If the City of Lubbock opposes the judge's latest rulings, financed by taxpayers money, including minority citizens, the future will probably be a lot different as far as cooperation by minorities are concerned. The big question is what is the issue except pride and not wanting to admit wrong doings, and not wanting to relinquish some of the dominance and power.

Reading Sunday mornings A-J, January 23, 1983, on its editorial page, we understand their position because they are primarilly oriented to white middle class and basically reflective of white middle class, as we are the same to Blacks, minorities and the poor. Some of the excerts from the editorial said: Americans will be denied their basic right to selfdetermination of how to organize their local municipal

Another excert: "But these are differences which should be settled by the people themselves, at the City Charter change ballot box, rather than by dictatoral mandate from Congress or the federal courts."
