TTU Part of Alliance that Receives Homeland Security Designation

LUBBOCK - The United States Department of Homeland Security selected a consortium of universities as the Center for Excellence for University Based Research on Foreign Animal Disease, Toxas Tech University is a partner in the adiance that is led by Texas A&M University.

The designation provides \$6 million per year for three years to the alliance to research and support the efforts of the Department of Honorand Security to prevent, detect, respond to and recovor from introduction of foreign animal disease that could affect the safety and seconomic sustainability of the United States' food and agriculture system.

Texas Tech's role in the alliance will focus on agro-mirrorism security on the High Plains of Texas. The university will also play a key role in communicating results of the research done by the alliance to producers and to the gen-

eral public. "Texas Tech's location in the finant of the largest concentration of feed-lot operations and the fastest-growing dairy region in the country, coupled with our superb College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, positions us to play a major role in helping so keep our feed supply safe," said Jon Whitmore Ph.D. president of Texas Tech

Texas' Top Science Students Receive Honors at the 2004 ExxonMobile **Texas Science and Engineering Fair**

Out of over 900 participants, six Lubbock students were honored during the fair

LUBBOCK, Texas - More than 200 Texas students were awarded top honors for their science and engineering projects at the 2004 Exxon Aobil Texas Science and Engineering Fair held April 1-3, 2004, at Texas Tech University's United Spirit Arena-Winners from Lubbock included John Norton, first place in the junior division of chemistry and recipient of the U.S. Navy Award; Brandon Northcut, second place in the junior division of engineering; team members Elizabeth Fireman and Shweta Joshi, second place in the junior division of team life science; and team members Jerry Ross and Erin Highsmith, United States Air Force Aerospace Science Award for their project in the scnior division of team life science.

Over 900 students competed at the fair in two divisions - junior division (grades 6-8) and senior division (grades 9-12). The 18th annual competition recognized all students placing 1st, 2nd and 3rd place or receiving an honorable mention in the fair's sixteen competitive categories. A list of all winners is attached.

"ExxonMobil congratulates each science fair participant for their hardwork, dedication and creative approach to science and mathematics that led them to participate in this state-wide competition with so many talented young minds," said Edward F. Ahnert, president of the ExxonMobil Foundation, "We are proud to continue our support and encouragement of the next generation's workforce through programs such as the ExxonMobil Texas Science and Engineering Fair."

Two grand prize winners in the senior division will go on to compete in the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (Intel ISEF), which will be held May 9-15, 2004 in Portland, Oregon. Those grand prize winners who are attending on behalf of the ExxonMobil Texas Science and Engineering Fair received all-expense paid trips to the international competition. Two grand prize winners were also awarded in the junior division Junior winners who placed first or second in their respective categories are eligible to compete in the Discover Young Scientists Challenge, which will be held October 23-27, 2004 in Washington, DC. Last year after winning at the ExxonMobil Texas State Science and Engineering Fair, Elizabeth Monier from Keystone Junior High in Boerne, Texas won second place in the Discovery Channel Young Scientist Challenge out of almost 7,300 participants.

The 2004 ExxonMobil Texas Science and Engineering Fair, hosted by the Texas Tech University, was held April 1-3, 2004, at the United Spirit Arena in Lubbock, Texas. Students qualified for the state competition by placing 1st, 2nd or 3rd in an ISEF-sanctioned regional science fair. For the fourth consecutive year, ExxonMobil Foundation has contributed the lead gift of \$50,000.

Town Hall Meeting; Missing Graves

April 23, 2004 the law firm of Claus & Associates, PC on behalf of clients that had retained them to locate the remains of their parents or other relatives that were buried in the Lubbock City Cemetery but now their graves can not be located. served notice on Marc McDougal and all of the City Council members, County Judge Tom Head and all of the County Commissioners, Lou Fox, the new City Manager, and other Lubbock City officials. This notice by Claus was a formal written notice that they intend to bring a civil suit against Lubbock County. The City of Lubbock, and the Lubbock City Cemetery, on behalf of their existing clients and all others similarly situated. According to the notice Claus intends to bring a suit "for the misplacement and/or destruction of burial records and gross negligence in how the records were and continue to be originated, maintained, and stored. In addition, evidence accumulated to date suggests that the gross negligence outlined above has led to the violation and desecration of several graves within the Cemetery, as Well as wrongful disinterment of numerous bodies and the loss of an undetermined number of grave sites..." Brad Boyd of the Claus firm indicates that all of the misplaced graves that he is aware of are only

Clans says that to date he has not heard from the Mayor nor the County Judge, nor any of the County Commissioners, nor the City Manager and none of the Councilman. Although a member of the City attorney's office says that they are doing everything they can to locate the missing graves of the Claus clients, the Claus finn has been forced to file a lawsuit against the City, the County and the Cemetery consistent with the terms of the Notice that they had previously served on the officials. They have also subpoenaed the custodian of the records for the Cemetery for a deposition and to produce for inspection all of their burial records for persons buried in the minority sections of the ceme-

To help determine the extent of this problem, a town hall meeting has been scheduled at the Mac Simmons Community Center Friday, May 14, 2004 starting at 6:30 p.m. Members of the Claus law firm will be there to discuss what they have discovered to date and to talk to anyone who may have information about the whereabouis of their clients' relatives or anyone who may have knowledge of the cemetery practices from the 1930's through the 1950's.





Church Group Nears 1 Ton Weight Loss. Recent news that obesity is becoming the number one preventable cause of death in the United States did not shake the members of Westside Baptist Church. This predominately African-American congregation in Lewisville, Texas located north of Dallas launched a weight management program based on the life of Jesus Christ in January 2004. The participants have lost more than a half-ton of weight in


the first three months. Some members lost as many as 13 pounds in the first six days. The program's developer, Dr. Steven Davidson says that Jesus is the architect of the program. Volunteer members attended a series of eight hour seminars to learn the food related behavior and principles in the life of Jesus Christ. They utilize their faith conviction concerning the principles they learn and enter a series of covenants. Dr. Davidson shares that weight loss is only the beginning of the story. Members also reveal that the health advantages are numerous including enhancements in facial appearance, digestive improvements, and reduction or elimination of other health issues. A number of participants report that their physicians are very pleased by the results. Incredibly, the group does not diet. That's right, they do not diet. Thus, their trademarked theme says it all, "We don't diet, We live by it, the 'Living Bread™." Davidson's view is that diets are external plans that do not empower internally. He discovered what he calls, "Christbased Weight Management" principles through his own personal health concerns, and now he accepts the responsibility to help as many people as he can. While he encourages every person in the community, he is particularly focused on persons in minority communities where assistance is limited and the problem is deadly. Davidson concludes, "there are those persons who use their religion to commit heinous crimes, or kill themselves. So, why can't we use our faith to reshape our bodies as a testimony to the God who has given us life today and forever"? event in the United States. The Tour will begin in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex area and for 10 days will pass along the Red River through Wichita Falls, through rugged and scenic Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo, the high plains of Lubbock and the Big Country of Abilene on its way back to the Metroplex. The cycling stages will vary from shorter circuit races to long stage races of up to 150 miles.



It Rappened . .

* Thursday, May 14, 1807: The first permacent English-speaking settlement in America was established at what is now Jamestown, Virginia (when 104 men and boys) filed ashore from three small sailing ships. The first European settlement in North America was actually founded by the Spanish in what is now Florida, in 1513. The Mayflower, carrying English families, arrived near Plymouth Rock in Massachusett: in 1620 * Sunday, May 17, 1792: Stock traders gathered under a tree in New York City and organized what later became the New York Stock Exchange et 70 Wall Street Alexander Hamilton helped 24 merchants overcome a prior market crash which had atmost balted commerce in stocks and bonds * Saturday, May 11, 1811; The original Siamese twins, Chang and Eng. were born of Chinese parents in Siam, now called Thailand. They were joined at the waist by a band of cartilage about 8 in. in circumference and 4 in. long. They became US citizens, adopted Bunker as their surname, and often toured as circus curiosities. In April 1843 they married two sisters, with whom they raised 10 children. Only after their death was it learned that the twins could have been easily separated by surgery on the cartilage band

* Saturday, May 13, 1865: More than a month after Robert E. Lee surrendered his Confederate Army at Appomattox Courthouse, the last land battle of the Civil War occurred at Palmito Ranch, near Brownsville, Texas. The final fighting involved a black unit, the 62nd US Colored Infantry Regiment

* Monday, May 10, 1869: The first intercontinental railroad in the US was completed when the Union Pacific Railroad, building west from Omaha, Nebraska met with the Central Pacific Railroad. California, in the desert near Promontory, Utah. In honor of the linking of the two milways. a golden spike, valued at 5400, was driven into the laurelwood railroad tie ...

* Tuesday, May 7, 1878; Black inventor Joseph Winters received US patent no. 203,517 for a wagonmounted fire escape ladder, which be had designed for the city of Chambersburg, Pennsylvania

* Tuesday, May 9, 1882; US patent no. 257,487 was issued for a stethoscope of the now-classic design. Sterboscopes of similar design were developed as early as 1829, and the first stethoscope, used to listen to the heart and longs, was actually invented by the black physician Imhotep in ancient Egypt

Sunday, May 13, 1888; Slavery was abelished in Brazil. Some 4 million Africans had been imported to Brazil, the most of any country in the western hemisphere, including the United States

* Tuesday, May 9, 1899; Black inventor John Albert, Burr was granted US putent no. 624,749 for the first rotary-blade lawn mower. The first workable lawn mower had been manufactured in England in

* Tuesday, May 13, 1930: The only documented case of known freality due to hail was recorded when a farmer was killed in Lubbock, Texas

* Wednesday, May 15, 1940; Nylon stockings went on sale to the general public for the first time in the US. In just a few hours, over 4 million pairs were sold

* Friday, May 8, 1942: Thu song, "White Christmas" was registered by Irving Berlin. It is said to be the most valuable music copyright in the world

* Monday, May 17, 1954: The US Supreme Court handed down the historic Brown vs. Boald of Education decision, declaring racial segregation in public schools to be

* Tisesday, May 9, 1960: The US Food and Drug Administration approved the world's first corumercially-produced birth control pill. Enovid-10, made by the Searle Company of Chicago, Illinois. The contraceptive pill used symbolic

press ovulation in women * Tuesday, May 17, 1988; Noted African American ophthalmologist, Dr. Patricia Bath patented a widelyused medical instrument designed to safely remove cataracts from the

"Tuesday, May 10, 1994; Seventyfive years-old Nelson Robliblabla Mundeia was sworn in as the first black president of South Africa. Son of the chief of the Temba people and a university-trained lawyer, the leader of black South Africans' light against apartheid had spent 27 years as a political prisoner before his election. Mandela retired from public life in June 1999, and resides in his birthplace, Quau, Tranker, South Africa

In Sports History:

 Monday, Mny 17, 1875: The first Kentucky Derby was run. The winning jockey was a black man, Oliver Lewis, who rode 3-years-old Aristides in record time Thursday, May 6, 1915; Babe Ruth, then playing for the Boston Red Sox, hit his first major-league home run. The "Sultan of Swat" went on to smash 714 homers before he retired, as a New York Yankee, in 1935. His major league baseball home run record was finally broken by famed African American slugger Hank Aaron in

* Thursday, May 6, 1954; English medical student Roger Bannister broke the four-minute mile during a track meet in Oxford, England, finishing in 3 minutes, 59.4 seconds, On Thursday, July 7, 1999 Hicham El Guerrouj of Moroeco set the current world men's outdoor mile

 Thursday, May 12, 1955; The Chicago Cubs' "Frothpick" Sam Jones, so nicknamed because of the toothpick he always chewed un the mound, became the first African

American to pitch a no-hitter in major league baseball. He beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-0, striking out the inst three batters in the 9th inning after walking the bases

Batta day, May 6, 2000: Twentyeight-years-old Markon St. Juliez of Louisiana became the first African American to side a horse in the Kentucky Derby since 1921, 79 years. In the 126th Derby, he rode Curule, a 50-to-1 longshot.

* Sunday, May 17, 1925; Malcolm X. born Malcolm Little, in Omahn, Nebraska. The militant blacknationalist was assassinated in February 1965

* Thursday, May 11, 1933; Louis Farrakhan, born Louis Eugene Walcott, in Roxbury. Massachusetts. He is the block religious leader of the Nation of Islam Saturday, May 13, 1950; Stevie Wonder, born Staveland Morris Hardaway, in Saginaw, Michigan, The legendary black singer and songwriter was born prematurely. and developed permanent blindness due to excessive exygen in his incu-

Died:

* Monday, May 11, 1981: Bob Marley, in Mismi, Florida, of lung and brain cancer, at age 36. The body of the black icon of reggae music lies at rest at his ancestral home in St. Ann's Parish, Jamaica Wednesday, May 16, 1990; Sammy Davis, Jr., in Beverly Hills, California, of throat cancer, at age-64. The African American dancer, singer, actor and world-class entertainer lost his left eye in an automobile accident in 1954. Born in Harlem, Davis converted to Judaism

event in the US, is run each May at Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kentucky It is a little known fact that the early Kentucky Derby mees were dominated by African American jockeys and trainers. An estimated 10,000 people watched the first Kentucky Derby on Monday, May 17, 1875, The winning horse was a chestnut colt named Aristides, trained by African. American Ansel Williamson and ridden by African American jockey Oliver Lewis. In the first running of the Kentucky Derby, 13 of the 15 jockeys were African Americans. Black jockeys won 15 of the first 28 Derbys, and 11 African American reinsmen rode a total 15 Kentucky Derby winners between 1875 and 1902

The youngest jockey to wift the Kentucky Derby was an African American, Alonzo "Lonnie" Clayton, who rode Azra to victory in 1892, at age 15. In 1891, threetime Derby wanner, African American Isaac Murphy, considered

vs. Ferguson, upheld a Louisiana law that required milroads to maintain separate train cars for blacks and whites. That case, which established that segregation did not mean discrimination. began the age of Jim Crow. Brown vs. Board of Education clearly stated that the 'separatebut equal" doctrine violated the equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution.

New SBA Regulations to Create Contracting Opportunities for Service-Diabled Veterans

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Small Business Admini strati on today announced a new procurement program that will boost federal contract opportunities for service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses. The interim rule will be published tomorrow and is effective immediately. The Federal Acquisition Regulatory Council concurrently released regulations implementing The program.

"President Bush has made it a priority to reach out to all of Americans entrepreneurs, and we have a special responsibility to make an effort for

those who sacrificed for our safely and freedom," SBA Administrator Hector V. Barreto said. "We have made a strong effort to do precisely that. Federal contract dollars to service-disabled veterans increased from \$298 million in fiscal year 2002 to \$510 million in FY2003. But we want to do more. The regulations being issued today will ensure that those great Americans who served our country proudly continue to have fair and open access to contracting opportunities."

The new rule will amend the relevant sections of the

Code of Federal Regulations, adding provisions that will allows contracting officers to restrict contract awards to service-disabled veteranowned small businesses when there is a reasonable expectation that two or more servicedisabled veteran-owned small businesses will submit bids at a fair market price. It also allows awards of sole-source

contracts to service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses when there is not a reasonable expectation that two or more service-disabled veteran-owned firms will submit bids and the anticipated contract price does not exceed S3 million, with the exception of manufacturing contracts where the contracting threshold is \$5 million.

The interim rule allows small businesses to self-certify as service-disabled veteran-owned businesses. Any challenge to a firm's status as a small business or standing as a service-disabled veteranowned small business must be referred to the SBA for resolution. The SBA will rely upon existing Department of Veteran's Affairs or

Department of Defense determinations regarding status and will help enforce penalties for false representation



At the time that the new Medicare Prescription Drug bill was passed by Congress, I felt that it was a mistake. At that time, no particular and specific details about the benefits had been finalized on paper. Some details are still not worked out. The only thing that we knew for sure at the time, was that the bill had been passed and signed by the President who wanted it pushed through Congress as soon as possible and that a discount card for prescription drugs would be available to Medicare recipients at a cost.

Since that time, I have received information from the

Fuman Services in Washington, D.C. and from the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland regarding the new prescription law. The Medicare prescription drug plan does not take effect until 2006, that is, the plan where you will get these benefits directly from the Medicare program. Until that time, there will be available to all Medicare recipients, beginning in June, 2004, Medicare-Approved drug discount cards. You must get your card from a Medicare-Approved company, that is, a private medical insurance company. "Although you have until December 31, 2005 to apply, the sooner you apply, the sooner you may receive assistance. If your income is low and you apply in 2004, you may get a \$600 credit on your drug discount card in 2004 and another \$600 in 2005 to help you pay for your prescriptions." If you have questions about the Medicare-Approved companies in your area, call 1-800-MEDICARE (1800-633-4227);TTY USERS should call 1-877-486-2048. The Internet address is:

www.medicare.gov selecting 'Prescription Drug and Other Assistance Programs."

If you qualify for the \$600 credit, there will be no enrollment fee. If you do not qualify for the \$600 credit, you must pay an enrollment fee of \$30.00 or less for the prescription discount card. The enrollment must be with a Medicare-Approved company and ALL of the following MUST be true though the limits on income in Alaska and Hawaii are slightly high-

QUOTE:

 You have Medicare Part A and/or Part B coverage, and · Your annual income is \$12,569 or less if you are single, or \$16,862 or less if you are married (this includes your income and your spouse's income and You do not have Medicaid outpatient prescription drug coverage.

All of the above quoted information is in regard to the program with Medicare-Approved medical insurance company coverage from whom you may purchase a prescription discount card. If you currently have supplemental insurance coverage for prescription drugs, you do not need another card. Get "in cinque" and weigh your options if you are Medicare eligible. Next week, I will discuss the Medicare Prescription Drug Plan which begins in 2006.


