

# **Bob Nash Radio Personality As Civic Booster**

Monday morning. Reporters straggle into the basement conference room at City Hall and wait for their colleagues to emerge.

He greets them all with knowing camaraderie. He has seen them before and saw their predecessors burst on to the scene, make their mark and leave. But he has stayed and, in his way, prospered.

A symbol of his prosperity is the Monday morning press conference, where he will be designated chairman of the "Back to Basics" committee to support the city's \$26.4 million bond election.

He is hail fellow, well met. Joking here, complimenting there. But there is the distance, for most of the reporters are young, not fully schooled in his achievements. Few bonds have had time to form.


the corporation that initiated and funded research at the site.

And he is pleased with his role in the rebuilding of the city after the catastrophic tornado of 1970. He squints as he talks about it, as if the scenes he recalls flash in front of his eyes. As a member of the Citizens Advisory Commision, he sat on the committee that recommened the building of a civic center.

"People got involved in that project," he said, "We took it to the grassroots to see what the people wanted."

In 1932, all Bob Nash's father wanted was a better job. So he packed up his family and moved to Lubbock from Nash's native Plainview. "1932," Nash mulls, "I guess that's long enough to make me a native."

"There wasn't much else here then," he says, "Not many streets. The WPA paved all the streets in the residential areas." He pauses and maybe the irony catches up with him for a moment now he's urging people to build streets in an area that wasn't much more than a cotton field in 1932.



The television lights go on. He dons his glasses and almost imperceptibly lowers his voice. City Information Officer Vaughn Hendrie hands him remarks the city staffer has prepared.

Bob Nash reads the lines.

The wall in Nash's KFYO-Radio office is crammed tight with plaques attesting to his accomplishments. He says he is proudest of his participation in the Lubbock Lakesite project, as president of

The reflection passes, and Nash recovers the hearty wit that's made him a popular emcee on the banquet circuit: "I've got my initials in a lot of curbs," he grins.

After World War II service and a stint at the University of Denver, Nash returned to


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businessmen has raised \$2,125 and spent \$1,640 in support of Saturday's \$26.4 million bond election.

The figures were revealed in a report to the city secretary's office filed May 13. The report is required under the Political Funds Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1975 which is part of the Texas Election Code.

According to the one-page report, the committee-called the "Back to Basics Committee" accenting the city's no-frills approach to the bond electionspent \$1,615 for postage and a mailing permit and paid \$25 for a voter registration list from the County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Not mentioned in the report is a pamphlet supporting the bond



election which was unveiled at a May 9 press conference announcing formation of the committee.

Under the law, an expenditure is defined as "any obligation incurred."


Bob Nash, chairman of the committee, said the pamphlets were not picked up until after the report was filed because of a

Realtor Harold Chapman was designated treasurer for the group in an affadavit filed with the city secretary May 3.

Largest contributors listed in the affadavit are Clifton H. Cummings, a vice president for Furrs, Inc., who contributed \$250 and Barnie Rushing Jr., a vice president of Hemphill-Wells, who gave \$150.

Throughout the lackluster bond campaign, city officials stressed their concern that a low turnout could defeat the six propositions. Mayor Roy Bass appealed to chamber of commerce directors to raise money to "talk up" the bond election.

## Don't Make Rip-Off a Rub-Out What to Do Before the Burglar Comes

"It was about midnight when we heard the front door bell ring. We didn't want to answer it because we figured if nothing else it was some unexpected relatives. Then a few seconds later we heard the credit card go around the door. We waited, and when we finally did get up, half our livingroom was gone."

Once a burglar is in your home there's very little you can do except wait for him to leave, as the family mentioned did. But there are precautions you can take to avoid a confrontation that could cost you your life.

Some of the simplest precautions are keeping your doors locked and installing storm windows, noted Sgt. Doyle Nelson, Lubbock police detective. Putting wooden blocks in your windows to prevent them from being raised more than six inches in another precaution that works.

Your best defense against a burglary is noise, said Nelson. Storm windows work because they make twice as much noise if someone tries to break in.

Nelson advised that if you plan



to be away from your home, leave a light on in the back of the house and always leave a radio playing. "As long as the burglar isn't sure whether you're home or not, he's not going to risk finding out," Nelson said. Don't leave any tip-offs that you're away, like piled up newspaper and mail, added Nelson.

Although locks are one of the best safeguards against break-ins, some locks are obviously better than others. Dead bolt locks, that must be opened with a key are the best investment and cost about \$30. There are different grades of locks, and price usually is your best indicator of quality. Locks that have a chain that crosses

over the door are good to stall a burglar, but they may not necessarily keep him out. Guards that fold over the door are not likely to keep a burglar out, added Nelson.

Nelson warns against letting shrubbery grow too high in front of windows, thus giving a burglar protection while breaking in. "Nosy neighbors are also a great safeguard," said Nelson. Don't hesitate to take license plate numbers of anyone suspicious, he added.

It's also wise to join Operation Identification. A person can get equipment to identify their property from the police department. They also receive red stickers to put on their windows, identifying them as members of the program. "This alerts the burglar that the property is identified, and it usually keeps them away," said Nelson.

"The failure of the county to provide the necessary guards to comply with Article 6871 and the lack of guards on each floor for a full 24-hour period have resulted in serious mismanagement of the jail, and have in effect permitted the inmates to control the internal functions of the jail in many instances."

> -U.S. Dist. Judge Halbert Woodward in his ruling in the inmate lawsuit against county officials.

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The jail suit is over. County Commissioners are preparing to comply with the orders handed down by the federal judge. The defendants, while not awarded money damages, have received much of the relief they sought.

Yet there are questions still. Who bears the responsibility for the shame that is the county jail? Why was it allowed to destroy men and their sould for so long -- or were the men and the souls destroyed at the outset, and their destruction only imported and localized?

Most importantly—and this is a question no editorial can answer for you, and your heart must seek the reply—what does society owe to those who have breached its rules and to those it has deemed must be punished?

Responsibility? Surely, the county officials over the years charged with responsibility bear the brunt. Sheriffs and commissioners and county judges who, to quote Woodward, "neglected their statutory duties."

"They have at times ignored these (legislative) standards by giving preference to monetary considerations," Woodward wrote and added he found "some justification" for their actions. Enough to absolve the county of "bad faith" in dealing with the prisoners in the jail.

That may satisfy the legal criteria, but there are more questions: Was it moral to favor dollars over people? Was it politically wise to edge closer to the brink of federal intervention as the list of the jail's atrocities grew daily? These questions will be answered at the polls.

the "gawddern fed'ral court's messin' in our bidness agin." But the lesson they should have been learned years ago is not that federal power will elbow its way into our midst for the sheer joy of doing so. Rather, it will move in to fill a vaccuum created by our own inaction.

Texas legislators could have used a Phantom Zone as they took on the impossible task of making inhumane punishment more humane. The result: the lawmakers decided to junk the state's electric chair and use injections of hemlock or some such toxic substance to kill criminals instead.

Those who argue that the death penalty is a keen way to prevent crimes and protect the rights of victims should stand up and holler about that. How, they should demand, can a victim sleep at nights knowing that his attacker isn't going to fry to a crisp? And how many crimes will be committed with the attacker secure in the thought that his body won't jerk at the initial surge, but will lie peacefully as the chemical seeps through the tissue to stop the heart.

Where are the "Eye feraneyers"? Has everyone forgotten what it means to be a bible-totin' son 'o God? Why do they not cry forth that the death penalty—instead of a process like putting a dog to sleep—should be as gruesome as possible? Draw and quarter 'em. Disembowel 'em. Put their head on a pike. After all, if the state is going to foster a climate of violence, it should be done well. Shouldn't it?



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WASHINGTON — President Carter has been criticized for putting style ahead of substance. But it looks as if he isn't going to change his style. At least White House adviser Greg Schneiders doesn't want him to.

Schneiders has written a confidential memo to Carter urging him to continue his president-to-people campaign. Schneiders has proposed a repeat of the president's radio call-in show and another overnight stay with an average family in California later this month.

Schneiders also wants to invite average citizens to the White House to participate in roundtable discussions of such issues as welfare reforms, tax reforms and world hunger. The president, if he adopts the idea, would join in the discussions.

**Higher Prices?:** Prices will be going up this summer at the supermarkets and shopping centers. This bleak news is contained in a confidential Commerce Dept. analysis. The drought in the West has hit the fruit orchards and vegetable fields. This will mean higher prices for fresh produce—from apples and pears to lettuce and tomatoes.

The price of feed is also climbing. The animals that eat the feed, therefore, will become more expensive. Thus by fall, meat prices can be expected to rise.

There has already been a large jump in the wholesale price of processed foods. This will be translated into higher consumer prices in a couple of months. And, of course, the price of oil, gas and electricity is going up.

By next year at this time, our sources predict, it will cost 16 cents to mail a letter. But they also predict the service won't improve.

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

We should explain that blue boxes are homemake devices that can tap into the phone system. A blue box thief, therefore, steals long-distance calls from the phone company.

McCloskey's constituent boasted that he could even tap into a secret, toll-free White House line. He invited McCloskey to try for himself. Hesitantly, the congressman told an aide to dial the numbers that the thief provided. Suddenly, the aide found himself talking to the White House on a security telephone.

The alarmed McCloskey asked the General Accounting Office to investigate the blue box rip-off. The government auditors found that for about \$60, a competent technician can construct a blue box capable of beating the long-distant dialing system. The same, simple blue box can also intercept most commercial calls.


For about \$1,000, a technician can tap into many of the government's classified computer systems. He can also intercept messages from a number of government communications systems. For less than a million dollars, a competent spy could even eavesdrop on our satellite communications.


**Capitol Vice:** On Capitol Hill, law and order are sometimes honored more in the preachment than the practice. It is against the law, for example, to gamble in the halls of Congress. Yet earlier this year, we received reports that a thriving numbers racket operates on Capitol Hill.

Our staff worked with two free-lance reporters, Lew Predue and Ken Cummins. For six weeks, they kept a watch on the numbers operation. They placed bets, for example, with a numbers writer who occupies a regular table in a House cafeteria.

He sets up shop about 11 every morning and starts taking bets. His associates also tour congressional offices and bring back numbers slips and cash. Perdue and Cummins followed them on their rounds and watched them make their final delivery. But the reporters were never able to see the actual transactions inside the congressional offices.

However, they did see Capitol policemen come up to the numbers table and place bets.

# **A Model of Decorum** Local Schools Long on Self-Help, Short on Careers

Even in these days of women's liberation, sugar and spice and everything nice is still what little girls are made of-maybe. But ruffles and lace just don't come naturally, alas. Modeling schools to the rescue.

Although Lubbock doesn't have much of a market for models, there are still modeling schools, or self-improvement schools in disguise (finishing schools if you're old fashioned).

It's true that two local schools do teach everything from photographic to commercial to fashion modeling. But in Lubbock, modeling classes are only a sideline for the self-improvement people seem to be buying, no matter if they're 18 months old or 65 years old.

"Everyone knows some area they want to improve and anyone can work on that. Not everyone can become a model," explained Brenda Becknell, owner of Robert Spence School of Modeling.

Quite often young students enroll in a class because they are pressured by their parents. modeling schools in the country. "Often a tomboy will rebel against something as frivolous as plucking eyebrows, but after a while, they start getting interested in themselves," said Ms. Becknell. Just getting them out of overalls and into a pantsuit is a major accomplishment.

While some girls may rebel against so called "feminine ways," some boys find the lessons not only interesting but useful. After classes, Becknell explained, "The boys are more interested in knowing what is proper than the girls are, perhaps because they are so confused about whether they should or shouldn't do such chauvinistic things as opening a door for a girl."

For those students who decide to go past the basic modeling technique, the going gets a little rougher. "Restaurant modeling is most common in Lubbock," noted Becknell.

The lucky ones may work one show a week, earning about \$20, according to Becknell. Another modeling school director noted that her students work restaurants but do not get paid. "It's mostly just for fun," said Sharlotte Kemp, owner of Talent Today.

The goal of women who want to pursue a full-time modeling career may be unrealistic, unless they're willing to leave Lubbock.

Becknell said a student who has completed all the courses at the school takes with her a certificate proving she has learned the modeling lingo as well as skills. The school is now in the process of becoming one of 500 accredited

Talent Today Modeling School offers a diploma to it's graduating students, which means they've learned the basics.

Just how far a certificate will get a student cannot be determined, since no one from either local school has made a shot at the big time. Some students do model in Dallas, according to Kemp. Becknell explained that she hopes to send some of her speaking to several junior high, students to New York for possible interviews with top agencies.

While some students may have what it takes to be a cover girl what happens to those who obviously do not? Both teachers said they do not encourage anyone who doesn't have potential to pursue a modeling career. "If you're 5'2" you're chances of making it are slim-especially when you're not. Telling someone that, isn't easy."

Learning that your chances aren't so good can be expensive. The self improvement course at Robert Spence costs \$350, and, if you take the advance modeling course, your bill totals almost \$600. The 44-hour basic course includes lessons on everything from make-up to fashion, and while it may do great things for your ego, it doesn't guarantee you a modeling job.

The Talent Today course costs \$15 monthly, regardless which course you take.

Instructors and owners of both schools are ex-students themselves. Becknell, an ex-school teacher, attended her first class when her mother enrolled her during college.

Kemp attended her first class when her daughters enrolled her

Phyllis Johnson sits in a well-proportioned 6'1" frame. Her lithe body almost flows down the runway, each turn cut sharply, but not too sharply. She winks, the way only beautiful girls can.

Phyllis Nineteen-year-old wants to be a model. She has what could be a winning combination-beauty and height -which is one reason she pursues a modeling career. The other reason is because it's a challenge. "I know it's a super-hard field, that's why I want to do it," she said, shaking her blonde curls from her face.

She's also realistic enough to at least pursue the career prepared -a fashion design degree is always good to fall back on-but it is obviously a second choice.

She smiles and her otherwise soft-spoken voice grows louder, "I think junior clothes are out of the question. I'm more interested in high-fashion modeling." She knows you don't find that locally and hopes to head for the great cities. "Dallas would be a nice place to start but I really want to go to California or New York."

She adds, "I need to go soon, maybe at the end of the summer." She knows that each year she waits the outlook grows dimmer. Most models are out of business before they're 20. \*\*\*\*

Peggy Hall doesn't look like the mother of an infant, but she is. She is small-boned, with jet black hair she wears like a helmet, her bangs meeting large eyes outlined in make-up. She has no dreams of modeling as a career. For her, the modeling classes have been just "something I always wanted to do."

While the classes haven't

changed her life drastically, they have given her more confidence. "I'm more conscious of the way I act in a crowd," she said.

There wasn't anything specifically that she wanted to improve; she was more interested in just overall good grooming. Wearing a sheer, black dress, she moves confidently, while at the same time she seems tense. She confides, "I still cross my legs when I shouldn't, but at least I'm more aware of it." She has to be aware-she knows her friends are watching.

Cindy Taylor is a sixteen-yearold high school sophomore with short blonde hair, clear blue eyes and a hesitant grin. She has a kind of orderliness about her, atypical of teenagers. A light tan peaks through her sundress as she sits stiffly in a chair, hands folded in her lap.

Cindy asked her mother to send her to modeling school, not because she had aspirations of being a model, but because she wanted to gain confidence. Making the transition from junior high to high school might have been difficult for a shy girl like Cindy, but both Cindy and her mother avoided the pitfalls of change. "The classes have helped me come out of my shyness," she explains.

While not interested in a modeling career, she hopes to work local shows.

It's her turn to walk down the runway. She hesitates for a moment, "Could I practice a few times first?" Walking down the runway she lets a faint smile slip by. The shyness melts into charm.

Lubbock and classes at Texas Tech.

During the weekends he pulled a shift at a radio station for 50 cents an hour. After marriage and quitting school, he took a job at KSEL Radio for \$1 an hour. Then, in 1951, he became program director at KFYO. The station celebrates its golden anniversary this year. Now assistant general manager, he looks a little stunned when he realizes he has been with the station half of its life and most of his.

You have to realize it could have been different for Bob Nash. Disc Jockeys grow old watching the records spin and trying to come up with "platter patter" for three or four hours a day. They grow old, and one day they play their last record and move over to the sales department. Some make the transition. Some don't and those that don't sit staring at the walls, listening for the music.

Say what you like about Bob Nash, but he's no dried up disc jockey. The plaques speak otherwise.

Nash says he doesn't recall how he found his niche of community builder. "It just happened. It was one of those things."

"I guess I'm a rather gregarious person. I love being around people."

"This is a good town with good people in it. There are no high or low stations in it," Nash declares, "There's something special about this town." This something special unfolded after The Tornado. It was an attitude Nash describes as "Let's build it. Let's get it done." Nash, looking over his half-frame glasses and fingering a set of keys, fits in with the tenor of the town. "I guess I'm compuslive about anything I do whether it's reading or walking or fishing or working. I guess I have an excess amount of nervous energy."

His job at a radio station provided an entry into the world of civic affairs. "When they need publicity they always pick on a media guy," Nash cracks. "Being in this business, you know what's going on in the city. You know what the city's needs are."

What's more he looks the part. Full hair with the right ammount of gray around the temples. Boyish face with lines of authority beginning to peek out. Strong voice that carries the grave issues of state and the graceful good humor equally well.

In fact, he looks the part for politics. "I always wanted to get into politics," Nash says, looking into the well of his desk, as if for lost years, "I'd probably be the worst politician in America. I'd probably say what I think, not what they want to hear."

But he says that if he decided to run for office, "I'd probably have to get off the air." Still he can not give up what seems to be a pervasive dream. "Someday I may get into politics. It's always in the back of my mind."

While Nash acknowledges he is in a position where he can be

Continued From Page One station, KCBD-TV (Channel 11), has editorialized against the bond issue, no organized opposition has yet surfaced, and voters seem to be greeting the impending election with a hearty ho-hum.

Six propositions will appear on the ballot. They include:

1. WATER IMPROVEMENT -\$16,775,000. More than \$5 million of that figure goes to development of a third water source, which city officials say will be needed possibly as soon as the middle 1980s.

Preliminary indications are that the city council may want to build reservoirs in the Justiceburg-Post area, and may eventually return to the voters asking for as much as \$85 million in revenue bonds. The \$5 million in this bond go-around will be used as "seed money" to purchase land and right-of-way for the new reservoir.

However, if the Justiceburg-Post area proves unworkable, perhaps because of a high level of minerals in the water that would accumulate, city planners say they'll try again to find another source. 2. SEWER IMPROVEMENT -\$3,303,000. Most of the improvements are planned at the sewage treatment plant in southeast Lubbock to bring the city up to state standards for sewage treatment. 3. STORM SEWER-\$473,000. As the name implies, this money will be used for drainage improvement at 50th Street and Avenue A and for new storm sewers to be built in conjunction with state highway department projects. **4. STREET IMPROVEMENTS** -\$4,781,000. The bond money will be spent for upgrading and extending streets, primarily in Southwest Lubbock.

# Ambulances Feeling City's Growth Pains

Rapid growth in Southwest Lubbock may spur planners for the county's ambulance service to take Horace Greeley's advice and move Medical Service stations west.

EMS administrator Stuart Haggard told the Times, "We're looking at the possibility of moving Station Three further west and further south."

Haggard explained that EMS

money will be used to relocate the Central Fire station and shift some fire department equipment and personnel in northeast Lubbock. Almost \$300,000 will be used for a new fire station in the burgeoning southwest portion of the city.

6. FIRE STATION-\$310,000. City officials want to sock away for a new fire station in land that has yet to be annexed, probably in Southwest or Northwest Lubbock.

While city officials say that no increase in the tax rate is anticipated, the bonds will be financed by increases in the water and sewer charges.

If figures indicate that distances are taking too long to be covered in Southwest Lubbock, Haggard indicated EMS may start looking for a new site for station No. 3, now located at 48th Street and Ave. Q.

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EMS maintains two other stations in the city — at 10th Street and Avenue G and 19th and Orlando.

But the young administrator said he foresees no additional station in the southwest quadrant of the city. "I think we can do it with three stations and maintain our response time of 5 minutes."

Figures for the first three months of this year show that city ambulances responded in an average of 5.14 minutes after a call—5.40 minutes in January, 4.88 in February and 5.15 in March. Countywide, the figure hovered at about 7 minutes per call which Haggard described as "one of the best in the nation," considering the size and population density of the county.

Haggard said that EMS faces many of the same problems that the city fire department must confront in the rapidly growing Southwest and noted that the city government will shift fire stations in that direction if Saturday's \$26.4 million bond election passes.

Another change Haggard hopes to see is the shift of Station No. 2 to the teaching hospital under construction by the Lubbock County Hospital District which also oversees EMS.

He cited "definite advantages"



Continued From Page One many dogs there are when he hears one barking. The loud noise is likely to get you to turn a few lights on, thus scaring the burglar before he ever gets a chance to break in.

While alarm systems offer excellent protection, they are quite expensive, according to Nelson. The best are hooked up to a central alarm system that alerts the police before the burglar gets out of the house. Vibration alarms are also good, he noted, because they send off an alarm when someone walks through the house. If you have pets this alarm isn't for you.

Keeping burglars out of the house is one thing, but once they are in, what do you do? The best thing to do is pretend you're asleep, said Nelson. But playing possum can be quite a challenge especially as one burglary victim explained, "He came in and took the wallet out of my pants right next to my bed."

Reaching for a pistol beside the bed could be more trouble than protection. "The burglar is wide awake and you're probably drousy," said Nelson. "If he wasn't armed before ... you just armed him," he added.

Don't gamble that a burglar won't use a weapon either. An



estimated 60 to 70 per cent of burglaries are committed by drug addicts who are nurting for money and they don't care what they may have to do to get it. Once you've identified him, he won't hesitate to commit another crime — one that could cost you your life.

A woman living alone faces additional problems if she catches a burglar in the act. "In most cases, women are either raped or beat to death," said Nelson.

Although night burglaries are a problem in Lubbock, the chances that your home will be burglarized are even greater during the day.

"Burglars will drive down the street looking for a good target," said Nelson. Places most likely to be hit are corner lots that have easy access from alleys as well as houses that look empty.

Blocks where there are not any children playing outside are easy targets for burglars. The burglar may check out the neighborhood, decide on a house and then ring the doorbell of that house. If no one answers, they break-in.

A garage door left open is an inviting entrance for burglars. "All he has to do is walk into the garage, kick open the door that enters from the garage into the house and he's in," explained Nelson.

Once in the house burglars are most likely to steal guns, stereos, radios, jewelry and televisions. They work fast spending between three and five minutes in a house. If they don't get what they wanted the first time, they'll come back a second time.

That's how one burglar got caught. "They broke in about 9 a.m. then decided to come back after lunch," noted Nelson. "But when they came back for the second time a neighbor had noticed something fishy and had already called the police." If you come home while a burglary is being committed or suspect something is going on, don't go inside the house, warns Nelson. Go to a neighbors and call the police from there

If you're caught in the house and the burglar doesn't know you're there, try to escape from a window. If you have a low voice you may try to phone the police from another room, but if you suspect the burglar may hear you, don't chance it. If the burglar does catch you in the house, hit the front door screaming as loud as you can, advised Nelson.

Don't ever try to reason with a burglar. Since most burglars carry weapons, you have little chance of standing up to someone.

Once the burglar has left your home, call the police. Avoid touching anything that could be a clue.

If all you loose in a burglary is your property, consider yourself lucky, Nelson suggested. While the police try to recover stolen goods, it is obviously a difficult task and even when recovered, property is often damaged beyond repair. But you can't buy a new life.

For once I had to agree with Howard Cosell, who showed justifiable disgust with the performance put on by Muhammed Ali. Ali did nothing for the heavyweight division. If anything, he set it back even farther than it is now.

His lack of attack, his clowning, his gestures to a game young, obviously inexperienced boxer had no place in the fight. It was not worthy of a champion.

At first you got the impression that Ali was clowning to amuse the spectators prior to his unlimbering his big weapons and properly disposing of a boxer who looke only a step ahead of a rank amateur.

The disposition never arrived. Indeed, Ali looked and acted tired. He flicked a left jab often enough to score and win points, but there was nothing resembling a champion. He seemed afraid to wade in and go for the knockout.

By comparison, Ken Norton did the unexpected in a bout with Duane Bobbick that did nothing to enhance the latter. Bobbick was supposed to be the new white hope. Instead, he exhibited nothing to make anyone think he belongs among the topranked fighters.

Norton may have hit him with a sophomore looping right hand, but Bobbick couldn't take even that. He has a long way to go, this former Olympian who was knocked cold by Theophilus Stevenson in the Olympics.

Norton and Jimmy Young could well be the top two heavyweights right now. The sooner they meet if they must, to earn a shot at Ali, the better. Either might beat the champion.

That would dispose of a man who, in the past, has fought the best and handled them easily. It also would open up a weak heavyweight division and could lead to some real fights. Certainly, from what we've seen of late, there is little to turn off reruns for the current grade of battle.

Gerald Myers probably is through recruiting with the acquisition of a guard who appears to have what he needs and wants. With all the height he had obtained, he needed a strong short player.

If indeed Tommy Parks is as good as his reputation, the Raiders have someone to go with Geoff Huston. And the Raiders will have a pair of guards to make any team worry. Certainly drills in the fall will have more than usual interest this year.

The Preakness comes up Saturday, the second leg in racing's triple crown. It promises to be an interesting race with an increasingly larger field going after Seattle Slew.

Eventually I entered some tournaments, with just five clubs in my bag, and was able to play par golf. Later, I added a - would you believe this - a Niblick. That's better known as a 9 iron. It helped in the sand traps.

The clubs, of course, were wooden shafts and I had them for a long, long time. Finally, Gene Mitchell came to my rescue. The Lubbock Country Club pro presented me with a set of matched irons.



#### Successful Bass Fishing

Although fresh water bass fishing is one of the most popular and exciting water sports, your success is greatly determined by your knowledge of the fish and how you deceive it.

The two types of bass vary in characteristics from lake to lake but basically follow the same life styles. The most popular in game fishing is the big mouth bass. The second type of bass, which is harder to catch, is the small mouth. Both prefer a warm environment and live off smaller fish and insects.

The technique you use in fishing for bass can play an important role in your success as a bass fisherman. Since all bass love to put up a fight, it is good to try different ways of catching them. In this way, you can find the technique with which you have best control. Trolling behind a boat is an effective way of catching bass, but if you prefer to fish in the water, wading about waist deep will often bring good results. A trot-line is used very often in catching larger quantities of fish at one time.

successful bass fishing is being in the right place at the right time. In the cooler seasons like spring, bass are found in warm shallow places in the morning and late evening. When it grows hot in the summer, bass usually move on to deeper water and shady areas by mid-afternoon. Bass are very fond of rocky areas.





I lost a dear and beloved friend last week.

You all know her for she was Joan Crawford, one of the all-time great

motion picture stars, a glamorous, exciting woman of vitality, vibrancy and aliveness. A taxi driver this morning described her as "not beautiful but-striking." She was all of that. I think the primary definition of this wonderful person was that she was all woman. She knew she was a woman and she reveled in that fact.



She generated that peculiar, elusive electricity that galvanized any room into which she walked, any restaurant that she crossed, audiences the world over.

My friendship and, I must confess, love affair with Joan Crawford spanned nearly 30 years. It was born out of a chance letter to her when she was at Warner Brothers studios.

I had written a novel, "Mamie Brandon," and I always felt that she would have been the perfect Mamie on the screen. She didn't think so. But I wrote to her and she gently declined. From that slim beginning a correspondance was begun that was to last until last week when I had a birthday and her note arrived. I had the little slip in one hand as I turned in the 5:30 p.m. CBS news and heard the tragic news of her death. She died of a heart attack, in her bed. She was 69 and she was cremated just a week ago.

I am grateful that she went that way. She was to the end the vital and alive person and I could not have accepted her long suffering or disability. She died as she lived, vividly and remembered. Now there is nothing but ashes and a terrible empty feeling of loss within me.

As I said, our friendship, our association, was born with a five cent stamp. Joan had been a star for many years at Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer and I have lived that long that I remember her in the silent films, then the talkies and down through the marvelous years. She was always that fascinating face on the screen as she danced with Fred Astaire, romanced Clark Gable and Franchot Tone, scored as Chrystal in "The Women" and chilled as "Craig's Wife."

A war came and went and then I wrote the book. And then our letters began over the years. I was living at that time just outside of San Francisco, some 400 miles from her home on North Bristol in Bel Aire.

The time ultimately came when she invited me to Los Angeles to visit her. Can you imagine the tension and the thrill of this gawky movie fan ringing her door bell, having the door open and seeing that face right before me?

It was the cook's night off and Joan and her adopted children, Christopher, Cindy, Cathy and Christina, were there alone. She asked me in and she went off to the kitchen and came back with a tray of hors d'ovres. I sprang to my feet to help, but Miss Crawford, by now the

Oscar winner, (for "Mildred Pierce") waved me back to my seat, saying "Don't worry, I got my start doing this!"

That was the key, I think, to Joan Crawford. She had struggled and beat her way to the top. She knew her craft. She was the prime movie star.

There was never a moment that she was not aware of that status. It was unthinkable to her that she would ever appear outside her house without the total make-up, the chic and movie star look.

I remember once sitting behind her in her dressing room at the house while she meticulously "put on her face". I said to her "why do you go to all this trouble, when we're going to take Christina to the dentist in Beverly Hills?" She smiled and said, "Honey, if I stop the car at a light downtown and there is a car with a family from Iowa next to me, I want them to know they've seen a movie star."

Joan abhored the modern screen players, the women, who went off to the supermarket in cut-offs, in blue jeans, their hair in curlers. When this woman appeared, she was Joan Crawford, chic, svelt and in control.

Once, when she was filming the thriller, "Sudden Fear" with Jack Palance, she and the company filmed scenes in San Francisco. Her secretary called me to give me the locations on the San Francisco streets because Joan thought I might be interested in the filming technique. I was. I stood behind the barriers and watched this wonderful woman do her scenes, piloting her Cadillac up the precipituous hills like a truck driver.

At one time at Green Street and Gough the crowd watching the filming interrupted with requests for autographs. The director became angry at the break in filming and that fur-coated, white beaded dress lady spun on her high heel and stared down at him. "When they stop asking for autographs," she said "you and I are finished."


There are so many memories. There is the wealth of love, the sense of humor, the hard, cold driving force. There is the time when I saw "Sudden Fear" with her. She bugged me with questions and I was irritated at having the story line interrupted. I'd turn from the screen to respond to her and here was the face that was before me on the screen.

There was the Labor Day weekend party at her poolside, with the wealth of Hollywood in attendance. It was the night that a pregnant Judy Garland pulled up a straight-backed chair at 4 a.m. and, accompanied by Hoagy Carmichael at a small spinet piano, sang until 7 a.m. to the cream of the Hollywood greats, sprawled out over the lawns in that lush summer's night.

Yes, many, many memories of a great, exciting woman whom I loved very deeply. I could go on with the recall but I must stop. I could write a book about the late, great Joan Crawford. And who knows? Maybe one of these days I shall. I wonder if her four adopted children, now in their 30's it said, remember that for a while they called me "Uncle Jack"?
