The Black Divorce Rate

The divorce rate for Blacks, which is twice the rate of whites, represents a tragic, shattering reality that threatens to prevent us from lorging stable neighborhoods and communities. According to the Census Bu eau, in 1970 83 Black men and women were divorced for every 1,000 who were married. The breakdown for Black men showed 62 divorces for every 1,000 males. For Black women, the civorce rate came to 104 divorces for every 1,000 females. This distrubing count was much higher than

the rate for whites in 1970. There were only 44 white men and women who were divorced for every 1,000 who were still married. The rate of divorce for white men came to 32 men for every 1,000 males, while for white women the divorce rate meaured 56 for every 1,000 females.

By 1980 the figures and the ratios were just as negative. Some 203 Black men and women wer divorced for every 1,000 Blacks. For Black men there were 151 divorces for every 1,000 men; and for Black women there were 257 divorcees for every 1,000 women.

By comparison, in 1980, there were 32 divorced white men and women for every 1,000 persons. For white men the rate was 74 divorcees for every 1,000 men; and for white women there were 110 divorcees for every 1,000 women.

So much for statistics. In Black communities all across the country there have been meetings and conferences aimed at improving Black male-female relations and building Black families that might be in disarray. Too often more questions are generated than answers.

Too often we tend to be overly compative toward one another, without fully examining the external forces, the stress factors associated with acism in white America. We live the Black experience, in many instances, on a social

The Census Bureau reports that Black women, as opposed to white women, are more likely to be married to men who have less education than they do. The result is that professional Blacks may have a difficult time relating to, or living with, other Blacks who are not as skilled or educated.

Relatedly, a high inner city murder rate, other violent crimes, drugs, unemployment, and the prison system diverts many Blacks away from normal family lives. Many Blacks find themselves. struggling to survive in a racist system that will letthem struggle but not survive.

The abandonment of children and wives by Elack men, on the other hand, creates a severe hardship for many Black women who find themselves as the heads of households. The recession makes this condition worse since many of these women find the cost of living rising while their incomes are not. The extra income from another member of the household is sorely m.386d.

More frustration sets in. Distrust mounts. Some population experts are predicting that by the year 2000, eight out of every ten Black households in Chicago, for example, will be

Blacks are subjected to all forms of discrimination and these realities become pressures on struggling Black families. Many Blacks, spurred by media reports praising the merits of the single life, come to the conclusion that they can go it alone.

We must strive to come together and build stronger families in the tradition of our African ancestors. We must be attuned to and resist the changing social attitudes toward marriage and quick legal proceedings which make divorce easy and painless.

We must build strong Black families to build



Professional Advisors Are A Must In Business (Optional)

Mid the fallscy, misconceptions. and indoctrinations that Black businessowners have a business problem, economic and political viewpoints and the many aids to teach the Black businessownwers true business, professional advisors (accountant, attorneys, and consultants) have failed to notice that not only Blacks but white, too, who are classified as in the "small business' segment of business have become a scapegoal or coverup for what is in actuality existing a universal business problem due to lack of understanding the proprietor business structure which is not taught by society.

Thorough research and investigation into the ever present business problems of incompetence, lack of business knowledge, and insufficient operating capital

revealed several facts of truth which explains why not only Blacks, but whites too, are finding it difficult to own and operate a competitive business and make a profit.

It is no secret that a pusiness. embodied with constraints and restrictions, belongs to its owner who must perform or have someone else perform definite functions, roles, duties and take responsibility for the business. It is also true that proper business dictates that there are certain professional advisors every business must have at some point in time, namely an accountant and an attorney.

The inability of society to recognize the make-up of the socalled "small business" group as proprietors, partnerships, and corporations that are in essence brought forth little, if any, constructive academic instructions and informative research material available to both the businessowners and their professional

advisors should they employ them. Concentration in the theorical corporation business structure and the inability to recognized the proprietor/partnership structures leaves unknown the true functions,

roles, duties, roles, responsibilities, and interralationship of both the businessowner and his professional

Specialization in the various fields of taxes, cost, management, and financial investment which have emerged from the giant corporations, legal laws, internal revenue services and personal preference for curporate life have further weakened the gap between the proprietor/partnership businessowners due to the lack of stress or concentration in the study of the proprietor business structure.

The proprietor business structure have a basic language, basic laws with accompanying advantages and disadvantages that governs it, basic customs and basic habits which is the basic foundation to every business structure of what is known as management or a business.

The so-called impossible task by many professional advisors of werking with "small business" clients is possible and can be both financial and personally rewarding when a professional advisor knows and understands the true functions, roles, duties, responsibilities, and interrelationship of both the businessowner and professional advisor and apply the same.

It is true that the present economic conditions may appear bleak for many businesses, but like the oil crisis which covered up the Watergate case for so long and disappeared, so will present economic conditions. However, the rebound of the economic condition may be even more bleaker by unknowledgeable professional advisors who do not know or apply proprietors/partneships have the basic business language, laws, customs and habits as it pertains to

the proprietor business structure. Black Priorities, Our Salvation Must Come From Usli

BALTIMORE, MD. — June 15-19, 1982 — After observing Black people from across America joining hands, spending their hard earned \$\$\$ on transportation, lodging and food, and come together to discuss the ills of our deteriorating communities across the country:

The first of a series of meetings between B. M. I. and the National Assault-on-Illiteracy Council, collectively working together. B. M. I. publishers working together all across America — involving over 100 national Black organizations — are working together collectively to wage war on the pressing problem of staggering illiteracy in our communities. With over 44% of our young people, 18 years cld and over reading at the 4th grade level or below, the future looks bleak. But thank God for the National Ascault-on-Illiteracy Council and B. M. I. newspapers across America. Let it be told that help is on the way!

Later, there will be much more, including what you an do locally to help.

NNPA, the oldest publishers association, held its 42nd annual convention. It's theme was Renassance of the Black Press. Publishers of Brack newspapers from across America participated. There were newspapers with circulations of hundreds to thousands; from future publishers to present publishers; newspapers who were over a 100 years old. The icing came when the national meeting was held in Baltimore on the 90th birthday of the Baltimore Afro-American.

The topics discussed in the various work sessions were those which affect Black publications across America. Some of the topics included how to improve readership, production trends, advertising, editorials, financial management, marketing, and many other subjects of mutual interest to Black newspapers across this nation.

It was good to see Black people from America come together to share successes, failures, problems and solutions which affect us as a people across America.

The underling factor which evolved was if we are to make it, it is up to us to take the initative and lead in helping us to help ourselves.

We heard some dynamic words of wisdom from

Congressman Parren Mitchell, Congressman

Cus Savaga — the Independent from Chicago who is an ex-publisher and the first Black journalist in history to be in Congress, and of course, the illustrious Rev. Jesse Jackson who said we are sleeping giants in holes. We are the 9th largest nation in the world in captivity. We bring in over one hundred forty billion dollars into the Black Kingdom, but guess what, we send out over one hundred thirty nine billion as a sleeping giant. Brother Jackson says in his travels, in any town or city, he goes to ask a brother where the ald office is located. They argue to tell himi But when he ask where is the trade office, no one knows.

The overall summation was economic development and self help. We cannot set back and expect white folk to help us when we are still concerend about the aid office. We can't expect the white folk to help us when we don't know where the trade office is. We can't expect white folk to help us when we won't help curselves. We're bickering and jocking for position. Arguing for a street name change. We must keep in mind that the most important thing is some of those who are arguing about the name change were not diciples of Dr. King when he lived. They called him and apitator, and said we don't need outside agitators to help us, because we are doing fine and can handle our own problems.

Really, Martin would not want a street named after him with nothing on it. Put something on the street first, then that would be an honor. Let's build a trade office or center on the street. Let's put some Black office buildings on the street. Let's put some warehouses on the street. Then change the name of the street, or name the buildings and warehouses for all of our Black heros. Martin would be a lot happier if something with a positive nature was named after him. Martin did not die as long as he was in social action programs. Only when he got into the economic development aspect was he killed.


In upcoming weeks, we will give some answers on the plight of Black people and how to overcome. We have always heard the problems, but now we will give some of the answers.

PAC MEN MENANCE TO BLACKS

The effects of being eaten alive is only felt at the moment of the bite. Black Americans unfortunately are being bitten on a regular basis. According to the 1979 edition of the National Roster of Black Elected Officials, there has been a yearly decline of Black American elected officials from 17 percent in 1975 to two percent in 1979. In addition, the total number of Black elected officials is less than one percent of all elected officials in this nation. The national published average in 12.7 percent for Black Americans in the country. Some of this eating is cannibalism. But not all. PAC men are culprits too.

Considering the current resident of the White House is whittling away at the federal budget, Black Americans need all the political strength they can muster. Money is not on our side. The Congressional Budget Office shows that taxes as a percentage of Gross National Product will gradually decline from 20.6 percent this year to 17.7 percent in 1987. A fourteen percent drop in five years of available funds to finance the economy. This does not take into effect the dramatic shift of funds from social self-help programs over to war making defense spending. Such military spending shall exceed \$1 trillion.

thank your lucky stars. Some startling effects, have already sliced American thinking Senate ranks down. Senators Birch Bayh and Church are casualties of the crime of Political Action Committee (PAC). The political action committees or PAC's formed by special interests, are multiplying as fast as cockroaches in a dirty kitchen according to a professor of Economics at the University of Maryland. In 1974 there were 600 by 1980 almost 2,000. The top 20 corporate PAC contributors whose contributions have gone to the most conservative candidates, should be flagged as a califor for the poor and Black Americans in the country.

Among them are Blue dell, Inc., a western and sportswear manufacturer who gave one hundred percent of its cash contribution to conservative candidates, Goors employees PAG, beer brewers, contributed \$119,000 to all federal races of which 95 32 percent went to conservative candidates, Schering-Plough Crop., Maybelline and St. Joseph Aspirin and Dart & Kraft Inc., Miracle Whip, Tupperware and Sealtest Ice Cream paid out over 95 percent of their lunds to defeat candidates supportive to Black American causes. Consider these items the next time you visit yoru local liquor or grocery store. Some say you pay for what you get, but you might not get what you pay for these days: It's a video world. false pictures are in style.

nation's black colleges.

White-oriented institutions of higher learning, especially when faced with actual and anticipated losses of income through a decrease in enrollments, have made a major bid for black students. Federal and state funds have assisted white colleges massively in this regard, with relatively smaller grants often going to our historically black-oriented colleges. Still, the majority of black students who graduate from college and the majority of blacks who compete successfull; in the nation's graduate schools are those who have enrolled in black colleges.

There are 107 recognized black four-year colleges in the United States. Sixty-three of these colleges with a student population of approximately 170,000 -- are publicly supported. Forty-four are private and church related and most are associated with the United Negro College Fund. The student population of the private black colleges is approximately 50,000.

Black public and private colleges have been castigated as offering inferior education — under the tenuous but long-held assumption that a separate (or black emphasized) education meant an education unfit for a society in which desegragation was the rule. The early result of this kind of attack was an increased neglect of black student needs, and of the colleges which served them. Fifty percent of the students at private black colleges came from families earning less than \$9,000 annually and 90% require financial aid. Nationally, only 14 percent come from families earning less than \$9,000.

Black Monitor recites the fact that when black colleges have had to rely upon white charity, many compromises had often been made, which obstructed opportunities to tailor curriculum to meet pressing black student needs as blacks themselves have seen them. And when black churches — often in a precarious financial condition themselves in the past — have been the base for funding of black colleges, the business affairs (including the salary base for faculty and staff) have been — a most critical need for black community and alumni support— on a centinuing massive and dependable basis for all of our nation's private black colleges.

After teaching for a few years in Texas where she was born, she received a call to come to New Mexico. This year, she completed some thirty-six years of teaching and "loving" children.

Many honors, flowers, awards, etc. have come her way in recent days and she is modestly proud of all of them. Newspapers, radio and other media have heralded her life in Hobbs as "a teacher and a friend." One example is from radio station KPER which reads:

South Atlantic battle: Part 2

The battle for the Falklands/Malvinas is over. But the

battle for the South Atlantic will continue.

The struggle to militarize the ocean separating Africa and South America involves a tentative alliance of many of the nations that were at odds until Stanley fell in mid-June Over the past few years, Paraguay, South Africa, Chile, Uruguay, the United States, Britain, Argentina and Brazil have entered into an unannounced treaty relationship to secure

control of the South Atlantic for Western interests.

Every month 3,000 ships cross the South Atlantic carrying 80 percent of the old supplies of the NATO member states and 70 percent of their strategic minerals. Thus, keeping the ucean open is of vital importance to military planners in the

North and South Atlantic.

Under the proposed alliance, NATO would supply the navies of these friendly South Atlantic countries with the

Until recently the unsavory international reputation of South Africa and several of the South American states made such an arrangement politically unterable. Seven years 2go, domestic objections forced the British to abandon the most suphisticated naval base in the region. Simonstown in South Africa. The alliance faced another threat in 1977, when the United Nations implemented an arms embargo against South Africa.

But international revulsion at South Africa's apartheid policies did not stop the growing military ties between South Africa, Chile and Argentina — with the apparent covert sup-

port of the Western powers.

Ronald Reagan's election changed the equation in the South Atlantic. The administration's emphasis on increased American military strength and improved relations with those three countries has given further impetus to the still-secret alliance.

In May 1981, military experts from Chile, Paraguay, Uruguay, Brazil, Argentina, Socth Africa and the United States quietly gathered in Argentina for a privately sponsored "inter-America, symposium" on future military cooperation, an embryonic "South Atlantic Treaty Organization."

It is still too early to determine whether the battle for the Falklands/Malvinas has permanently damaged the alliance's chances for success. The Reagan administration clearly intends to do all it can to heal that breach and to foster strong military cooperation to protect the South Atlantic as an open passageway for the oil and minerals needed by the NATO states.

Meanwhile, it is certain that South Africa's Lies with argentina and her neighbors in the Non-Aligned Movement will continue to grow at they have for more than 15 years.

The Sunday Times of Johannesburg, for example, recently reported the existence of a secret 13-year-old treaty among South Africa, Argentina, Brazil. Urugusy, Taiwan and Israel. Argentina's charge d'affaires in Pretoria, Alfredo Oliva Day, admitted that there was a treaty but refused to divulge its details.

According to the Times, 38 high-ranking generals from the treaty states have visited South Africa in the past 12 months. Among them was Gen Mario Benjamin Merendez, the operational chief of staff of the Argentine array and briefly the governor of the Malvinas.

Other South African press reports say that Pretoria supplied Argentina with missiles, ammunition and spare parts during its battle with Britain. The Johannesburg Star reported that spare parts for Mirage jets and Israeli-designed missiles manufactured in South Africa were flown to Argentina from Cape Town on Uruguayan planes.

In April, South Africa's minister of foreign affairs, Roelof Botha, told his parliament that "there is an understanding on the military level" between South Africa and Argentina, including an agreement on "joint naval exercises."

Finally, before the recent hostilities, the South African press reported that four Argentine military men stationed is South Africa as diplomats had been the chief torturars of the Escuela Mechanica de la Armada, which Amnesty International has blarred for the deaths of 4,000 Argentines between 1974 and 1978. One of them — Alfredo Astiz — was subsequently appointed governor of South Georgia and captured by the British when they seized that island.
