Know Your City Government

This is the third in a series of articles about our city's government.

The City of Lubbock operates under the Council-Manager form of government, the same as more than 250 cities in the state. The City Council is the city's legislative body made up of a Mayor and six Council members elected by the citizens of Lubbock.

The Mayor is elected "at-large", while each council member is elected to a specific district within the city. Council members serve four-year terms. The Mayor is elected to a two-year term.

This week's article focuses on the duties of the six Council members. Our Council members include: Mayor Pro Tem Maggie Trejo representing District One; T. J. Patterson, District Two; M. J. "Bud" Aderton represents District Three; Max Ince, District Four; Randy Neugebauer, District Five; and Alex "Ty" Cook, District Six.

The duties of each Council member are spelled out in the City Charter. The Council enacts all ordinances and resolutions, and adopts all regulations. As the governing body of the City, the Council has all the powers and authority granted by the Charter. The Council has the duty of appointing the City Manager, City Secretary and the City Attorney, setting the salaries of appointed officers, and the Council may remove any of these officers at will.

The members of the Council elect a Mayor Pro Tempore from among its members. In the absence or disqualification of the Mayor and the Mayor Pro Tempore, the position of Mayor Pro Tempore shall be occupied by the Council member having the most seniority in service on the City Council.

The Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem, or any two of the Council members in the absence of the Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem, may call special meetings of the Council at any time deemed advisable. Regular meetings of the Council are currently held on the second and fourth Thursday of each month at City Hall, unless meetings at other times and locations are called with proper notification to the public. One example is the Council's decision to recess their regular meeting August 27, after conducting their normal business in the morning hours, and reconvene at 5:30 p. m. in the Council Chambers for a public hearing on the City budget. The Council is required by Charter to meet at least twice each month.

It is the Council's responsibility to set the direction of the City through developing policies, such as land use and the way departments deliver services. Their role as representatives of the citizens is to set the agenda for City business which in turn is to be carried out by the City Manager.

Any four Council members constitutes a quorum for the transaction of any business, and the affirmative vote of any four Council members shall be sufficient and necessary to adopt or repeal any Ordinance or Resolution. All members of the Council, including the Mayor, shall vote upon every question, Ordinance or Resolution. Not more than one Council member may be excused from voting by a vote of the other six members. Any Council member refusing to vote unless so excused shall be entered on the journal as voting in the affirmative. Ordinances must receive two separate readings and votes before they become effective, unless an Ordinance is declared an emergency. An emergency measure is an Ordinance or Resolution for the immediate preservation of the public peace, property, health or safety, or providing the usual daily operation of a municipal department, in which the emergency is set forth and defined in a preamble thereto.

The Council is charged with keeping a journal of its proceedings

in a permanently bound book and any citizen has access to these minutes and records at all reasonable times.

The charter deals with the subject of nepotism. No person related to the Mayor or any of the Council members shall be appointed to any office, position, clerkship or service of the City within the second degree of relationship by marriage, or within the third degree of a blood relationship.

Compensation to the Mayor is \$900 per year, which equals \$75 a month. Other Council members receive compensation of \$25 a month.

The City Council's relationship with the City Manager and City Staff is very specific in the City Charter. The Council shall hold the City Manager responsible for the proper administration of all affairs of the City. The Council cannot dictate the appointments of employees, but Council members may make inquiries of staff. However, it is the responsibility of the City Manager to provide direction and instruction to the staff.

The Mayor and each Council member must be a resident citizen of the City of Lubbock. Council members must live within the applicable District at the time of filing for office and must continue to reside within the City and the applicable District during the term of office. The Mayor and Council members shall not be indebted to the City and shall not be interested in the profits or emoluments of any contract, job, work or service for the City, or interested in the sale to the City of any supplies, equipment, material or articles purchased.

The Council relies heavily on the input of citizen members of more than 30 boards and commissions. The Council has taken the initiative to get more citizens involved in City government. In July they appointed a 15-member Board and Commission Advisory Committee to help provide the Council with the names of qualified and interested citizens for upcoming appointments to more than 30 boards and commissions.

"Comments From Supt. Moses"

Dear Editor:

It was with interest that I read the article in the Thursday, August 20, 1992, edition of the Southwest Digest regarding the attempt of certain schools in our district to recruit Dunbar/Estacado athletes. Unfortunately, the article does contain fallacies which I would like to address.

First, it is alleged that coaches from Monterey and Coronado High Schools were coercing athletes from the Estacado and Dunbar areas to come to their respective schools. According to the University Scholastic League rules, it is against UIL rules to recruit any athlete from one district to another for athletic purposes. Any coach or administrator in this school district would be extremely foolish, and certainly risk their employment, to blatantly recruit an athlete to another school.

Before this article even appeared, the director of athletics and I met with the five head coaches to remind them that we simply could not allow this in our school system. As all five of these head coaches work together and assist one another whenever possible, they were in complete agreement. I also might add that I am very proud and pleased of the integrity which is displayed by each of these individuals toward their schools and toward one another.

The article stated, "There are those of us who said that athletics was the reorganization of Dunbar in the first place." My feelings of compassion for Dunbar are sincere, but our reorganization plan was to fully utilize all of our secondary buildings. The reason Dunbar was changed to a junior high facility was due to the fact that the enrollment was low and the building was under-

utilized.

This year, students from the tenth grade, who previously would have attended Dunbar, were to attend either Estacado or Monterey. This decision was made by virtue of the new attendance boundary which has been established for these schools. There is no option for the students living in the Monterey attendance area. However, students living in the Estacado attendance area could attend either Monterey or Coronado, based on the district's majority-to-minority transfer policy. This has been in existence for some time and it is consistent with the court-ordered desegregation plan which the district operated for many years.

The decision for all tenth grade students to move on to Estacado from Dunbar this year was made after considering many factors. Basically, the school district felt it would do the students an injustice to start at Dunbar, knowing the following year they would have to make the transition to another high school. We have students from Alcorn attendance area in our TAAP program at Irons Junior High. Many of these students return to the Alcorn Junior High attendance area after they have successfully completed the TAAP program. On the other hand, there are some who request and are granted majority-to-minority transfers to either attend Coronado or Monterey. These students are not recruited for athletic reasons, but are allowed to transfer based upon the previous court ordered desegregation plan.

It is not my desire, nor the desire of anyone in our school district, to unfairly put any high school at an advantage or a disadvantage. The athletic programs throughout this community have rich traditions and this will continue. However, I also would like to remind if I did not point out that the primary reason for our existence is to ensure the academic achievement and educational progress of our students. That remains the first priority of this school system.

If any individual would come forth with the names of coaches, administrators, other school personnel, or business people, who have allegedly coerced and confused minority athletes and their parents into securing transfers at Coronado and Monterey High Schools, we will do a thorough investigation to verify or reject those accusations. We would welcome any individual to come and visit Mr. John Washington or Mr. Greg Sherwood with regard to these specific concerns.

Finally, your newspaper has been kind enough to acknowledge our efforts to try to provide equal opportunities for all students. Recently, you recognized our work in securing funding for a history class taught at Lubbock High School by Ms. Gloria Carter. This class consisted primarily of African-American students. There was a desire on the part of this teacher to have these students visit traditional Black colleges and universities during last year's spring break. This office in cooperation with other individuals worked to secure the funds to allow students to make this trip. This is essentially because we want all our students to be able to achieve and succeed.

We want no less for our student athletes. We know it is very important that we take special care with both students and athletes who will be in transition from Dunbar-Struggs High School to Estacado High School and Monterey High School. We have encouraged principals and coaches to all they can to embrace these young people into their programs and make them feel welcome. We will provide transportation this spring to any of these students while they are completing their high school studies at Dunbar-Struggs.

It is our intention to do all we can to facilitate a smooth introduction of Dunbar-Struggs students into our programs at Estacado and Monterey. This is not a subject which has been neglected; in fact, it is one to which we remain very sensitive. We want all the students who will be entering either of these high schools to be successful and realize their maximum potential. It is our intention to do all we can to achieve that result. Your interest is appreciated.

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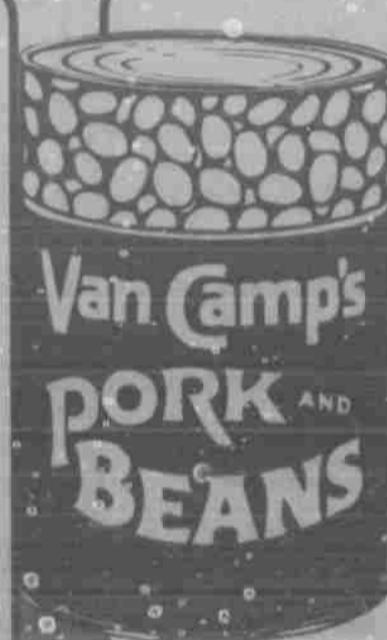
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
