NEW CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS TO ALTER LUBBOCK'S SKYLINE

Lubbock's rapidly changing skyling will be taking on still another new appearance with construction of two federal building projects-- a new post office and a federal courthouse and office building scheduled in the near future.

Total expenditure for the two projects, which will be completely sepa-

rate facilities, is expected to exceed more than \$7.5 million.

The post office will be located on a two-block site on Avenue G and along 15th Street and 16th Street. This location is about three blocks southeast of the current post office. Cost of the new facility is expected to be completed in November, this month, and to exceed \$2.1 million.

The post office will be a government-owned facility rather than the usual lease arrangement followed by the Post Office Department. Plans for the building are expected to be completed in November, this month, and bids probably will be taken early next year.

The single-story building, which will have offices on a mezzanine floor, will contain approximately 84,600 square feet. A vehicle maintenance facility will be located on the two-block site and will contain 7,017 square feet. There will be 185 off-street parking spaces for official, visitor, and employee vehicles at the post office site.

The multi-story federal courthouse and office building will be located on a two-block site just south of the Lubbock County Courthouse. The two blocks are bounded on the north by Broadway, on the south by 14th Street, on the east by Avenue H and on the west by Texas Avenue.

Actual construction of the \$5 million facility is expected to begin in late 1966 or early 1967. The structure will house federal district courtroom and offices for various federal agencies now scattered through Lubbock.

Preliminary estimates called for 174,000 square feet gross for the structure. At least 120 parking spaces will be provided on the site to accommodate employees, officials, and visitors.

Construction of the facility will require closing 13th Street for one block between Avenue H and Texas Avenue.

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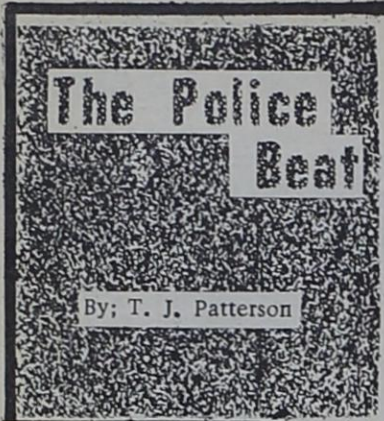

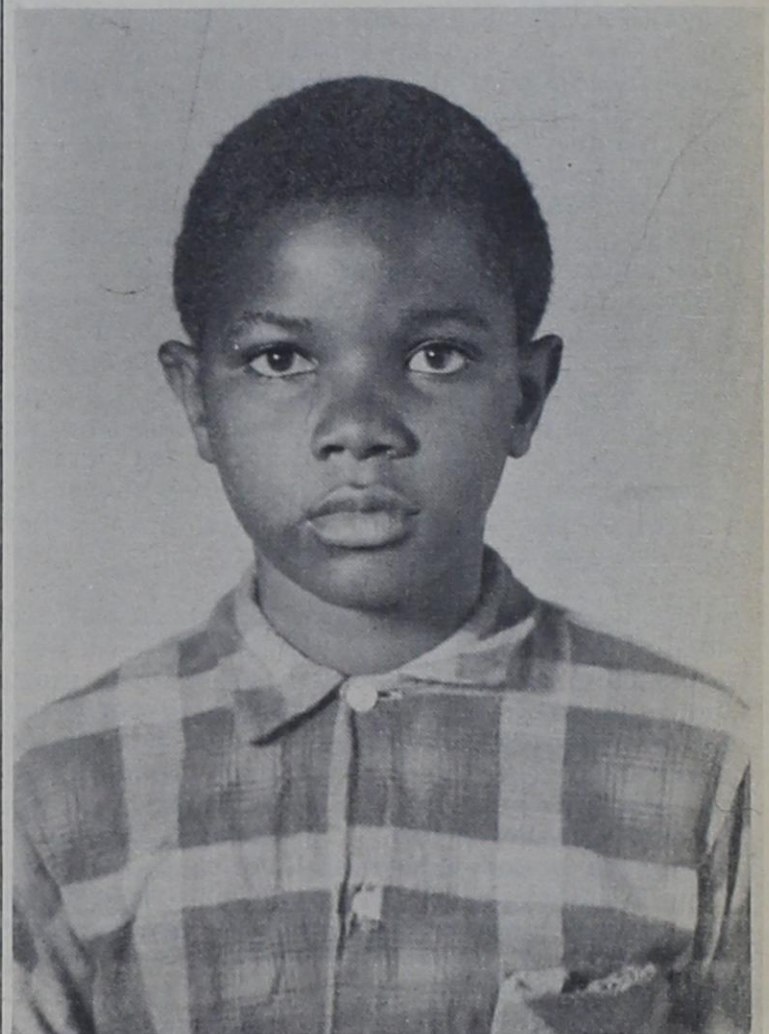

It also represents independence to them. With the money they will earn they can then do the many things they have dreamed about! Above all, they will no longer have to listen to all those representatives of authority--teachers, parents, law officers, and the rest. They will be free. So they say and think.

As the thought is father to the act, most youth tend to drop out of school. Unfortunately, they soon find that the few dollars they earn do not alleviate their situation. Since they were poorly prepared for work to rise them out of their poverty, they become further enmeshed therein. This is so for a number of reasons.

In the first place, these youth have no idea of the thousands of jobs that exist in the economy. Furthermore, they are even less aware of what they can do or what abilities they may possess which could be developed. Their thoughts are centered on one idea and that is to get away from school and be independent. But jumping out of the frying pan has just dumped them into the fire. And they soon learn that the authority of teachers and parents is far better to live under than the authority of the employer, the supervisor, and others who are over them in the job world.

Above all, they soon learn the authority of economics which says, "if you don't work, you won't eat or have the basic necessities of food, clothing, and shelter." Such authority is worse than the severest of tyrants they have ever experienced previously. They can't leave their present job in order to find a better one. How are they to support themselves tied to their job, just as surely as if they were bound with ropes. As they get older, they find that their income doesn't improve much, although their needs and wants keep growing every day. Eventually, they find that they are stuck in the mud and they can't get out.

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY CASE REPORTED HERE

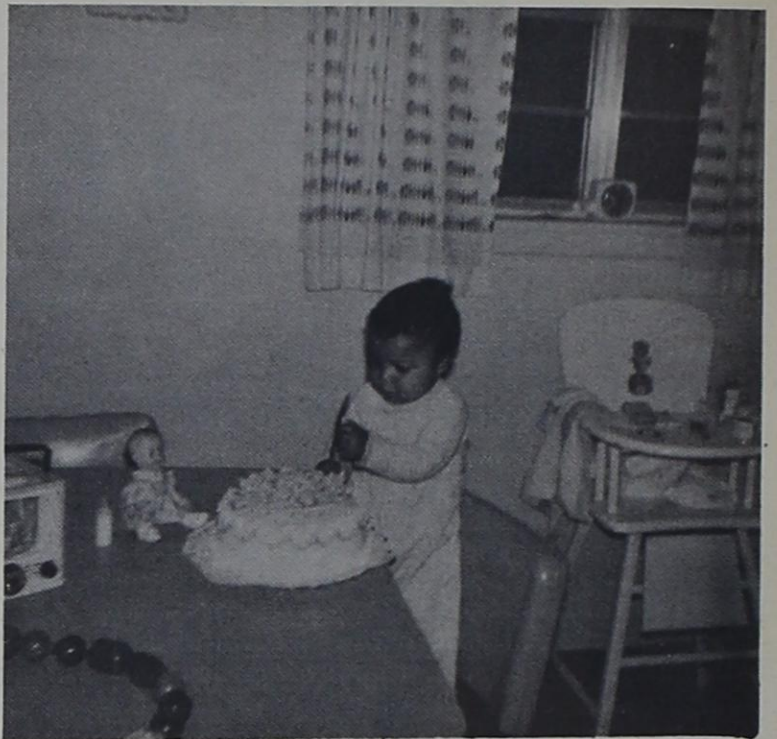

Some of the more outstanding symptoms of dystrophy are: (1) Difficulty in going up stairs. (2) Have a tendency to fall. (3) Will develop a waddling gait. (4) A sort of "flat" smile and cannot whistle or drink through a straw.
