## Lubbock Attorney Claims Lubbock Judge Calls Blacks: "Nigs"

While racist ethnic statements are not uncommon in the Lubbock County Courthouse, according to several lawyers interviewed by El Editor, the recent statement allegedly made by District Judge Thomas L. Clinton has caused ripples from Lubbock to Austin.

The statement that is drawing Statewide attention claim that Judge Clinton recently made statements referring to Attorney General Dan Morales as "that Mexican Attorney General".

Judge Clinton after being called by El Editor denied that he had ever said the statements.

"I have never even met the Attorney General," said Clinton.

Sources, lawyers who preferred to remain anonymous because of fear of reprisals from the Judge, told El Editor that the Judge had referred to Morales as "that Mexican Attorney General," and had told George Noelke, a staff member of the Attorney General's office that "a lot of people don't like your boss and we're going to take him out of office".

According to the source Judge Clinton added that "they're trying to take over the courthouse."

Other sources had told El Editor that the Judge had said that "Mexicans were trying to take over the courthouse."

Victor Hernandez a member of the Mexican American Bar Association of Lubbock said that Judge Clinton was probably referring to the single member district issue on how to elect District Judges. "He is probably disturbed about the single member district suit filed by LULAC that we expect will change the way in which district judges are elected," said Hernandez.

"I would expect that our Association will talk about doing something about his racist remark and I hear that the Attorney General is also contemplating some type of action," stated Hernandez.

The President of the local Mexican American Bar Association David Martinez said that he had not heard of the incident and the Association had not met recently to consider any type of action. "I would expect the matter to be considered informally both here locally and would also expect it to be addressed at our State Convention in El Paso next week," said Martinez. Martinez said that the proper people to address the issue would probably be the Attorney General's office.

"I would certainly be offended if I had been addressed in the manner that Judge Clinton is accused of stating," said Martinez.

Lubbock attorney Carlton McLarty said that it didn't surprise him to hear about Judge Clinton's statement.

"He has personally referred to blacks as 'Nigs' in front of me, and it's commonly known that Judge Clinton does not like blacks, Hispanics and women attorneys. To me it only proves how out of touch the Judge is with reality," said McLarty.

McLarty's statements were echoed by attorney Mary Alice McLarty. "I have personally heard ethnic slurs from Judge Clinton. I feel these action by the Judge will bring into question the fairness of the Court any time you have a hispanic client before him." Republican Judge Thomas

Clinton will face Democrat attorney Ramon Gallegos in the November election.

Gallegos, also aware of the comments allegedly made, said that if the statements were actually made, "there should be a lot of people concerned, if the statement reflect how the Judge really feels."

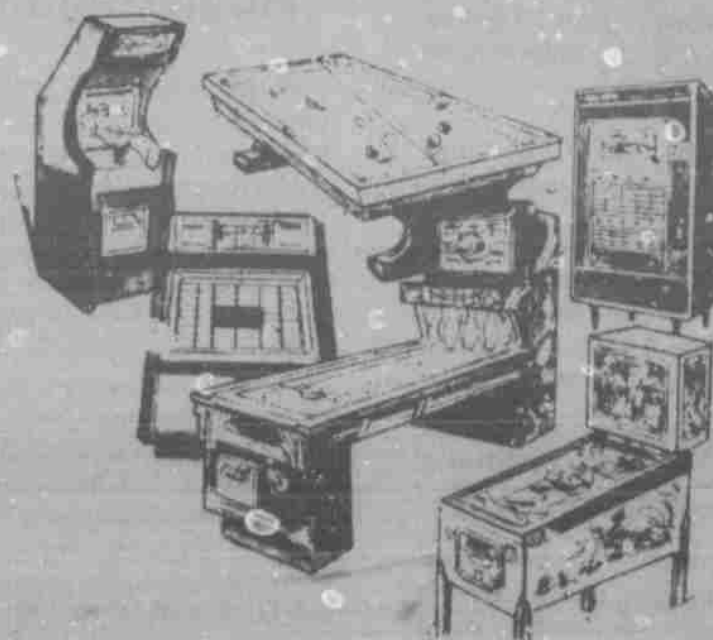

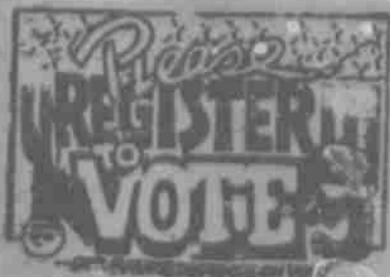

**DEAR DIALOGUE:** I'm trying to improve my eating habits. I save your tips on good food selection. Can you give more?  
LD, Elizabeth, N.J.

**DEAR LD:** Glad to oblige.

- When possible, choose fresh, rather than preserved or packaged foods.
- Eat whole grain products instead of refined.
- Eat at least five servings of fruits or vegetables every day. That's right, Five.
- Drink eight glasses of good quality water every day.
- Cut down on sugar in many ways in your meals.
- If you eat red meat—consider it a side dish, instead of the main serving of a meal. That is, reduce the size of your red meat portion.
- Select fish, poultry and legumes for their high protein value and low fat content.
- Avoid fried and fatty foods.
- Make a serious effort to consume the recommended amount of fiber every day.
- Learn to read labels on food packages, and start making good judgement about calories, sodium, cholesterol, vitamins, minerals, fiber, fat and preservatives.

**DEAR DIALOGUE:** Diabetes runs in my family but I don't think I have it so far. What are the symptoms?

**DEAR JJ:** More than 14 million Americans have diabetes mellitus and half of them don't even know they have it. Here are the symptoms: Excessive thirst; frequent urination; extreme fatigue; unexplained weight loss; blurry vision; constant hunger; tingling and numbness in hands and feet; urinary tract infections. Diabetes can lead to heart and kidney diseases, even blindness and death. Diagnosis by a doctor followed by proper treatment is essential to prevent health defying complications.

**DEAR DIALOGUE:** My mother has had to have all her teeth pulled, and I can't wait that to happen to me. How can I prevent... it?

**DEAR J.T.:** Could be, your mom never understood the basics of proper dental hygiene. Brushing your teeth at least twice a day and preferably after every meal and snack is where it begins. You must work the brush so as to reach between teeth and along the gum line. Use of dental floss, all the way to the teeth in the back, will remove food particles that add to the buildup of plaque, the bacteria-laden deposit that causes cavities and other tooth-threatening problems. If you can afford an electric tooth brush, give it a try. But avoid frequent snacks if you can, and if you can't, be sure to brush.

In the August 26th Lubbock Avalanche-Journal there was a column about George Bush's three boys written by Donald Kaul that bears repeating in part .... 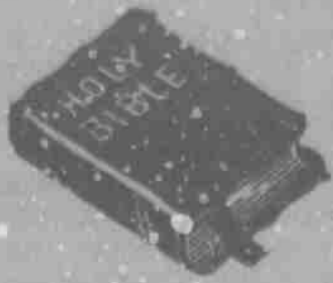

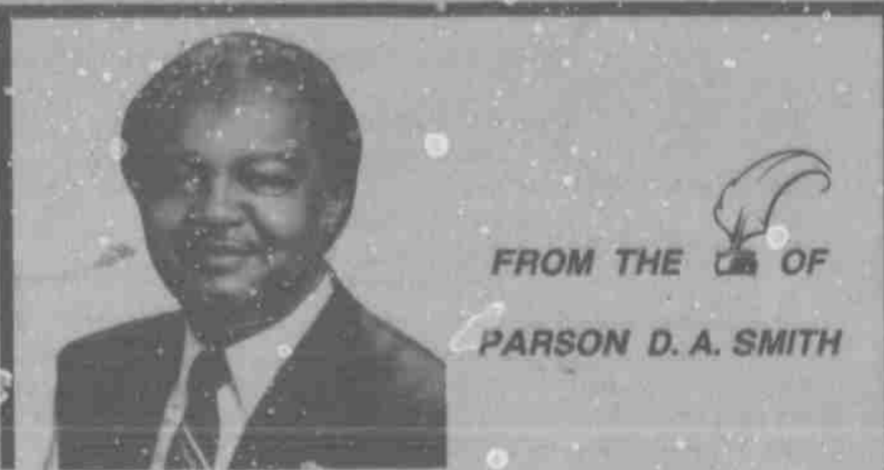

PARSON D. A. SMITH

Race hatred: "More than just ethnical hatred -- an intelligence and moral invalidism," Parson Smith.

This summer on the twenty-first day of July, I spoke with some of my kinfolk down in the southeast section of the state and they were jubilant over the way things were going in the neighboring town of Vidor, Texas.

These wonderful people informed me that the Presbyterian Church in Vidor, Texas had called a black minister. They had chosen a man who was a professor at Lamar University, a native of the area and very well acquainted with the racial conflict that had existed in Vidor and the surrounding area.

A great number of blacks converged upon this all-white city of nearly 10,000 population when the new pastor was installed. A large number of those who attended were members of the church I formerly served as pastor in Beaumont, Texas.

When I heard the news, I was stirred in a strange way. My memory bank recalled the day when I arrived as a new pastor in Beaumont, Texas and how the officers of the church warned me not to go across the Neches River are on any back road to Vidor, Texas without my "brothers" because of the hatred by whites for blacks. I could not help but remember when one of my ministerial colleagues from San Antonio, Texas come to visit in Beaumont and we travel to Lake Charles, Louisiana to eat "Paw Paw's" and on the return trip to Beaumont on Interstate 10, how we were dehumanized ethnically by the hate groups of Vidor over the CB Radio from Truck Stop. My memory focus on the many cross burning along Interstate 10 and how the news media would report and show these Ku Klux Klansmen in full regalia as if this was the way of life was meant to be. There was the thought of how these people would come across the Neches River to work in Beaumont and Port Arthur, Texas, sit down and break bread with blacks, and at night on the other side of the river their fangs of hate were shown like in a Dracula nightmare. Then the thought of the many churches in Vidor and how you could tell certain religious groups that professed to live free from sin and shame by the dress of the women who did not wear make-up and style their hair in a ball at the back or center of their head, but across the river they condone racial hatred.


When I stop reflecting I stated, "That's why the NAACP did not register at the State Board meeting in Lubbock. Things are going really well. But, 'Can a Leopard change his spots?'" I was quickly told that the community had made a U-Turn since I left in 1985. I said, "God bless you. I thank Him for having the sense to live in a place where people I. Q. is above 69."

I must call my friends for the Associate Press has reported that on Saturday, September 1992, the grand dragon of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, stated that they will conduct a rally on the courthouse steps of Orange County in protest of a U. S. District judge ordering of Vidor and other East Texas public housing

**Texas education system loses one child in five**

Although the dropout rate for 1990-91 was lower than in the previous school year, Texas still lost 21.2 percent of its school children at some point between the seventh grade and the senior year. The statewide annual dropout rate was 3.93 percent, but if figures are calculated over a six-year period, more than one-fifth of the seventh graders will drop out before finishing high school.
