Quincy White Named Executive Director, LBCE

Economic Development Key To East Lubbock



Quincy White Executive Director LBCE

"The key to get the East Lubbock community in a more positive posture in the future will be the efforts of enonomic development," says Quincy White, newly Executive Diractor of the Lubbock Black Chamber of Entreprenuers,

White, who took over the post February 1, 1992, replaced Eddie P. Richardson, who was founder and execu-

tive director of LBCE.

A 1965 graduate of Dunbar High School, White is "happy" over the presentation of the first annual "Theodore Phea, Jr. Awards Banquet' last Saturday night at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center Banquet Floom where more than 200 people were in attendance.

However, he says, "A tre-

mendous lesson has been gained from the first one, and everyone, from this year, will be much better," he made known.

"Actually, we had nothing to

measure this one (banquet) this year, but future ones will be much better," continued

At the firs, awards banquet, two African-American young ladies were awarded \$2,000 scholarship each.

They were Christina Miller, a senior at Coronado High School, and Stephanie Stevens, a 1991 graduate of Dunbar-Struggs High School and freshman student at Texas Tech University, where sho is majoring in computer science.

Vernell Sturns, executive director of the Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, was the guest speaker. He is one of four African-Americans who holds such a post in these United States.

With this annual effort, "We would like to keep Mr. Phea's philisophy in our minds, and keep his name alive by helping

young people," said White. A native of Lubbock, Texas, J White has been employed by Xerox, Inc. from 1977 to 1984; and was a consultant for the Enterprise Advisory Services. a Black teachers recruitment program in Houston, Texas. He moved back home in the fall of 1990, and was employed by the Drug Elimination Program as its director. This program is sponsored by the Lubback Housing Authority.

White has made it known to the Board of Directors of LBCE of his pressing goals. Among them are: (1) Membership, i. e. individual and corporation; and (2) Unemploy-

"With a special effort on dealing with unemployment, by visiting with local businesses.

we will need to develop a method on how to teach our young people how to fill out applications, and how to develop a resume. Also, of importance, is the need to teach

our young people good hygiene practices, if they would like to work in the job markat." he continued.

Perhaps one of White's goals is the development of Junior Black Chamber of Entreprenuers, Inc., young people in junior high through high school. Unless we take the time to develop this process, the future of LBCE will be limited. As our kids won't have an opportunity to work in the free enterprise system," said White.

White, aside from these priorities, he wants to coordinate a program for LBCE to meet with all Airican-American organizations in Lubbock, and develop a community calandar. "In other words, LBCE needs to become a clearing house for all Black organizations. This, no doubt, would prevent organizations from having functions on the same day and time. It would help unify the Black community," he

LBCE was first funded with \$18,000 from the City of Lubbock; followed through funding until September 31, 1992 for \$45,000.

LBCE, along with COMA and the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, has given notice that LBCE will no longer seek city funding. He said it takes approximate-

ly \$125,000 to run a successful program at LBCE. "Therefore, we (LBCE) need to contact as many foundations as possible as well as corporate America to raise funds. Of course, we will be competiting with other economic development programs and offering a positive service locally. We have something to offer. and we are very good in what we do. We just want to work with everyone and for the betterment of Lubbock," concluded White.

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

The Arkansas Development Finance Authority (AFDA) is headed by a Black Arkansan who was formerly Governor Clinton's economic devlopment adviser. That state agency, with \$2 billion in

assets, assisted with 1.5 million in financing for J&M Products in North Little Rock, a mafor Black hair care products company. Thirteen percent of the homes financed under the agency's single family housing program have been for minori-

By now, most people know that Ms. Williams entered the history books when she became the first Black woman to be crowned Miss America in 1983. At the time of the pageant, she was a musical theatre major at Syracause University. However, six months before her reign was to have ended, she was forced to relinquish her crown. The ensuing acandal almost ruined her career and the following years were exceptionally difficult. But the former beauty queen didn't run and hide then, and she's not about to start hiding now,

Miss Williams has come back strong. Unlike others, former Miss America who has gone on to sell home permanents, or host morning talk shows. Ms. Williams is the only one to have earned a gold record for her first album - 'The Right Stuff',

Even after landing featured roles insuch films as "The Pick Up Artist," and "Another You," "Harley Davidson," and the "Marlbrough Man," and putting in a slint as host of cable VH-1's The Soul of Putting."

Ms. Williams finds she still has to work hard to earn some people respecat. But, it's OK "I don't think I'll ever stop feeling that I have to keep providing myself to other people, and its really alright because it just makes me work harder. And I'm always up for a good challenge," she said during a recent interview with Clarence A. Moore of Black Excellence Magazine recently.

The picture in Jo'n 10:1-5 which described the forming of the messisaic flock and its departure from the theocratic fold was a morning scene.
