

The Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that atmission of the confession has to be ruled on by the judge in advance. Earlier Monday, Judge James Noel of the Federal District Court, had turned down Smith's appeal.

according to the November issue of the national Negro monthly.

Now in his 64th year, the Negro jazz graet refuses to join civil rights groups on picket lines. He says he won't march up and down with a sign. But he denies his critics charges that he is an "Uncle Tom" catering to white audiences.

The article details how Satchmo gives generously of his money to civil rights groups. He also gives away \$500 to \$1,000 each and every week in handouts to friends and strangers. He enjoys giving away money, the article relates but he prefers to "grease a few palms" rather than set up a foundation adn thus get tax benefits from ths largess.

"I figure you lay a little here and a little there and everybody's happy", Satchmo says in the Ebony article. "Thats' how I get my satisfaction".

It's not generally known, but millionaire Arm-

strong still lives in a modest house in a working man's section of Queens, L.I., about a half hour from Times Square. He won't move be cause je likes het neighborhood and the neighbors. When he's not on the road, Satchmo is

likely to drop into the corner saloon for a glass of beer with his mixed lot of neighbors.

Financial aides won't sya hwo much Armstrong is worth, but admit he's never made less than a half million dollars in

ARMSTRONG.... any of the last 20 eyars. His advisors won't let him make more than \$1 million yearly now. Royalties from his current hit record "Hello Dolly" will be deferred for 10 years in order to keep it all from going to Uncle Sam.

Born in the slums of New Orleans, Satchmo started working for 15 cents a day. He's never been impressed by money, Ebony relates and this may help explain his own contributions to the Negro's fight for total freedom in America -- a contribution many Negroes can't understand.

"If my people don't dig me the way I am, I'm sorry," Satchmo says in says in the Ebony article "If they don't go along with me ginvng my dough instead of marching, well---every cat's entitled to his opinion. But that's the way I figure I can help out and still keep on working. If they let me alone on this score, I'll do my part in my own way." ******



The FIRST CHRISTMAS SHOPPER on STATE STREET



*Major John Whistler, commander of Ft. Dearborn, was the grandfather of the famous artist, James Abbott McNeil Whistler.

So wrote John Kinzie, pioneer Chicago settler, on December 24th, 1803. Chicago was three months old, and this was the first recorded "Christmas shopping" in what is now the famous State Street shopping area. Cost of the powder and ball to secure six "turkies" could not have exceeded twelve cents.


