### Quincy White Named Executive Director, LBCE Economic Development Key To East Lubbock

"The key to get the East Lubbock community in a more positive posture in the future will be the efforts of economic development," says Quincy White, newly Executive Director of the Lubbock Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Inc.

White, who took over the post February 1, 1992, replaced Eddie P. Richardson, who was founder and executive director of LBCE.

A 1965 graduate of Dunbar High School, White is "happy" over the presentation of the first annual "Theodore Phea, Jr. Awards Banquet" last Saturday night at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center Banquet Room where more than 200 people were in attendance.

However, he says, "A tremendous lesson has been gained from the first one, and everyone, from this year, will be much better," he made known.

"Actually, we had nothing to

measure this one (banquet) this year, but future ones will be much better," continued White.

At the first awards banquet, two African-American young ladies were awarded \$2,000 scholarship each.

They were Christina Miller, a senior at Coronado High School, and Stephanie Stevens, a 1991 graduate of Dunbar-Struggs High School and freshman student at Texas Tech University, where she is majoring in computer science.

Vernell Sturns, executive director of the Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, was the guest speaker. He is one of four African-Americans who holds such a post in these United States.

With this annual effort, "We would like to keep Mr. Phea's philosophy in our minds, and keep his name alive by helping young people," said White.

A native of Lubbock, Texas, White has been employed by Xerox, Inc. from 1977 to 1984; and was a consultant for the Enterprise Advisory Services, a Black teachers recruitment program in Houston, Texas. He moved back home in the fall of 1990, and was employed by the Drug Elimination Program as its director. This program is sponsored by the Lubbock Housing Authority.

White has made it known to the Board of Directors of LBCE of his pressing goals. Among them are: (1) Membership, i.e. individual and corporation; and (2) Unemployment.

"With a special effort on dealing with unemployment, by visiting with local businesses,

we will need to develop a method on how to teach our young people how to fill out job applications, and how to develop a resume. Also, of importance, is the need to teach

our young people good hygiene practices, if they would like to work in the job market," he continued.

Perhaps one of White's goals is the development of Junior Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Inc., young people in junior high through high school. Unless we take the time to develop this process, the future of LBCE will be limited. As our kids won't have an opportunity to work in the free enterprise system," said White.

White, aside from these priorities, he wants to coordinate a program for LBCE to meet with all African-American organizations in Lubbock, and develop a community calendar. "In other words, LBCE needs to become a clearing house for all Black organizations. This, no doubt, would prevent organizations from having functions on the same day and time. It would help unify the Black community," he said.

LBCE was first funded with \$18,000 from the City of Lubbock; followed through funding until September 31, 1992 for \$45,000.

LBCE, along with COMA and the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, has given notice that LBCE will no longer seek city funding.

He said it takes approximately \$125,000 to run a successful program at LBCE.

"Therefore, we (LBCE) need to contact as many foundations as possible as well as corporate America to raise funds. Of course, we will be competing with other economic development programs and offering a positive service locally. We have something to offer, and we are very good in what we do. We just want to work with everyone and for the betterment of Lubbock," concluded White.

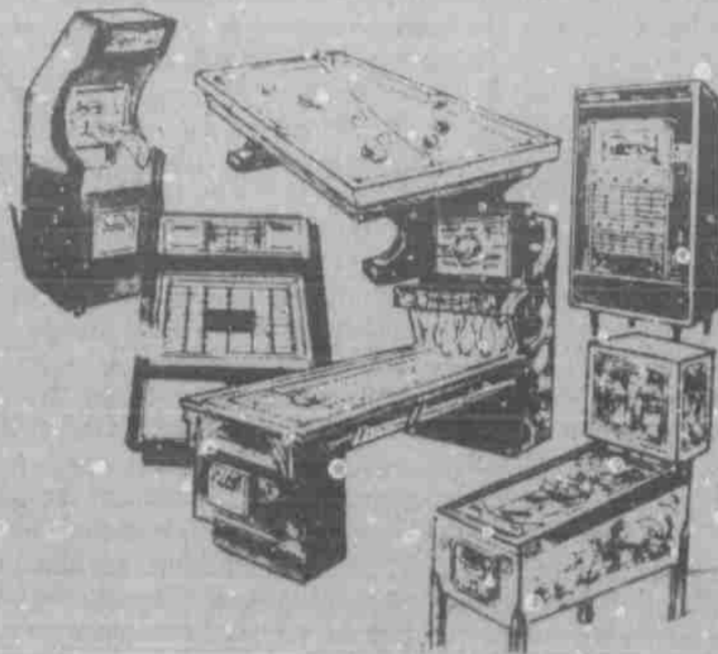

## Texas African-Americans Should Be With Bill Clinton On Super Tuesday

The 1990's hold great potential for African-American empowerment and advancement both politically and economically. The power to achieve this goal is in our own hands. But we must exercise that power and vote. Only through involvement can make a difference.

As the 1992 political season moves forward, we have an opportunity to lay another building block in the foundation for our continued progress and empowerment. To ensure our continued as-

ension, we must be a major factor in the Super Tuesday primary. To do so requires concentrated power. This means we must select a candidate and support him wholeheartedly. The Arkansas Development Finance Authority (AFDA) is headed by a Black Arkansan who was formerly Governor Clinton's economic development adviser. That state agency, with \$2 billion in assets, assisted with 1.5 million in financing for J&M Products in North Little Rock, a major Black hair care products company. Thirteen percent of the homes financed under the agency's single family housing program have been for minorities.

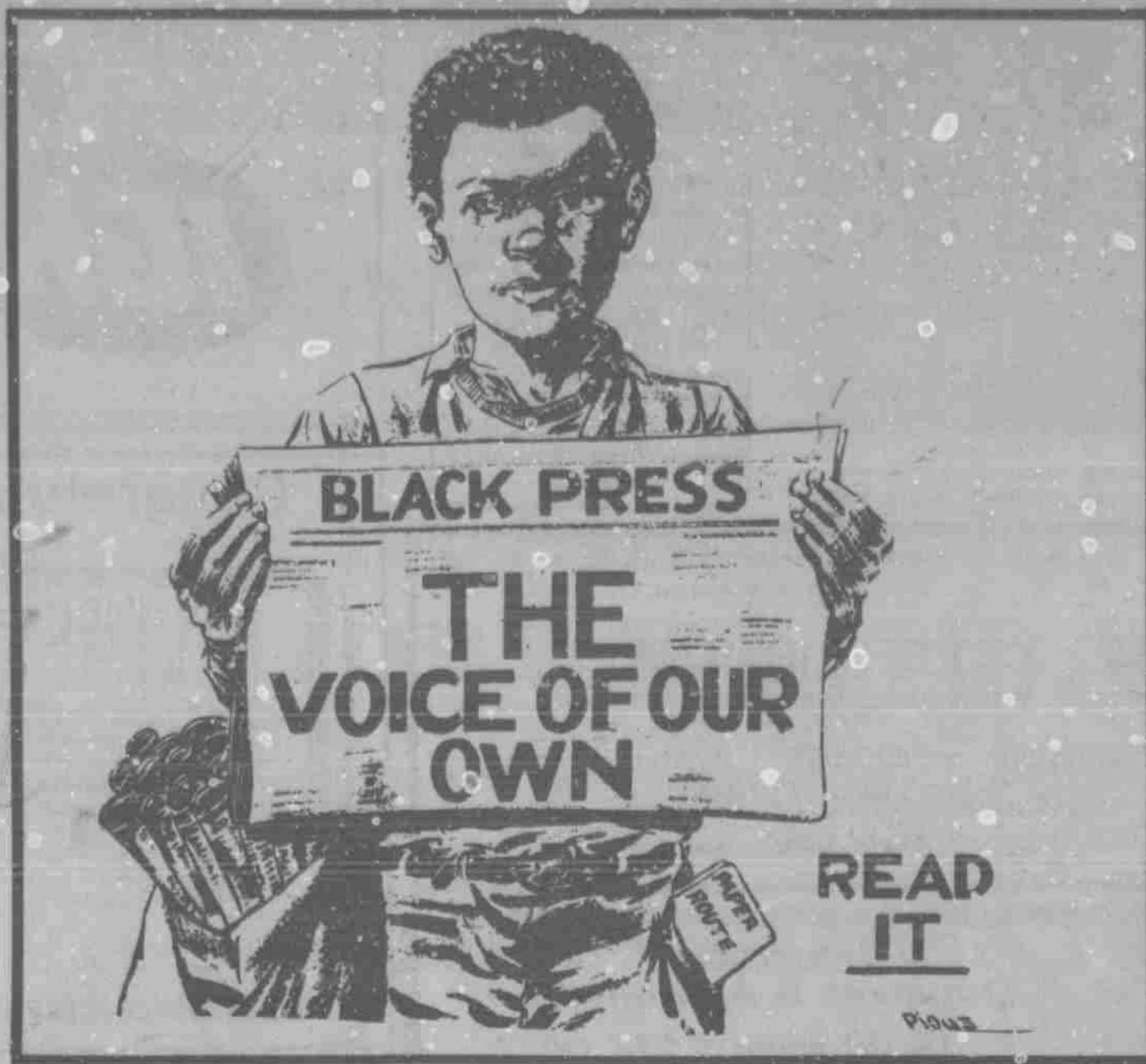
For most of Governor Clinton's tenure, three of his top six cabinet members were Black Arkansans -- Health Department Director, Department of Human Services Director, and Department of Finance and Administration Director.

Governor Clinton's appointment of Black Arkansans to state judicial posts outnumber those of all previous Arkansas governors. He has appointed four Black juvenile court judges, two Black court of appeals judges, two Black state Supreme Court judges, and a number of trial court judges.

Governor Clinton has said time and again that he believes in a future "that will be based on opportunity for all," and his actions have shown that his commitment in this regard goes beyond mere

words.

Governor Clinton wants to "re-invent" government in America and establish "a New Covenant for economic change". By supporting Governor Clinton, we give ourselves the opportunity to assist in "reinventing" a govern-



## Vanessa Williams Has Come Back Strong!!

From the first Black Miss America to resignation and disgrace. The past few years have certainly been eventful ones for Vanessa Williams, the 28 year old singing actress who grew up in Millwood, N. Y., the daughter of parents who were both educators.

By now, most people know that Ms. Williams entered the history books when she became the first Black woman to be crowned Miss America in 1983. At the time of the pageant, she was a musical theatre major at Syracuse University. However, six months before her reign was to have ended, she was forced to relinquish her crown. The ensuing scandal almost ruined her career and the following years were exceptionally difficult. But the former beauty queen didn't run and hide then, and she's not about to start hiding now.

Miss Williams has come back strong. Unlike others, former Miss America who has gone on to sell home permanents, or host morning talk shows, Ms. Williams is the only one to have earned a gold record for her first album -- "The Right Stuff".

Even after landing featured roles in such films as "The Pick Up Artist," and "Another You," "Harley Davidson," and the "Marlborough Man," and putting in a stint as host of cable VH-1's "The Soul of Putting."

Ms. Williams finds she still has to work hard to earn some people respect. But, it's OK "I don't think I'll ever stop feeling that I have to keep providing myself to other people, and it's really alright because it just makes me work harder. And I'm always up for a good challenge," she said during a recent interview with Clarence A. Moore of Black Excellence Magazine recently.

Wing Records released her second album, "The Comfort Zone," a mixture of lushly produced ballads and funky dance tunes. Ms. Williams' impressive vocals are the records' strongest asset, because she sounds much more confident than she did on "The Right Stuff." In fact, "The Comfort Zone," garnered a rave review from Entertainment Weekly Magazine. Considering what she's been through, one might be tempted to suggest that the title of her new album also describe how she feels about her career and her personal life which includes being both wife and mother.

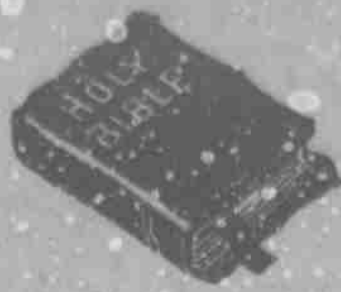

To those of you who are not feeling well, God loves you. You're not alone. Trust him; he wants you well!

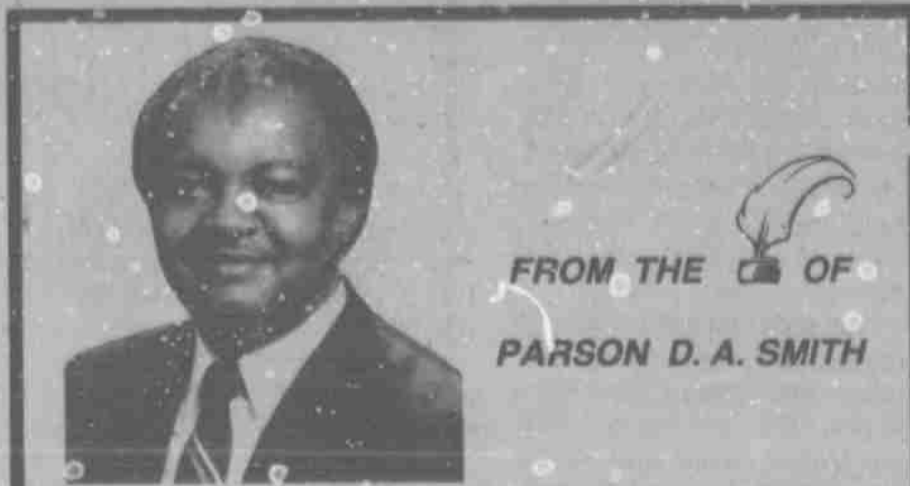
Read Mark 11:22-26; II Chronicles 7:14. He not only wants you well, but this world should go by the rules laid out in his word.

PARSON D. A. SMITH

"I am the door of the sheep." John 10:7.  
"I am the door; by me if any man enter in he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture." John 10:9.

The picture in John 10:1-5 which described the forming of the messianic flock and its departure from the theocratic fold was a morning scene. This which describes the life of the flock when formed and led by Jesus is taken from a scene at midday. The sheep go at will in and out of a fold situated in the midst of the pasture. When the sheep desire shelter they enter the fold; when hunger urges them they leave the fold for the door was always open. Two essentials to the prosperity of the flock were realized through the door: safety and a relative degree of plentifulness.

In this new image the shepherd disappears and the door become the object which plays the primary part. The fold no longer represents the ancient covenant but Jesus' salvation and that complete happiness which believers who have accepted Him enjoy. In the former parable, God caused the porter to open the door to the shepherd; in this Jesus Himself is to His sheep the door of a constant and daily salvation.

In our present age we find that people go through the wrong doors seeking the meaning and significance of life. Their pursuits and in frustration, Jesus is the only access into the fold of genuine personhood and being. He is the door of salvation. He opens the way to God in a unique manner.

Trial, tribulation, and threats will come our way. The security come by the continued presence of Jesus who is the door.
