Willie Louise Sparks Receives Degree In Nursing City Shakespearean Essay Contest Winner



Miss Willie Louise Sparks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ervin Sparks, was born August 19, 1940. She is a member of Mt. Vernon Methodist church, where she served as church school secretary and teacher. She attended school in Lubbock, and graduated from Dunbar High school in May of 1958. While a student at Dunbar she was a member of the Y-Teen, Band, NHA, Student Council and yearbook staff.

In 1959 she entered Wayland Baptist College in Plainview, Texas. While at Wayland she received a \$300 scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to all students who graduate in the upper ten of the high school class. She also served on the dormitory council.

In the fall of 1960 Willie entered Dillard University at New Orleans, Louisiana, majoring in nursing. Miss Sparks took requirements for the B.S. degree at the university, and affiliated at Flint Goodridge and Charity hospitals for experience in medicine, surgery, pediatrics and obstetrics.

In the summer of 1962, Miss Sparks affiliated at the Veterans Administration hospital in Tuskogee, Alabama, for psychiatry.

Returning to Dillard in September, 1963, she affiliated with the Public Health Department of New Orleans. While doing public health work she received some experience in school nursing in New Orleans public schools.

During her tenure of study at Dillard, Miss Sparks received three scholarships from the Avalon Foundation. She was a member of the College Chapter NAACP and San Flamina Nursing club. She was elected senior class nursing for homecoming.

On June 1, she was the recipient of a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing, and on June 29-30 will take the Louisiana state board to become a registered nurse.

In the near future Miss Sparks plan to begin working in one of the local hospitals. For further advancement she plans to go into the field of anesthesia.

She is very proud to be one of the first graduates of Dunbar to enter into the field of nursing. She feels very indebted to the faculty of Dunbar high school where she received her basic preparation.

Miss Sparks stated, "Nursing is a very rewarding and challenging profession for people who are willing to apply themselves."

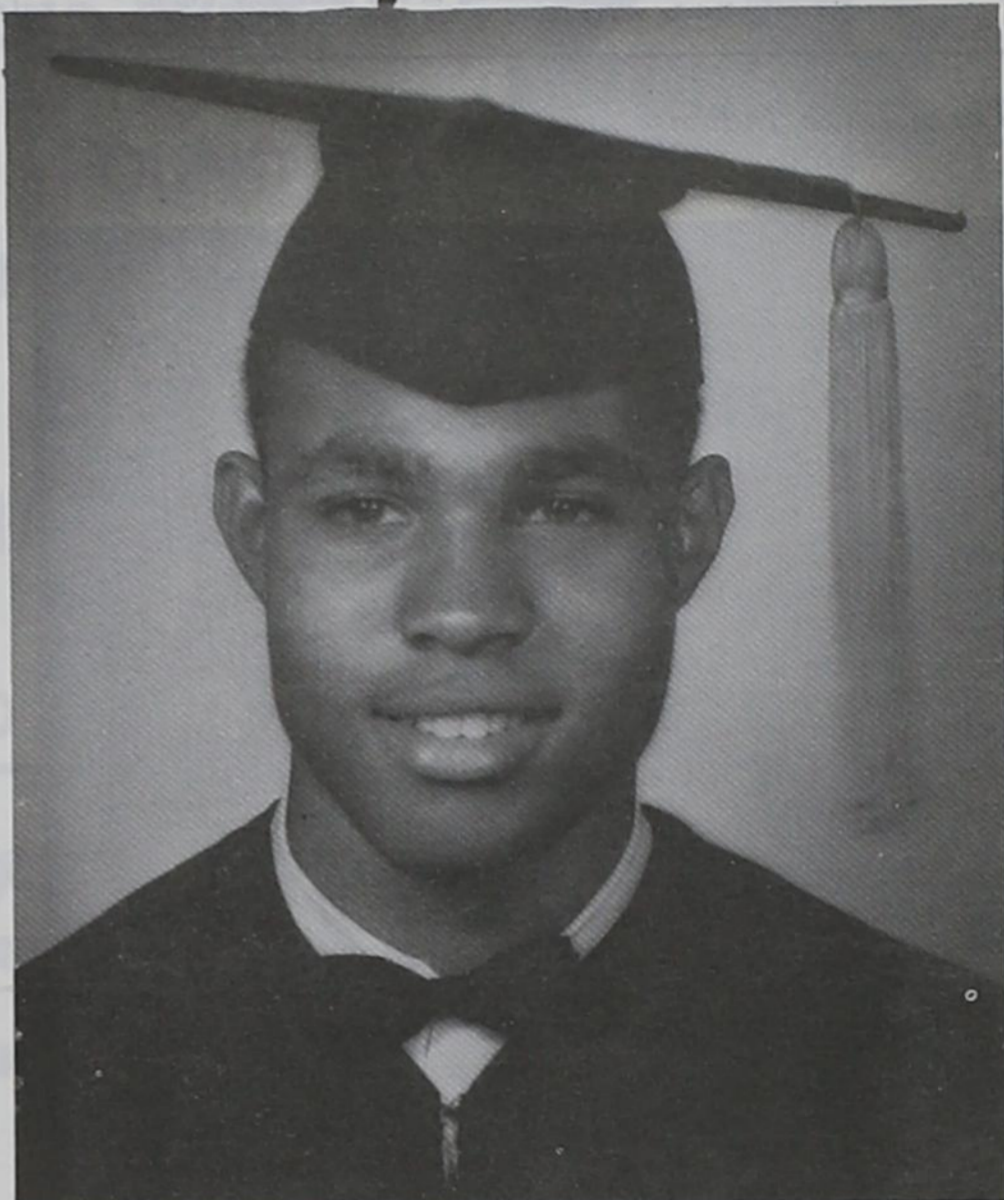
Rev. Parhams is pastor of the New Jerusalem Baptist church here in Lubbock.

Donald J. Scott, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Scott, Jr., is the winner of the city Shakespearean Essay Contest. Lubbock's Shakespearean Club sponsored the contest which included participants from the three Lubbock high schools: Dunbar High, Lubbock High, and Monterey High.

Donald's theme, "Shakespeare's Environment in Retrospect," tells of the experiences one might have had if he made an imaginary trip to the Globe theater (the site of Shakespeare's plays) during the early days of William Shakespeare's career.

In his essay he stated, "Being a product of the twentieth century and subject to modern ideas and concepts, I find it extremely difficult to imagine life as my parents have depicted it in their childhood days, much less in the days of William Shakespeare."

He is a member of the 1964 graduating Dunbar class. He was the highest ranking boy scholastically and the third ranking in the class. Donald was a speaker at Dunbar's graduating exercises and in athletic competition he won the AA championship in high jumping at Prairie View A&M college during May.



His advisor for the theme was Mrs. B. J. Brown. The prize was a volume of "The Complete Works of Shakespeare."

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Floyd King, Jr. Rites Read

Mr. Floyd King, Jr., died last Thursday at Methodist hospital after a long illness. He was a resident of Lubbock for 35 years. Mr. King was an example of what can be accomplished by an individual by hard work and a determination to succeed.

Floyd was born and reared in the rural area at Bing Sandy, Texas. He was a son of Mr. Floyd and Pearl King, a member of a family of nine children, five boys and four girls.

At the age of 16 he began work at a saw mill and was employed there four years. Then he was hired on a good road job where he drove a team of mules 14 hours each day. He then began to think of a better way to earn a living with a few less hours and a little more pay. So he left East Texas and came to Fort Worth.

The lure of oil field labor brought him to Eastland, Texas, where he started work in a hotel. In hotel his success seemed to begin, and before long he was sure of a firm foundation. He worked in some of the leading hotels in five different states, namely: Oklahoma, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado and Texas. Finally Mr. King decided to settle in Texas, and with that decision he started buying real estate consisting of lots.

For five years he was employed with E. McElroy and four years for D. O. Gentry here in the Hub City. From a farm boy, saw mill worker



and an owner and operator of a combination grocery store, cafeteria, and drug store with a hotel in between, and the modern King's Steak House, was definitely a journey of a bare-foot boy to the successful businessman of Mr. Floyd King, Jr. His basic ability to become successful was the high ideal, a will to win, a technique for making friends, and hard work.

His first marriage in early age to Miss Fannie King ended in divorce after a few years. During this marriage one daughter was born,

Dosha Mae. Later, in 1927, he was married to Miss Hortense Talbert of Waco. She has been a constant source of inspiration and a partner in his success through his life. The Kings celebrated their 35th wedding anniversary on May 13.

Another daughter, Pearl, joined this household, and this couple has been a mother and father to many other children.

Mr. King was a member of Bethel A.M.E. church, treasurer of the trustee board, and a highly respected

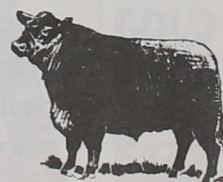

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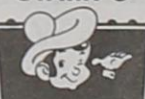
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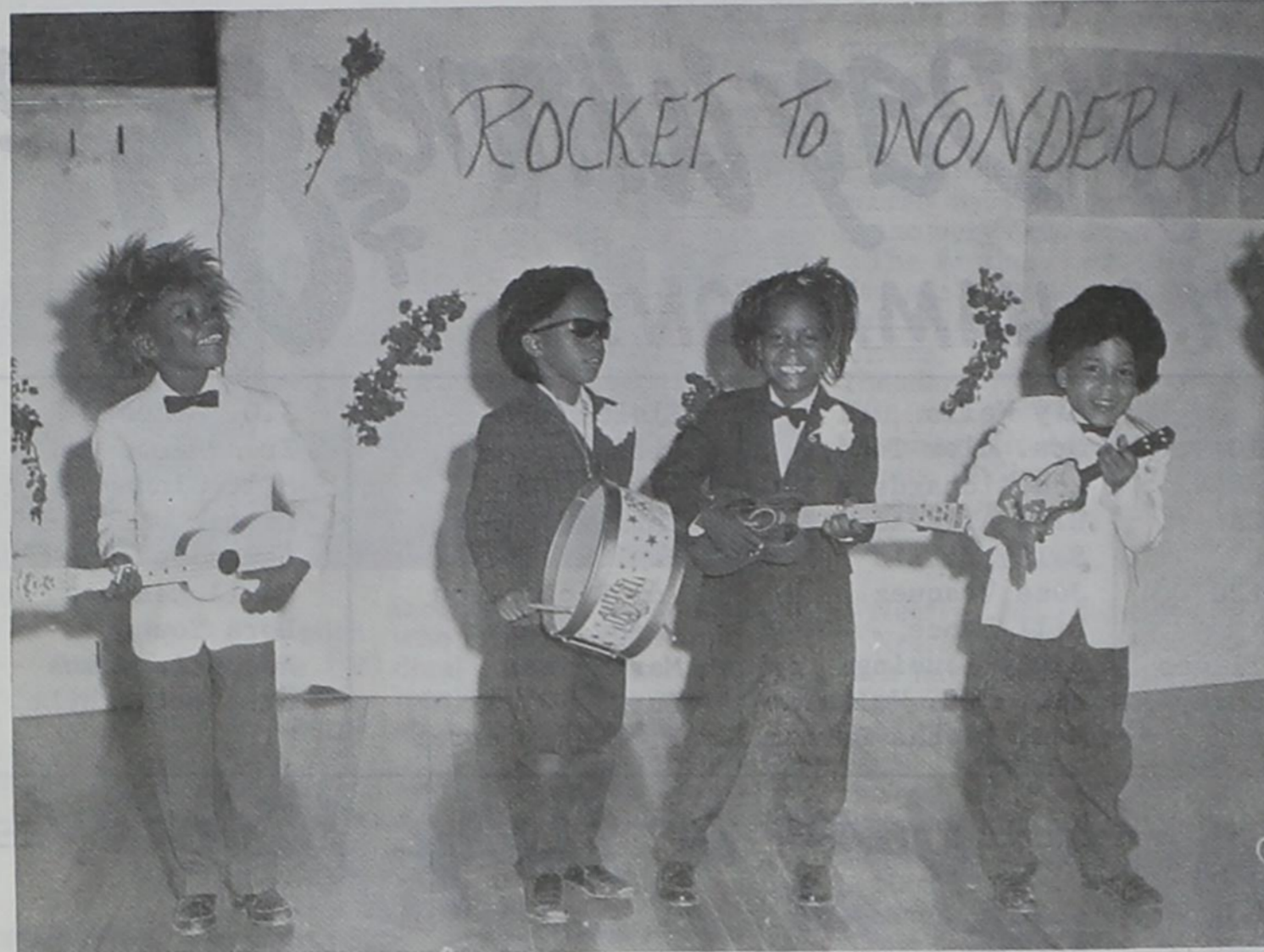
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WHAT—The Beatles?
