Blacks Show Vote increase

Black voters were the only major demographic group to increase their participation in the 1980 Presidential election, a survey taken by the Commerce Department's Census Bureau shows.

The percentage of voting age black Amerians who reported casting ballots rose to 51 percent from 49 percent in 1976, marking the first increase since the 1964 election when 59 percent said they voted. The 19309 white turnout totaled 61 percent and among Hispanics the turnout was 30 percent, roughly the same as in 1976.

The total of 9.8 million blacks were registered in 1980 and 84 percent of them, 8.3 million, reported voting compared with 89 percent of registered whites and 82 percent of registered Hispanics.

Black voter turnout in the North and West was 52.8 percent in 1980 while it was 48.2 percent in the South. For blacks, as among

other races, the

turnout rate was higher

among white-collar workers (64 percent) than blue-collar workers (47 percent), and higher among college graduates (76 percent) than high school graduates (50 percent). Black homeowners voted at a greater rate (60

(44 percent). One-third of all voters in November 1980 lived in families with incomes of \$25,000 or more. In contrast only 1 out of every 7 black voters was a member of a family whose income was at this same level. Copies of the report.



Social Security Tips

On May 4, 1981, Texas Blue Shield (TBS), the Medicare carrier for Texas, began using a new computer system to process your Medicare claims. The new system was the first in the nation to process bills from hospitals, nursing homes. doctors, suppliers, and home health agencies together to create a total medical history lor each. beneficiary. The system has allowed TBS to reduce its Medicare staff and, therefore, its administrative costs while improving processing time. The average length of time TBS has a claim. before writing a check has been reduced from three weeks to two.

As with any major change, especially one involving computers, numerous problems were encountered during the first few months after installation of the new computer system. Not only did the computer system change, but all the clerical procedures for processing claims were also modified. In fact, most clerks has to he taught how to key or type information into a computer. Another side effect of the systems change has been an increase in processing errors. One clerk described the increase in error rates as similar to what happened when she got her first electric stove. "I learned to cook with gas and I gress I just had to form a few things before I got used to not being able to look at the flame."

Even though the error rate has declined, there are still problems with incorrect names, addresses and health insurance claim numbers. Therefore, you should be sure to file your claims with exactly the name and number shown on your Medicara card. If your doctor completes the form for you, check your records during your next visit to be sure the information he has is accurate. Using a nickname or your middle name will cause significant delays in payment.

In the past, telephone service representatives answered inquiries about claims status by looking at microfilm listings which were often not up to date. With the new system, each clerk has direct access to the computer. More current information of your claim's status will be available Sometimes, however, the service representative will not be able to answer questions about the claim immediately because the computer system may not be working. Fortunately, this should not be much of a problem because the system is working more than 30% or

However, one problem that still exists is a large backlog of correspondence. It is expected to take about six months to reduce the backlog to normal levels. Inerefore, if you have a question, try calling the toll-free telephone service rather than writing a letter. The toll-free telephone service (1-800-442-2620) is available from 7:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m each work day. You will have better luck getting through early in the day (before 9 a. m.) or after 3 p. m. The Dallas-Fort Worth metro line (647-2282) is not as busy as the toll-free service. These numbers are shown on the statement entitled "Explanation of Medicare Benefits." Please have your health insurance claim number and claims information handy when you call.

Lot's Stop Playing Games and **Kidding Ourselves**

HOUSTON, Tx. -- First congratulations are in order for our friend and leader, State Representative Al Edwards, on his re-slection from a crowded field without a run-off. We can rest a lot easier knowing we will retain our own state holiday -- JUENTEENTH -- June 18th -- the day Major General Gorden Granger arrived at Galveston to proclaim the good news that Black people were free. This happened on June 19th, 1855, two years after the Emancipation Proclamation had been signed by President Abraham Lincoln on January 1, 1863.

In 1979, a freshman Black state representative from Houston had a plan to find a way for Black people to be officially recognized and be recognized for being so called free in Texas.

With the help of Dr. Rubin Shield, a renown historian who has written more books on Black history than any other historian in America, including Dr. L. Bennett, this young fellow from Houston got his act together. This is when he authored, presented and got passed House Bill 1016 -- which has given Black people in Texas the only ethnic holiday in America. Others have observances, but no state holiday before Al's (Juneteenth) celebration. They were all observances.

Special congratulations go to out friend Rev. Thomas of Galveston who since we say him last has become a City Councilman in that city where it all began. This is also the place where State Rep. Edwards read H. B. 1016, last year, on the spot where General Granger shouted the news that Black people were free, and a Black in the crowd heard the news and started runnig and shouting - "We are free!" The mayor ordered him arrested and General Granger lailed the mayor. That scene, today, is an annual affair in Galveston.

Some how, this writer had been misled to believe that Mexia was the place of Emanacipation observances in Texas But it was quickly discovered that a lot of people from Dallas and surrounding areas go there for the observance. Galveston is the real place. The place of origin where State Rep. Al Edwards was escorted by the DPS on the first observance as a holiday, and read H. B. 1016 in the spot where it

all napperred. Another congratulations to the Parson - Rev. Offford Byrd, who was responsible for us using his souviner book last year. Since we got a late start and the San Antornon program had the best book available, we had no choice but to use it. At the lateness of the hour, theirs was more of what a Juneteenth Emancipation really was all about. We want the Parson and his group to know that we really appreciated their use. Since we are not doing the book this year, we wanted to use this

space and say thank you. Congratulations are also in order to Rev. Byrd for being named as chairperson of the Commanche Three Task Force which this writer has the honor of serving as a committee member. Let's all give ourselves a big hand and keep up the good work in our propespective communities. Let's continue to support Rep. Al Cdwards state wide for his foresight and leadership.



Dear Beb -- Red ink may flow again from Bishop College's financial wounds if proposed cuts in federal aid to students are approved by Congress. Evidence of the college's financial problems is everywhere: open doors and broken windows mark three empty dormitories; asphalt streets packed with holes run between unmowed

Still the Oak Cliff college is open, and there is one encouraging sign of recovery: Enrollment is increasing. A fresh influx of students has pushed enrollment up from a low of 906 in 1979 to 1,130 in 1981 and better fiscal management have improved Bishop's finances. But officials say the college still has not recovered completely from a near collapse in 1979.

"The college now pays its monthly bills, K. V. Rao, vice president for fiscal affairs has stated but the black college has no reserve to meet the crisis that would be caused by a drop in enrollment.


Bishop's financial aid dilector Waymond Maxwell said recently that he fears congressional cuts could threaten the school. "I just don't see where we will be able to offset these cuts', Maxwell said. He raid the proposed reductions could make it impossible to, some students to attenu Bishop (in Dallas) and could chuse our school to close.

"With \$13 million in outstanding debts, the college cannot afford to lose students. Officials at Bishop and other predominantly black colleges in Texas have said they do not expect the cuts proposed by President Reagan to pass Congress without some change. The college has not begun to apy \$1.4 million owed to the Department of Education and it still owes more than \$400,000 to other creditors, Rap stated. Bishop also owes \$10.36 million on buildings — \$7 million in federal

loans and \$3.1 million in bonds. "Bishop students received \$2,024,690 in grants and loans in the 1981-82 school year. Budget cuts already approved for 82-83 will reduce that amount to \$1,580,690 and proposed cuts for 83-84 will shrink to \$944,950," end of quote from K. Holloway.

Bob's Note: According to reports, if cuts to federal student aid in the present administration's budget are passed, at least 20 predominantly black colleges in the nation could be forced to close during the 1983-84 school year, including some in Texas. A sad prediction indeed.

U. S. Scared of South Africa U. N. May Lose \$1 Billion

When you are cool and calm and collected while everyone about is "running and screamin" like wild," either you are far ahead of the maddening crowd or a fool. The jury is still out on the present administration's foreign policy. Presenting a clear coherent if not convincing picture of the United States foreign policy as positioned in the United Nations, Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick, Permanent Representative of the United States to the United Nations, was as usual professional in her remarks. Revealing the usual 'point four program" to a packed group of the President's supporters, she suggested existing economic aid to African and other Third World countries was not compatitable with United States capitalistic interest.

The Permanent Representative is indeed a college professor who hopes to return someday to the isolation of a campus island. In her address to the conservative Commonwealth Club of California in San Francisco last month, a wish was expressed to continue the U.S. \$1 billion-ayear support to the U. N. Netherless, a comment concerning the cutting of aid to the U. N. was met with sporatic applause from anxious rightwingers in the audience. The Permanent Representative must have thought for a moment she mentioned the Bible at a born again Christian college.

"Colonialism" as recognized by the rest of the world has not penetrated the brains of all the President's men and women. Without street knowledge, Kirkpatrick, presented a picture of Third World hatred for the "innocent" institutes of corporations of America and European powers. Perhaps because there is yet nowhere for the right-wing to go but out, the President's position on the U. N. is influx. In recognizing the "U. N. is worthy of attention," Kirpatrick acknowledges. the power of the 157 nation member body. At last, the only affirmative positions by the President's policies is to defend Israel and South Africa against the rest of the world. While she admits that over 50 percent of the issues the prestigious and highly influential security council, which she sits on deals with these two countries, no obvious conclusion of the cancer causing conditions these two countries create is obvious to the administration.

University professors are often believed to be protected in dreaming ivory towers, Presidentss are too often over protected by thunderheads called "palace guarus." Nevertheless, it would not talle too great of a less than rigidly racist mind to recognize that if over 150 different nations in the world say no to two nations, then it is only a matter of time before the will of the majority will be triumphant. Economic development in Africa accelerated with the easing of the U.S. ties to South Africa under the previous administration. Any hardening of U.S. commitment to South Africa will under out ecocmic development programs throughout the Third World. The President and the Professor are in the ballpark they might try to win for a change.

Tribute to an 'unbroken spirit' By Julian Bond

HAVERFORD, Pa. (NEA) - Winnie Mandela missed the recent graduation ceremonies here at Haverford College. She could not travel to Haverford to accept an honorary doctor of laws degree because she is a non-parson in the land of her birth. She is a black South African who has been

In her country, Mrs. Mandela capnot be quoted in the newspapers. She cannot leave the vitlage where she is forced to live. She cannot receive more than one visitor at a time or leave her home at night or on weekends.

Like all South African blacks she cannot vote or own

For all but 10 months since 1962, Mrs. Mandela has been in 'ail or "banned," a police-state device used to silence crit-

ics of the white-minority government. The 47-year-old woman has never been convicted of any

crime except infractions of extra-judicial police decrees. Her major offense against the state is her marriage to Nelson Mandela, a leader of the ou lawed African Ne onal Congress who has been serving a life sentence in prison for the past 17 years.

Last August, Albertina Sisulu was released from 17 years of banning. Her husband, Walter Sisulu, has served 18 years On May 1, the Rev. Smangaliso Mkhatshwa, secretary general of the Southern African Catholic Bishops Confer-

ence, received a three-year banning order; his five-year banning order expired that same day.

Mkhatshwa was detained without trial in 1976, banned after his release in 1977 and detained again the same year. He is restricted to his parish and cannot receive visitors in his home. He cannot enter any black township or educational

institution or attend any social or political gathering Maurice Smithers was banned in mid-April. He cannot move away from the Johannesburg area, be quoted in the press or meet with more than one person at a time.

But Smithers will be allowed to testify at the postponed nquest into the death of Dr. Neil Aggett, a trade-union organizer who died in police custody in Johannesburg on Feb. 5. He had been detained since Nov. 27, when 17 people, most of them trade unionists, were imprisoned without trial. Aggett was the 46th person - and the first white - to die under such circumstances

His death was protested by the Detainces Parent Support Committee, whose members include Hendrik Koornhof, the brother of a South African Cabinet minister. Koornhof's daughter, Hannober, has been changed with passing on instructions for the African National Congress.

The South African Trade and Canning Workers' Union, the General and Allied Workers' Union and the Commercial, Catering and Allied Workers' Union have had their top lead-

A year ago, South Africa's leading black newspapers, the Post Transvaal and the Sunday Post, were shut down.

In February, an official commission of inquiry proposed compulsory registration of South African journalists and establishment of a government commission to monitor and discipline writers. The commission would place restrictions on how the news is written for the South African media and on who would be allowed to write it.

Foreign reporters in South Africa have had their travel restricted or nave been expelled from the country. But Mrs. Mandeia cannot leave.

Her Haverford citation read: "For courage, unbroken spirit and determination in the fight against apartheid, in spite of personal heartbreak, unbelievable cruelty and loss of

It is a citation that could be granted almost at random to South Africa's black population and the small number of whites who support its demands for political freedom. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

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

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

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

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Affirmative in-Action New Reagan Move

An Independent View from Capitol Hill

The social fabric known as afirmative action. every day is being rewoven by conservative forces with the backing of the White House.

The most recent move in this direction came late April when the Reagan Administration released proposals for changing affirmative action regulations which apply to federal contractors. The new proposals were published in the Federal Register on April 24, which means the public has until May 24 to submit comments.

The following examples indicate just how shortsighted these latest Reagan proposals are: First, these proposals would limit the amount of back pay that could be awarded in discrimination. cases. Back pay would be limited to "identifiable victims of discrimination" who had suffered economic loss. Also, there would be a maximum of two years of back pay for discrimination victims. And, that amount would be reduced by

any interim earnings a worker received while the discrimination case was being considered and resolved.

It is a setback to the cause of job equality to limit back pay due to discrimination, because punitive damages or large monetary awards for the victims of racial discrimination also serve to help reduce racism in the job market. If an employer realizes that he would have to pay a large sum for discriminating against Blacks, then chances are he might not discriminate.

On the other hand, if an employer understands that back pay will be held down or limited to a certain level, then this would help perpetuate racism in a system willing to discriminate and pay a mere wrist-slapping penalty when caught. Socond, under the latest administration proposals contractors could concentrate Black

workers in entry-level, low-paying jobs and still be able to meet their obligations to hire Blacks. This is as callous as the back-pay scheme. It is true that Blacks need jobs because the unemployment rate for Black adults is 20 percent and more than double that for Black teenagers. Blacks, however, should not be forced to remain on the receiving end of take-it-or-leave-it
