Federal Judge Orders Farmers To Pay Workers

On March 19, 1991, United States District Judge Sam R. Cummings entered judgment against four Brownfield area cotton farmers in a lawsuit brought by migrant farmers. The farmers, R. H. Clements, J. W. Hawkins, Doyle Moss and P & B Farms, were ordered to pay damages totaling \$61,033.26 to farmworkers who had hoed cotton for them in 1984, 1985 and 1936, The damages were awarded to compensate the workers for violations of the federal minimum wage laws and the Migrant and Seasonal Agricultural Worker Protection Act. The farmers had paid the workers between \$2.00 and \$2.35 per hour for their work at a time when the minimum wage was \$3.35 per hour, according to Judge Cummings' findings. Judge Cummings also found that the farmers violated the law by failing to give worker an itemized pay statement for each pay period worked,

The four farmers were further ordered to pay the workers' attorney fees and courtcosts. The workers were represented by Texas Rural Legal Ald of Plainview and Hereford, Texas.

In the same lawsuit, Judge Cummings decided that other defendant/farmers were not li-

able for their viciations of the minimum wage and Agricultural Worker Protection Act laws. The workers will be appealing this part of the judgment.

"Over one hundred workers from across the state of Texas who stoud up for their rights will each received hundreds of dollars as a result of this judgment," said Texas Rural Legal Aid attorney Kay E. Mares. "Their employers must now pay for violating the workers' rights."

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

Black Organizations Must Remain Autonmous

When Black institutions can't speak out and act out in the best interest of the masses of Black people they are powerless

When such institutions must humble themselves to lite dictates of the establishment, the politics of the Black community becomes, but a side show, a ministrel show perhaps in a three

Not only must we guard against this, but have a responsibility. No more, an obligation to prevent this from happening.

Black community organizations such as the Church, NAACP, and others -- both political, economic and civic -- must maintain their dignified autonomy.

Perhaps the most effective and popular way to control the aspirations of any people is to control their institutions. A way to do this is to be able to apply pressure, economic pressure mainly on its leaders.



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
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The Outreach Prayer Breakfast

Someone has said that mountains are nature'ss monuments. They are like the islands that are separated and like them that give asylum from a noisy and irreverent world. Some of the most noblest thoughts, and the most memorable incidents which variegate human history evolved from a Patmos-like seclusion.

His close disciples followed Him there, not realizing that His frequent predictions of His suffering and death were about to be fulfilled. Jesus took His inner circle of disciples: Peter, James, and John a little distance away from the other eight disciples. He became vwery agitated and sorrowful, claiming that His soul was exceeding sorrowful, even unto death. He told them to stay where they were and watch. He went a stone's throw away, where He knelt down and prayed alone. His soul struggled against the horrors He would face on the cross. He knew that He must die soon as God's sacrificial Lamb to take away the sins of the world.

It has been said many times that real battle to redeem our souls was fought and won that night in the Gaden of Gethsemane. For once Jesus had yielded to the will of God. He was able to rise from prayer in power and obedience to face the cross.
