## Adult Black Men Hardest Hit

**Washington ...** The recovery from the 1980 recession was weaker for blacks than for whites or Hispanics and their unemployment rate began rising earlier in 1981, resulting in record jobless rates virtually from the beginning of the current recession.

Adult black men were hardest hit, reaching a high of 20.5 percent unemployment in December 1982 compared with 16.5 percent for black adult women. For black teenagers, the

situation was especially severe, with an unemployment rate hovering around 50 percent during most of the year.

These are some of the highlights reported in the fourth quarter 1982 "Employment in Perspective: Minority Workers," a publication of the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

This issue of "Employment in Perspective" focuses on 1982 labor

### What You Should do if Your Social Security Check Does Not Come

Most people eligible for Social Security or supplement security income (SSI) checks get them in the right amount at the right address and on time each month. A small percentage of checks, however, arrive late—or not at all.

If your benefit check does not arrive on schedule, it may be due to one of these reasons:

**Change of Address** - Change your mailing address recently? This may be the reason particularly if you did not promptly notify both Social Security and the post office.

**No check due** - Perhaps you were not eligible for a payment because you earned too much from a job or failed to submit a request report or no longer meet all requirements for benefits.

**Mail Delay** - Your check may be late because of misrouted mail, heavy mail volume during a holiday, or some other reason.

**Theft** - About one-fourth of all missing Federal checks are not received due to confirmed theft and forgery.

In case of a missing check, first wait 3 days after the expected delivery date to make sure it hasn't been delayed in the mail. Then contact the nearest Social Security office.

Someone at the Social Security office will check to make sure you had a payment coming and that a check was issued. If so, you will be asked to complete and sign a notice of missing payment. Information you provide is then sent to the U.S. Treasury Department regional disbursing center that issued the check.

How long it takes to get a replacement check depends on what happened to the original one. If it was mailed to the wrong address, it will simply be sent to the correct one. If your check is still missing and has not been cashed, you generally can expect a replacement within a few weeks.

If your check was stolen and cashed, a forgery investigation is necessary, in this case, it could take several months before you receive a substitute check.

Here's what you can do to make sure you receive all benefits due on time:

1. Let both Social Security and the post office know your new address as soon as you have it.
2. Promptly report any event that may affect your payments and return any questionnaire or other forms

**Memphis, Tennessee** ... In a precedent-breaking move, the Board of Directors of Universal Life Insurance Company, meeting February 11 at the company's Memphis headquarters, elected Patricia Walker Shaw as the company's new president. Patricia Walker Shaw's election to the presidency was announced by retiring President A. Maceo Walker, her father, at a press conference following the board's decision. "I am very pleased that my chosen successor is such a highly experienced and proven

executive," Walker said. "A leader who knows our business from the bottom up, who has the kind of forward-looking ideas the company will need in the years ahead."

Ms. Shaw comes to the President's office after 17 years of advancement through the ranks at Universal Life. "Moving step-by-step through this company has been the most important learning experience of my life," she said at the press conference. "I have become Universal Life's daughter, almost as much as I am Maceo Walker's daughter. The company has literally raised me as a businessperson... and believe me, they didn't spare the rod."

After her 1961 graduation from Fisk University, Ms. Shaw initially chose a career in social work, spending six years in the field of child service in Illinois and Tennessee. In 1966 she turned her sights toward a business career, and began work at Universal Life as a keypunch operator. She earned promotions to middle management positions in the Data Processing and Accounting

departments in the late sixties. Since entering senior management in 1971, as Assistant Vice President, her responsibilities have included those of Associate Controller and Assistant Secretary of the firm. In 1981, she was named Executive Vice President, in charge of developing a new marketing thrust for Universal Life.

Citing the state of the economy, especially inflation, as the company's major challenge, Ms. Shaw noted that Universal Life is experienced in dealing with economic problems: "For 60 years, we have worked to provide insurance that is affordable by economically disadvantaged customers." Although Universal is perceived as a Black company selling insurance to Black people, she said, "...In fact, we are a full-service company offering insurance coverage to millions who otherwise might not be able to afford it." The company's new marketing program is based on this large vision of its constituency, Ms. Shaw said. "We will work hard toward the day

when Universal Life will be recognized as a secure, full-service company offering the security of insurance protection for everyone who needs it."

Patricia Shaw also stressed the importance of financial and personnel management within the company: "We have succeeded over the past 60 years by paying close attention to the basics—careful management and development of our resources, both financial and human resources. And we will continue to strengthen our commitment to these basics, with a special emphasis on our

employees' personal development."

development as a business leader has not gone unnoticed. Later this year she will become President of the National Insurance Association. She has served as Chairperson of the Board of Directors of the Federal Reserve Bank, Memphis Branch, Tennessee Governor Lamar Alexander named her to the State Commission on Minority Economic Development and the Memphis/Shelby County Jobs Advisory Commission. She serves on a number of boards in her native Memphis, and

is currently in her tenth year on the board of Memphis Light, Gas and Water Division. Summarizing her goals as President of Universal Life, Ms. Shaw said, "I am committed to combining our traditional principles with our new and broader marketing profile. Universal Life will grow significantly in the years to come."

### Presidential "Poop" Budget Has Bad Smell

In Southern California there is a perpetual trophy passed on from year to year in California tennis tournaments consisting of "gold-plated buffalo droppings." Don't know if the President plays tennis, but his budget might qualify him for such an award. An anus proposal which puts bullets before bread.

Blotting the budget is the President's initially proposed military budget of \$249 billion cut by Congress to \$237.4 billion. Budget documents however list numerous small expenditures that would add to immediate outlays. Outlandish spending by sold'ers seems to please the President, even at the expense of the poor.

Placing the blame for his unbalance budget on the backs of the poor, the President calls for specific measures to cut food stamps to the people. Pretending it and similar programs were "the largest single cause of the built-in or 'structural' deficit problem." Perhaps the President cannot count. Consider that the projected budget deficit is \$209 billion only slight less than the Lefens budget.

Military spending is scheduled to grow 14.2 percent in fiscal year 1984, starting on October 1, 1983. The Pentagon piece of the budget pie is increasing from 25.9 percent to 28 percent this year, from a quarter to almost a-third by the end of the President's term.

To think his temperature appeared up and the President professed "feeling a bit nervous" before delivering the State of the Union address is about right. Getting the runs is a regular happening when you are about to witness a holocaust.

Firing workers without notice and with deceit is a dangerous act, even for an ex-actor. A record 690 bankruptcies a week last month, exceeded only 696 last year is behind the real economic recovery of the economy. There are lost jobs, savings and souls. ## An Independent View from Capitol Hill

First Black journalist ever elected to Congress



Last week, I joined my courageous colleague from Michigan, the Honorable John Conyers, in pleading before the Rules Committee to allow full and open debate and a vote in the U.S. House of Representatives on the Congressional Black Caucus' budget proposal, a legitimate and essential alternative in the crucial debate respecting our government's budgetary priorities.

The Rules Committee refused, however, to hear us. They presumably felt that such an opening would permit a rule for an alternative budget proposal, more conservative than the Reagan-backed proposal. As a consequence the Black Members of Congress could not debate and argue for their own budget proposal with the same standing on the House floor as those who supported the Democratic proposal. This was the first time in three years in which the Congressional Black Caucus did not submit a proposal during the budget debates.

Such a decision by the Rules Committee deprived minorities, the working poor and the unemployed of putting forth an alternative to the administration's agenda which calls for decreasing outlays for bread while increasing outlays for bombs. The net effect being to gag Americans who truly believe that the first foreign policy line of defense for this nation should be a domestic policy line above which our government will not tolerate unemployment—a line above which we will not tolerate deprivation or disrespect of our elderly—a line above which we will not tolerate hunger or homelessness.

Certainly we cannot insist that our white-fellow Democrats accept our priorities, however, we must insist upon our equal rights to be heard. It is this denial that I fought against in support of the CBC alternative budget indeed, it is just such a denial that has resulted in the Democratic Party split, along racial lines, in Chicago's mayoral campaign.

It is just such disrespect as this that is justifying Black Democratic voters turning out of frustration to a Black candidate in the Democratic presidential primaries, even if such a candidacy has no chance of ever winning our party's nomination.

Yes, Black political leaders must insist upon being heard rather than being spoken for by white Democrats whether in the mayoral campaign in Chicago, the presidential campaign across the country or budget debates on the floor of Congress.

Significa: Did Blacks Discover America? Everybody is talking about this unusual fact that was recently carried in nationally circulated **Parade** magazine and this correspondent has received several clippings of article in our mail from bellringers. The article in part reads:

"Most historians now agree that Columbus was not the first explorer to set foot in American. They say that the New World was port of call to many ancient mariners—including blacks from western Africa—hundreds of years before Columbus. Sometime between 1000 B.C. and 500 B.C., a new culture sprang up in Central America. Known as the Olmecs, this group was far more skillful at metallurgy and agriculture than other Indians of the area. It is believed that they taught their neighbors a kind of hieroglyphics and the use of a calendar. Could the Olmecs have been taught these skills by visitors from what Europeans once derisively called "the Dark Continent"? It seems likely. Surviving Olmec artifacts show black people with distinctive African features working and fighting alongside Indians allies."

The article concludes with the fact that when Columbus arrived in the New World, he heard stories of these black men and collected golden spearheads identical in workmanship to those used in Western Africa. The distance from Africa's west coast to the Caribbean is only about half the distance Columbus had to traverse from Spain and a North Equatorial current could have taken African sailboats to the New World in just 30 days—a trip that Columbus and his crew would have envied indeed.

Let's not forget: "A peaceful mass of people, hard working, carries out slowly and patiently an unstoppable invasion. But neither barbed-wire fences nor aggressive border guards nor campaigns nor laws nor police raids against the undocumented have stopped this movement of masses that is unprecedented in any part of the world." Carlos Loret De Mola, a columnist writing in **Excelsior**, one of Mexico City's leading newspapers.

It is a fact that Los Angeles had become the second-largest Mexican city in the world, surpassing all but Mexico City itself, and Los Angeles has as many Spanish-speakers as Madrid, the Capital of Spain. Loret de Mola lauds what he calls the "Mexicanization of Los Angeles," and he forsees a Mexicanization of much of the American Southwest. **Mexicanization** to Loret de Mola doesn't mean the assimilation of Mexicans into American society or even the development of bilingualism and biculturalism. It means what it says, the transformation of America into Mexico, states Doug Harlan, a San Antonio columnist.

Loret de Mola eulogizes the Mexican immigrants, most of them illegal, as having "ability for adapting to the environment and for conquering a great region...that once belonged to our fatherland." legislation which has a heavy emphasis on conservation. The important part of this program is the conservation of all existing water sources. I feel that we now have a total program which will win both the support of the legislature and the voters of Texas.

The five point water legislation includes:

**WATER DEVELOPMENT FUND** - This is a proposed constitutional amendment sponsored by Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, myself and Senator Ed Howard of Texarkana. This amendment would authorize the sale of an additional \$300 million in bonds which would be available as loans to cities in hardship situations. Half of the amount would be available for water supply purposes with the other half for water quality. This program has been in existence since 1957. The new bonds would be added to \$150 million of bonds which have not been sold, to insure our water needs are met in this decade and in the future.

**BOND GUARANTEE AND LOAN FUND AUTHORIZATION** - This combination of a proposed constitutional amendment and enabling legislation is sponsored by Senator Carl Parker of Fort Worth and by Senator Ed Howard of Texarkana. The amendment would authorize the state to guarantee up to \$250 million in water development, water quality or

water conservation bonds issued by local governments. The legislation would authorize the Legislature to appropriate money for a loan program to help local governments pay for major water projects.

**AGRICULTURAL WATER CONSERVATION LOAN PROGRAM** - This is a key part of the entire Texas water program. I am sponsor of this legislation along with Senator Bill Sarpalius of Hereford. This program is a two part package, one portion is a constitutional amendment and the other is the enabling legislation. The amendment would create a new loan guarantee program to help farmers with the purpose of water conservation equipment for irrigation purposes and for establishing new agricultural water conservation methods. Banks would service the loans, which would be available only in areas with water districts having active water conservation programs.

**BAYS AND ESTUARY FLOW AND INSTREAM FLOW** - This bill, sponsored by Senator John Sharp of Victoria, would strengthen the Texas Water Commission's authority to maintain the productivity of the state's bays and estuaries. "As river flows to the Gulf of Mexico it picks up in the flow, many nutrients which are then deposited into the Gulf. These nutrients provide

food for the fish and other life in our bays and estuaries. As these rivers are dammed up, the nutrients are sometimes blocked with the water. This bill would simply give the Water Commission, in issuing a water permit, a requirement to assess the impact on in-stream use and provide for offsetting any adverse impact.

**CONSERVATION** - This legislation is sponsored by Senator Tati Santiesteban of El Paso. Senator Santiesteban is Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, which is the committee that will hear all of the water legislation. This bill would require a political subdivision to develop a water-conservation plan before it could receive state financial assistance on any water project.

In conclusion, I am very optimistic about the success of this water legislation. It has strong support from Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobb, Governor Mark White and many other key officials in our state. These bills will be presented together for hearing on a water agenda in the Natural Resources Committee on Wednesday, April 13, 1983. As vice-chairman of the Water Subcommittee I feel that I will be in a good position to help direct the flow of this important legislation.

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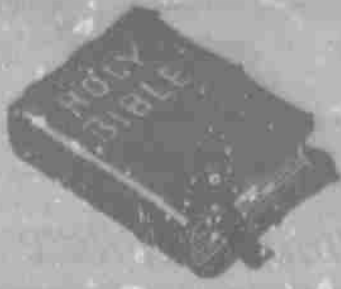

Brown beef in skillet. Sprinkle with salt. Move beef to one side and saute onion until tender. Add vegetables and water; set aside. Bring to a full boil over medium heat, separating vegetables with fork; stir occasionally. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 5 minutes. Just before serving, sprinkle on topping. (Makes 3 servings.)

## Italian Beef Kertle

- 3/4 lb. ground beef
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup water
- 1 can (8 1/2 oz.) tomatoes or broken spaghetti
- 1 beef bouillon cube
- 1/2 cup cooked elbow macaroni, bow ties or broken spaghetti
- 1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen Italian Style vegetables

Brown beef in saucepan. Sprinkle with salt. Add water, tomatoes and bouillon cube; bring to a boil; reduce heat; cover and simmer 5 minutes. Add macaroni and vegetables. Bring to a full boil over medium heat, separating vegetables with a fork and stirring frequently. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 3 minutes. (Makes 3 servings.)

### NOODLES AND CHEESE LOAF

Place mixture in a well-greased baking pan. Mix remaining bread crumbs, cheese and butter and arrange on top of noodle mixture. Bake 25 minutes or until top is golden brown. Serve plain or top with a mushroom or tomato sauce. A leafy salad generously sprinkled with sliced radishes and tossed with vinaigrette dressing provides a nice textural contrast. Chilled white wine to drink, of course. Optional: Leftover ham or chicken can be diced and added to the ingredients.

## Stir-Fry Recipes With A Smart European flair

Stir-fry may be a relatively new cooking term, but clever cooks have done it from the dawn of skillets. It doesn't even have to involve a wok or Oriental seasonings. Stir-frying transcends nationality because it really translates into one smart method of getting a main course together in minimum time.

Here are two speedy and quite different stir-fries that use no waste round steak. Because the beef should be thin sliced to stir-fry, this more expensive cut of meat can be stretched into an affordable—and impressive—meal. To have a firm texture for easier thin slicing, the meat should be frozen for at least an hour.

Quick-cooking is possible because all ingredients for stir-frying are cut reasonably small, or thin, and because slow-simmered condensed soup and gravy provide the depth of flavor that smoothly binds the dish together.

- 2 Tablespoons sweet gherkin pickle juice
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley flakes

Freeze meat 1 hour to firm (makes slicing easier); slice into very thin strips.

Those were fine pictures, among the best in those years so often referred to as the "Golden Years."

The passing of 84 of Gloria Swanson who spanned the era from silent films to the talkies in the 1930s, both as actress and singer (The song was "Love Your Magic Spell Is Everywhere.") in the film "The Trespasser" circa 1930. She lived a full and whirlwind life in the days of dazzling glamour climaxing with a near-miss-at-an-Oscar for "Sunset Boulevard" a comeback film that scored heavily and is seen every so often on the TV screens.

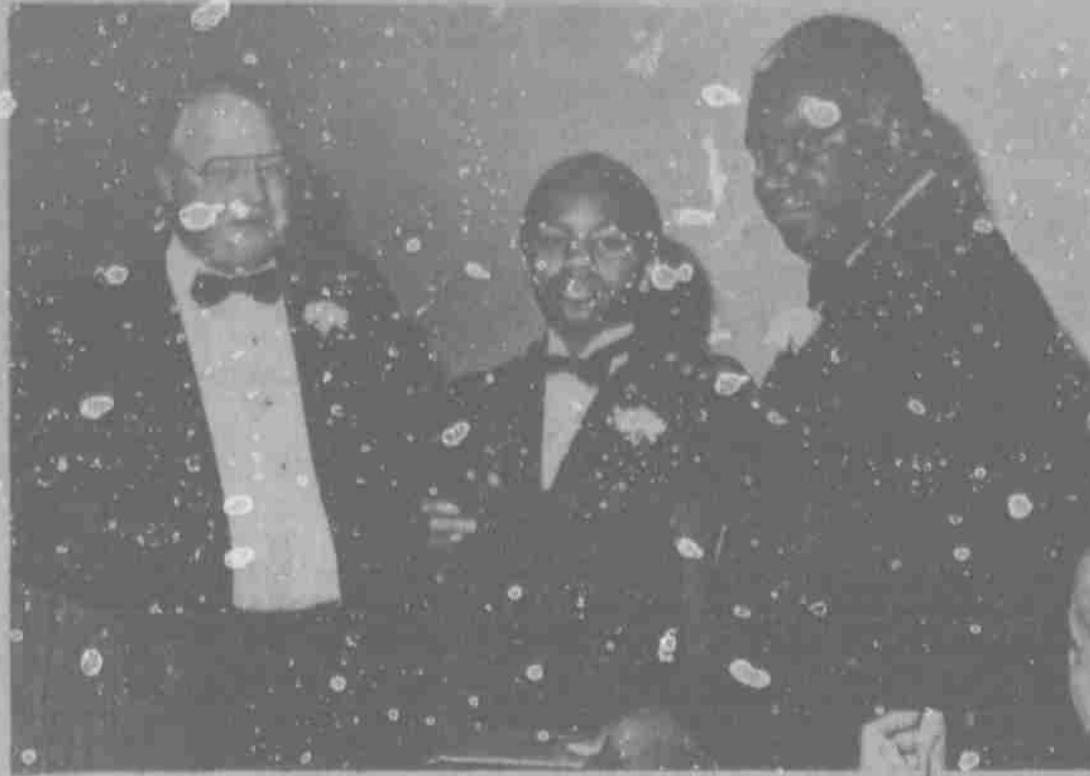
