## Appreciates Her Classmates







I wonder when the AJ will comment on the white on white violence of the American Revolution and Civil War, World War I, violence in Northern Ireland, civil war all over the Soviet Union an Eastern Europe, etc.

6/25 1876 -- Indians defeat Custer, Little Big Horn. 6/26 1945 -- UN established by charter signed in San Francis-CO.

6/30 1914 -- Gandhi's first arrest, in campaign for Indian equal rights in South Africa.

1971 - 26th (18-20 year old voting) Amendment.

1973 - Draft ended.

Ah yes, the good ole days. On June 21, 1964 three civil rights workers -- James Chaney (black) and Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner (white) are reported missing after a short trip to Philadelphia, Mississippi.

And then there is today. A few days ago Congress passed a Civil Right that simply returns the law to what it was a couple years ago before the Reagan Supreme Court overturned a number of established principles used for years to litigate equal employment cases. It faces a veto by Bush because he says it mandates quotas. But Bush says the law will force employers to use

The bill simply returns the law to what it was a couple years ago and makes it clearly illegal to use quotas. Do any of you recall any quotas ever being used in Lubbook, Texas two years ago?

"Law & Order" in 1969, "Willie Horton" in 1988 and "Quotas" in 1992 have become the code words of the Republican Southern

strategy for reelection. It may be their strategy for the entire nation.



my mind too. And believe me, 1991 is going to prove to be challenging and rewarding for me. As I have said the therapies are hard and every now and then I have a few set backs, but I am striving for a very important goal -- Graduation. I cannot end this story at all, for I am far from the end. I don't know exactly what the future holds for me, but I intend to take hold of the reins of life, with the help of God and my mother and my friends, and keep striving for higher and higher goals. So my story will be ongoing as I continue to progress. Also, thank you to my 1991 graduating classmates for all of your support and well wishes. It has meant a lot. Also I will give my thanks to Dr. Damon Hill, Jr. for his never ending support. I thank all of Lubbock Independent School District for their support. My motto is: "Whatever It Takes." I am determined to do whatever it taken to become an independent and successful adult in life.

Well, I made a new friend. His name is Justin Crowder, Justin had a brain stroke, which left his left side paralyzed. Justin was angry, just as I was, at the beginning of my accident. But, for some reason, we were not angry with each other. We talked to each other, and began to rely on each other to get us through the day. I told Justin he had a lut to be thankful for, because at least he could walk, write his name, and do lots of other things that I couldn't do. People throughout their lives take a lot of things for granted that have come to hold so precious. Going through my accident, meeting Justin, also seeing Brian with a head injury, I have come to realize that tragedy has no age limit. in some small way, I have been able to help Justin adjust. I guess we never fully adjust to change in our dreams and future plans. But each day, if we can accept and get through the day, we will gain more strength. Strength is a very important component in my recovery. Friends accepting me for me, and my family being there, even when I'm being a typical jerk. Especially my mom. I keep going back to her strength. He motto is 'when the coing gets tough, we get tougher." I've seen so much mother-love, not only my mom, but in Justin's and Brian's mothers: A never tiring love for their children. I have decided one of the things I wanted to do when I get out of the hospital is to tell other kids about how important family love and support are when there is a tragedy in a family. I often hear that the family unit is dead. Not so! But one must work hard, very hard to keep the family alive, and that when no one else seems to care, mom is always there. Beliave me, I

I also reached a plateau in my rehabilitation. I reached a certain level, and it was like I was stuck there. Exercising until you cry, working when you really don't want to work has paid off. I have my own wheelcha: that I can push myself. I received a hand splint that enables me to answer my phone, and the greatest joy of all was to be able to write my name again. I never thought holding a mere pencil could become such a great accomplishment. I am now holding my fork and feeding myself. It gets a little messy, but guys I can leed myself. I wouldn't want to go out to a restaurant right now, but in time I would. Just give me a little time. I stood up with some help for the airst time in months. It felt good and kind of scare all at the same time. So you see lots of good things have been happening to me. And the most important one of them all is going home around the 18th of February. That sounds a lot better than June or later. Sc I am getting better like the doctors tell me, and I know myself that recovery is a long, hard process. But with the help of God and my mother, and good friends, I am going to make it. I would never take any of my God-given abilities for granted anymore.

I have applied for admission to Texas Tech, and they responded by saying that they were happy to receive my application. The ACT test is coming up, and I plan to do the best I can when I test. I have realized that we as atudents have to work very hard to let cur society know that our instructors are teaching and we students are learning. Making a good show on our test scores will be one of the ways to stand up for our school. That's all I have to say right about now.



### Beyond The Immediate, We Want Happiness

Everybody's caught up in recycling. Checking the roadsides for aluminum cans and glass, selling old newspapers -

- all to be processed into the original products. But if it were possible to take this trash and make it into something really valuable, paper into hundred dollar bills, beer cans into gold, glass into diamonds? What a clean-up campaign we'd have them. Not a scrap of trash would litter our streets and beeches. Even the most remote areas would be scoured. Something like this has always been man's dream. Alchemist, the magician -- scientists of the Middle Ages, sought the secret of turning base metals into gold. We may seek nothing more miraculous than 1940's value for our 1990's dollar.

Here's Happiness.

But there's one thing that most of us want even more than riches. And that's happiness. Money, clothes nor cars can buy happiness. But I know God can make it. And from the most surprising raw materials. "God will turn your mourning into joy." (Jeremlah 31:13)

God's people in Jeremiah's day were exiles. They spent their days in sorrow, longing for their vineyards, their houses and their herds. Then God made his astounding offer: to take their sorrow and make it joy. God wants his people to be happy, now and forever. As our Creator, he knows what we need, and he can give us what

we need. Our biggest problems are we don't recognize what we've already received. Sometimes our lives may look to us like a big pile of trash, problems, pressure, disappointments, dejections, troubles and tears. But look beyond the immediate, to what God can do. "Be very sure you count it all joy." James tells us He means to regard, consider, deem it joy, even when it doesn't really seem that way. Trials will come. The question is not if, but how do we meet them. We know the testing of our faith produces endurance, steadfastness, perservance and long suffering. But as a specially anointed person, we must endure hardness as a good soldier, looking to the author and finisher of our faith. How did Jesus, as a person here on earth, become perfect? 
