"In Opposition With L'SD's 5-2 Plan" Local Attorneys Submit Memorandum And Exhibits To The Justice Department!

The Southwest Digest learned this week that attorneys, including Maria Luisa Mercado and Daniel H. Benson, both local attorneys, submitted a memorandum and accompanying exhibits to Susanna Lorenzo-Giguere, Voting Rights Section, Civil Rights Division of the United States Department of Justice.

Their package, which was dated June 14, 1993, gave comments on Lubbock independent School District 5-2 Redistricting Plan Precleara.ce Submission. In this, they commented on this plan which was submitted by LISD Board of Trustees on May 18, 1993.

In their memorandum, these attorneys came up with the following conclusion: "For the foregoing reasons, we respectifully urge the Department of Justice to deny, again, Section 5 preclearance to the submitted 5-2 plan of the Lubbock Independent School Cistrict, and approve only a plan consisting of seven singlemember districts, like that offared in Appendix C. signed by the following citizens: Jesus Cavazos, LULAC No. 281; Julia Carrillo, Women's GI Forum; Inna Guerreo, Hispanic Women's Organization; Yolanda Guerro, Mexican American Democrats; Kathyl Anderson; LaLa Cavazos, Lubbock Economic Advancement and Development; Pete Garza, Amorican GI Forum; Emilio E.
