"The Will To Live"

It was September of 1991 -- at the age of 4 years -- when Latasha Harris was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor called Retinoblastoma which caused her to lose her right eye.

A year later -- on September 5, 1992 -- she was diagnosed with a massive tumor called neuroblastoma which lied in the center of her chest, attaching itself to the heart, lungs, left jaw bone and around the spinal cord.

She had to have surgery immediately to remove the tumor that was destroying her body.

After surgery, her prognosis didn't look good, according to the doctors. But Latasha and her parents knew another doctor they could call on. She was given a 10% chance of survival with or without treatments.

Radiation and massive doses of Chemotherapy treatment was given. But when the doctors said no, "Jesus" said yes.

Today, Latasha is cancer free. Thanks to the doctors and nurses at University Medical Center who did all they knew to do and more to save Latasha's life.

Her hopes and dreams are to one day become a doctor to find a cure to cancer.

Latasha was unable to attend public school this past year, but she looks forward to attending this coming school

Schools Open August 23rd

August is a time of the year when summer vacations are winding up for students and their parents. Thousands of students are looking forward to returning to classes in the Lubbock Independent School District Monday, August 23.

Most students have been pre-registered, including students who are moving from elementary to junior high and from junior high to senior high levels. Students who are new to LISD or who have moved into a different attendance zone since last spring are asked to register on Monday, August 16, unless they have already pre-registered.

There will be 40 elementary, 10 junior high, and four senior high campuses. In addition, there will be campuses for special programs -- Ballenger-Head Start, New Directions (Struggs facility), and Project Intercept.

The student holidays will begin with a long weekend Friday, September 3, as a staff development day for teachers and Monday, September 6 as a holiday for both students and staff members. Besides Sep-

tember 3, the extra student holidays dates are October 11, January 14, and 17, February 11, and April 18.

Parents or students who are enrolling new to LISD are asked to bring the records that were provided when the students withdrew from their last school. Immunization records and birth certificates or other proof of age are needed for early childhood, prekindergarten, kindergarten, and first grade pupils. Proof of residency for new students is needed and may be done through a utility bill (gas, electric, or water) or through a notarized statement in special circumstances.

Students who are five years old on or before September 1 should enroll in kindergarten. Students who are six years old on or before September 1 should enroll in first grade.

Many teachers, principals and other administrators, counselors, librarians, nurses, secretaries, paraprofessionals, teaching assistants, and non-

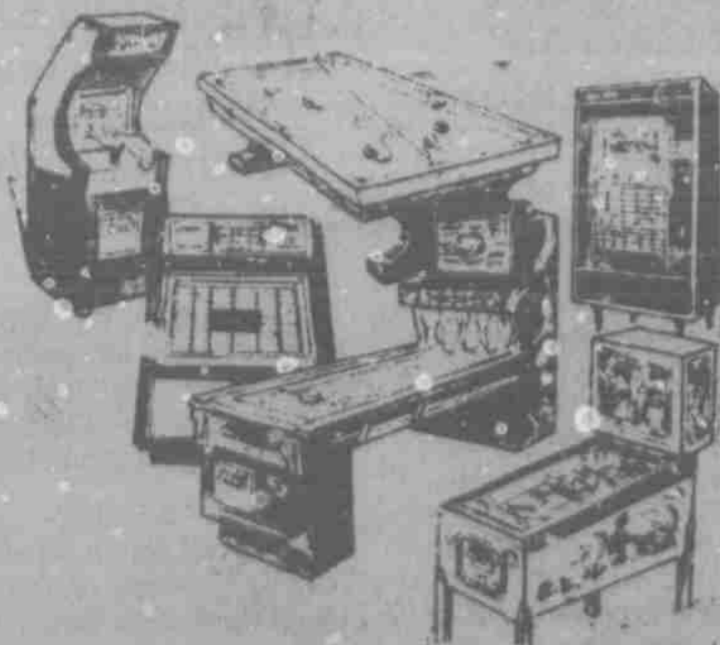

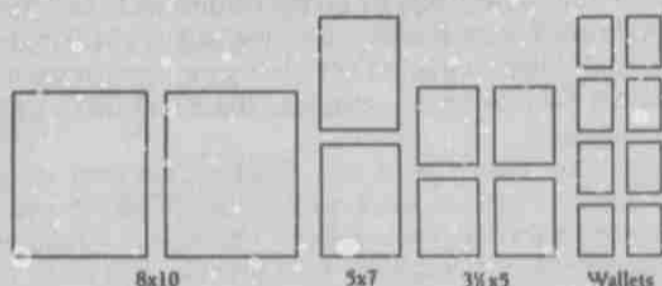

For Us To Make It, We All Have To Do Our Share!

Anyone who has any knowledge of Theodore Phea, Jr. and the Boys Club knows he had a reputation of helping a lot of young boys who could have not made it. He helped them, with the help of God, to make it.

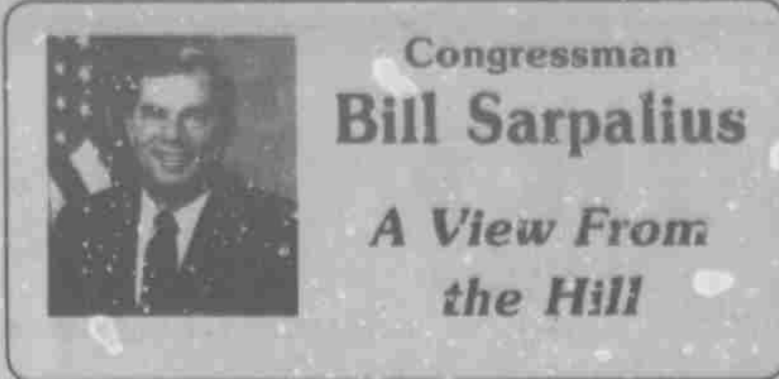

THE TOWN HALL MEETING

The room is packed full of people from all different backgrounds, but none of that matters, because they are all there for one reason. Actually, they each have their own reason for coming. Mary, over in the corner, wants to know what is happening with Social Security. John — right there in the front row — well, he came to this event to talk about the compromise regarding gays in the military. And Sally, she needs to find out how long it is going to be before something is done with health care.

While most people attending my town hall meetings come to ask questions, they also come to give me their opinions, and that's exactly what I want. As I have said many times, I was elected to represent the people of the 13th Congressional District in Texas, and I can't do that job without knowing how my constituents feel.

I get a good idea of what issues are important to the people in the 13th District through letters and phone calls that I receive daily. But the times when I get the best feel of what really matters to my constituents is during town hall meetings. Nothing can equal the amount of information I receive when my constituents and I just sit down together and talk.

During a two week period in August, I will travel all across my district conducting several town hall meetings every day. Because the district extends from the top of the Panhandle

down to Lubbock and over to Wichita Falls and Denton, it is impossible for me to schedule meetings in every town. But I will try very hard to make sure anyone in the district is able to find a meeting being held in a town close by.

For those of you who have never attended one of my town hall meetings, this is the perfect time for you to try one out. Even if you don't have anything you want to talk about, it's very interesting to find out what issues are important to the people in your area.

Some of you I have attended every town hall meeting I have ever had in your community, and it is always a delight to see you again. Many times over the years, I have depended on you to keep me updated on the pulse of the community.

Since the beginning of the 103rd Congress, we have passed and the President has signed the Family and Medical Leave Act and the Motor Voter bill. The House has passed appropriations bills that contain funds for several water projects across the 13th District, funds for military construction at Sheppard Air Force Base, and funds for food and nutrition programs for low income families.

I have sponsored four bills in this Congress, the latest of which was filed only weeks ago. That is a bill that would allow the Environmental Protection Agency to exempt certain small landfills from new groundwater monitoring requirements. Other legislation I have sponsored includes a bill to repeal the national maximum speed limit, a bill to cancel the interest on the Helium Program debt, and a bill to raise the \$50 threshold to \$245 per quarter for payment of Social Security taxes for domestic service in a private home.

I have had over 500 town hall meetings since I was elected to Congress. I strongly believe in representative government. You hired me to be your representative, your voice, your vote in Washington, D.C. I cannot effectively represent you sitting behind a desk. I have tried to make myself accessible so that I can learn what is on your mind regarding the issues we in Congress have to deal with. So come on out to one of my town hall meetings, and let's talk about taxes, health care, social security, foreign aid, agriculture, energy, education, and your government. I look forward to seeing you.

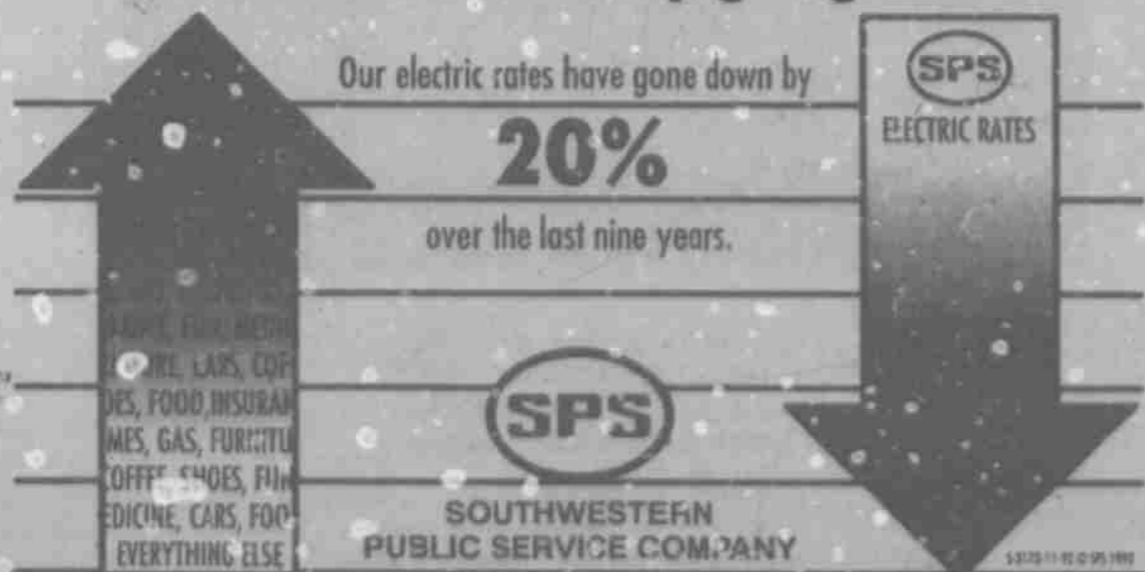

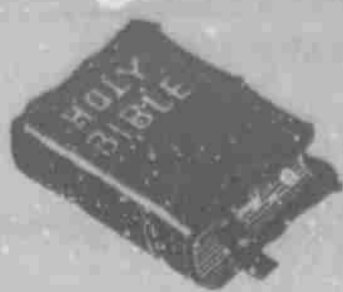

What's Wrong With Our World?

If it's enough to have the Fourth Reich Skinheads and the White Aryan Resistance groups that plot to bomb a church congregation and spray machine-gun fire while preaching racial hatred turn to the local: in our city that is attacking the church. Ya'll guess what? It ain't no Skinheads, no Klu Klux Klan, or White Aryan Resistance groups.

The Board of Directors of the Lubbock Black Chamber submitted a letter to the editor of the Southwest Digest that was published in the Thursday, August 5, 1993 edition on page 4 that makes allegations and allegedly upbraids, rebuke, criticize, dressdown, and discipline the 52 or more black churches in Lubbock.

Usually I ignore this kind of rhetorical refuse and charge it to one's ignorance. But in this case the letter is submitted by a supposedly fairly intelligent group. However, when one reads this letter it gives the suppositious impression that the Lubbock Black Chamber Board of Directors know what they are talking about.

One of the statements that "chap my hide" and cause me to question the group's "financial intelligence quotient" as well as their political and spiritual intelligentsia was "The PROBLEMS we face as BLACKS are PROBLEMS we as BLACKS created, therefore, BLACKS must resolve those PROBLEMS with the RESOURCES available to US. That resource is the Black CHURCH, not Black ministers, the church, which is the CONGREGATION!"

The statement at first seem prima facie but, fuller investigation reveals that the group may be prima donna in their relationship toward the church and black ministers. And Ernest Newman said of *prima donna*: "It is merely tone and technique without intelligence."

In one of Eddie Murphy's movies he declares to a group of cowboys that their world would be changed because there was "a new sheriff in town." This was fictional. But to the Board of Directors of the Lubbock Black Chamber and all other groups that would attack the Church and black ministers, there is a *new sheriff* in town. He was elected July 29, 1993. Some of you have already been busted and you have an appointment with the court in "glory." You are in trouble! You are not equipped to represent yourselves in the supreme court of the soul. Your money AIN'T big enough. But that black minister who you don't count as much can recommend and get you in touch with adequate counsel in the Holy Ghost, heaven's court appointed Advocate.

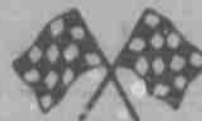
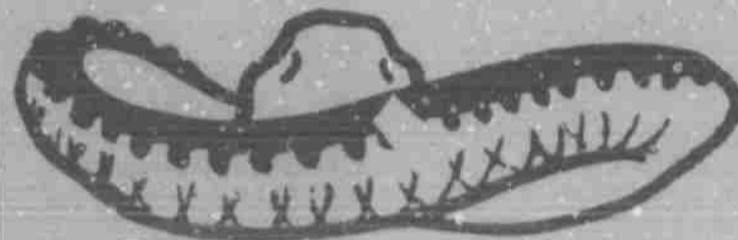
