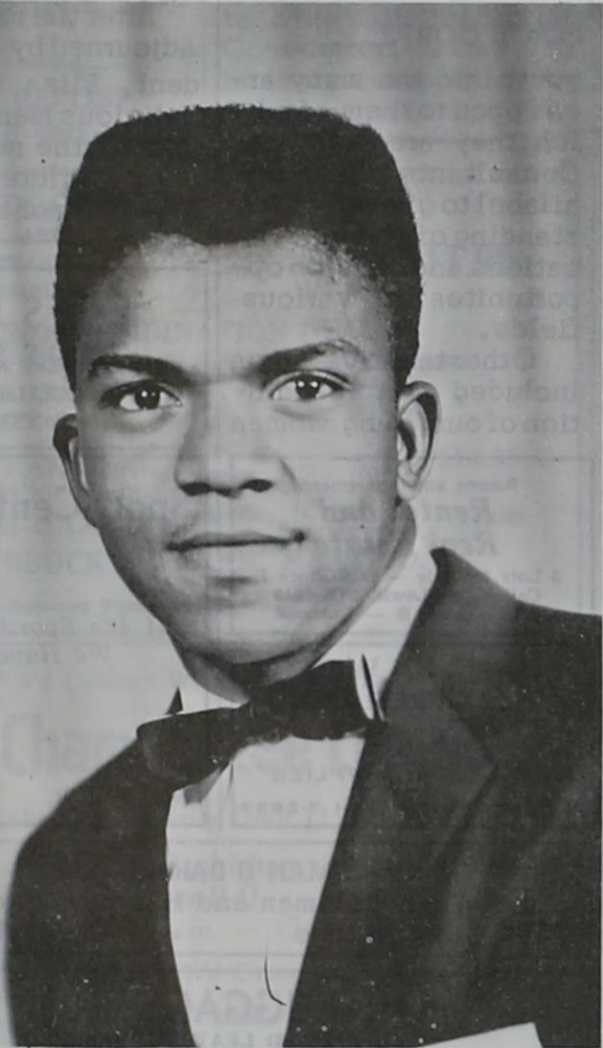

### Lubbock Peace Corps Worker In Harlem

Miss Lydia Jackson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Jackson of 1326 East 15th Street, was one of the members of the Domestic Peace Corps who came from all over the United States to help tackle the problems of the people of Harlem.

Yes, she traveled more than a thousand miles which laid between the tranquility of Lubbock and the ear shattering roar of New York city. Miss Jackson went this far for the privilege of working in Harlem with Domestic Peace Corps of the Associated Community Teams, Inc.

She was one of the sixty Associated Community Team Corpsmen who have converged on the city from sixteen different states to bring help to the helpless in a unique program of providing supportive service to the projects of agencies concerned with Harlem's youth. For long hours at exhausting jobs, she received her room and board, two dollars a day pocket money, and seventy five dollars a month held in escrow until her one-year enlistment was up.

The financial reward

was not the goal for Miss Jackson—who is a junior at Texas Tech College. With a major in sociology, she was motivated by a sincere desire to serve and to learn by serving. "Working with ACT is helping us to develop our own goals and find ourselves", she says.
