## State News

### Strayhorn/Staples Property Tax 'Grace Period' Bill Gets Senate nod; on to the House

(AUSTIN)—The Texas State Senate voted unanimously for legislation encompassing Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn's recommendation to protect school districts from being caught short of funds when local tax appraisers fall short in their property tax assessments. It will now move for consideration to the State House of Representatives.

"I have vowed to be the education watchdog for the people of Texas and to drive more of every education dollar directly into the classroom," Strayhorn said. "With this bill, we're protecting the education of our most valuable resource—our children."

"I applaud the Senate for ensuring that students aren't penalized when local assessment authorities don't do their jobs properly."

Under current law, annual state reviews that discover under valuation by local assessment authorities can result in significant loss in state support for local school districts.

The bill passed by the Senate, authored by Senator Todd Staples, R-Palestine, would create a "grace period" for districts caught by these discrepancies between local taxing assessments and the annual state reviews.

Additionally, the bill holds appraisal districts accountable for their work and provides greater funding equity.

"Senate Bill 671 will bring much needed relief to school districts, while increasing accountability to the appraisal districts," Staples said.

## from the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith "A Simple Word to Black Males"

For a couple of months or more I have chided the white male of America for political social economic, etc. sins of omission (Sins that results from a failure to act) and commission (Those sins which are carried out by actions) in their relationship with their black brothers in America.

In my own way I have tried to reiterate through simplicity of heart and soul and the kind of tropes that would stir the readers of the Southwest Digest to a sense of oneness as human beings. I believe certain causes and actions in the life of humans are willed by the Supreme Being for continued human development whether it is spiritual or physical.

The buying and selling of slaves, whether they were black or white, was evil and cast a blight on America. However, I believe it was a necessary evil at the time for the economic and social development of a country to be free from all types and forms of bondage and oppression.

From the yokes of oppres-

sion our forefathers were able to acquire land, build cities, institutions of higher learning, banks, medical schools, and much, much more to help America progress where it is today. The black church of yesterday sought and demanded the best of black Americans. From my communion there was "character passing" at the Annual Conference. If your character was of such that it did not meet the "holy and righteous" test, you were left without a church and sanctioned. The preacher was expected and charged to help lift the people to a life of excellency.

We would encourage young black Americans to be all that you can be. However, in your being, you must not forget the past or neglect the present in anticipation of the future. My generation is standing on the Solid Rock who is Jesus and my generation believes that all else is sinking sand.

We believe that every man must take care of his family. We believe that you must work and work is mandated by God. We believe that you must share with your partner that you have chosen for life and not be dominating. We believe that drugs are evil and pushed by agents of Satan to destroy the hope, dreams and aspiration of those who could be leaders in the present generation. We believe that a person who sells drugs to others for their own gratification and cause others to go astray should pay the harshest penalty that the law allows.

We would encourage young black males in this month of

celebration of Black History to be diligent in all things. Take care of your children. Don't molest or neglect your children. They are part of you! God frowns on such behavior, CPS acts, the District Attorney's office prosecutes, and someone in the penal system is looking for a new "girlfriend." Don't get deep in debt with credit cards for they are the new legal "loan shark" way of putting people into slavery. Don't get all broke up because you can't drive a vehicle with those pretty wheels. There is a price to be paid when a young black male drives a \$45,000 SUV and does not have a job. He soon will join others in the Texas Criminal Justice System and become the slave of Mr. Gilmore.

We encourage young black males to give your best to America. This is your country. Serve your country well by being a volunteer. Own a piece of the rock! Vote! Join a political party and learn how it works! Find out why the MAN would raise a half a million dollars to be elected to a job that pays \$160,000 a year in the U.S. House of Representatives!

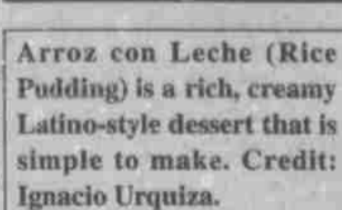

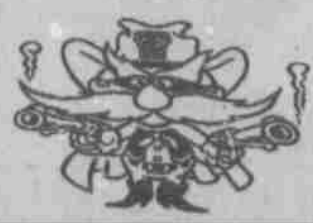
For the long denied and

## Benefits for Victims of Child Abuse, Sexual Assault, Family Violence

As we observe Crime Victims' Rights Week, Sexual Assault Awareness Month and Child Abuse Prevention Month - all in April - We can note the diversity of suffering caused by crime in our society. We can also be encouraged by the tireless efforts of advocates who work to meet the specific needs of child victims, victims of sexual assault, victims of family violence, and others whose special circumstances deserve our attention and respect.

My office, in administering the Crime Victims' Compensation Fund, strives to deliver specialized services and benefits for various kinds of victims. To help children who are victims of child abuse and child sexual assault, we have helped fund child advocacy centers in a number of cities throughout Texas.

These facilities exist to provide a centralized, child-friendly environment where the necessary interviews and examinations can take place with reduced trauma to

the child. Too often in the past, a child was re-traumatized and re-victimized by repeated questioning and cross-examination. Effective prosecution is critical. If we are going to protect our children from those who abuse and prey upon them. But at the same time, we must protect our children in the criminal justice process.

Another special kind of victim is the victim of sexual assault. My office works closely with local rape crisis and sexual assault service providers to promote sensitive treatment. With training and awareness, we can provide compassionate and respectful services while at the same time effectively investigating and prosecuting sexual assault cases.

Special benefits available to victims of sexual assault include relocation expenses for victims who are assaulted in their homes. The Compensation Fund can help with deposits for rent and utilities, and with moving expenses. Moving away from the scene of a traumatic assault can be critical to a victim's ability to move ahead and rebuild a life shattered by crime.

In recent years, the Legislature has enacted new provisions to help victims of family violence. These victims may qualify for relocation expenses and rent.

Discretionary grants have helped provide safe havens in communities, where victims of family violence can make the critical leap from a dangerous environment to safety and freedom.

In addition to money for relocation, survivors of family violence who have dependent children may qualify for loss of support payments on behalf of their dependent children. These funds can, on a temporary basis, help make up for the income lost by leaving a partner or spouse. Victims can also receive help with expenses such as crime-related medical and counseling bills.

Nothing we do can entirely heal the damage that violent crime wreaks in the lives of all it touches. The least we can do is raise our own awareness of the suffering. We can treat victims with respect and sensitivity, and we can work to make every possible benefit available to them.

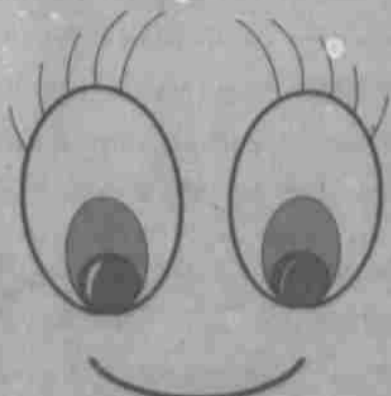

## Asthma Affects An Estimated 17 Million Americans



An estimated 17 million Americans are affected by asthma. Additionally, asthma is one of the leading causes of work and school absences, with the direct medical care and indirect expenses totaling more than \$12 billion each year.

While the exact cause of asthma is not known, many treatment options are available to control and reverse this chronic inflammation of the lung's airways.

Undiagnosed and untreated, asthma can be dangerous. Because of this, UMC's Physician Network Services will conduct a free asthma screening on **Saturday, May 17, 2003 from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. at Parkway Community Health Center, 406 Martir, Luther King Jr. Blvd.**

"Too many people suffer from undiagnosed or under treated asthma without even realizing it," said Eileen Talusan-Garcia, MD. "Not only are they experiencing a diminished life quality, but they also are putting themselves at risk for irreversible lung damage and, in most severe cases, death."

According to Dr. Talusan-Garcia, board certified in both adult and pediatric allergy and immunology, an asthma attack is often triggered by allergens such as pollen, dust and animal dander; certain drugs and food additives; viral respiratory infections; and physical exertion.

Once asthma is diagnosed, medical experts can recommend aggressive treatment with allergen avoidance and medication. Because inflammation of the

lungs and airways plays a critical role in the development of asthma, the most effective medications are those that reduce inflammation.

"Today, we know more than ever about asthma and we have the ability to treat the symptoms and control the disease," Dr. Talusan-Garcia said. "Anyone who has breathing problems, or thinks his or her asthma is not being managed as well as it could be, should consider stopping by the free screening on May 17."

During a screening, adults complete a 20-question Life Quality Test. Children under the age of 15 take a special test called the Kid's Asthma Check. Another version of the Check will also be available for parents of children up to 8 years of age to complete on their child's behalf. Participants will also complete a lung function test, which involves blowing into a tube.

All participants will meet with a physician to determine if they should seek a thorough examination and diagnosis. In addition to Dr. Talusan-Garcia, Patti Hood, MD, will be participating in the screening. Dr. Hood is board certified in Family Practice.

"Asthma can occur at any age and the impact on quality of life can be significant," said Dr. Hood. "I hope anyone who has concerns about their breathing will attend the free screening."
