Some of you have probably asked "What about my new assessment?" Again they say the ratio of assessed value to market value is not being

The City Council and School Board have decided to continue to use a ratio of 2/3 (66 2/3%) of market value for assessment purposes. The point is that in the past, property has been assessed on the basis of 2/3 of 1949 market values. Assessments will now be based on 2/3 of market values as of January 1, 1965.

Market Value is the 1965 value of your property. It is the price that might be agreed on between a

willing buyer and a willing seller.

For example, if your property is worth \$8,000 ---your assessed value would be 2/3 of \$8,000 which is about \$5,334.00.

Another question you may ask is: "How do I

figure my taxes?"

The School District's 1964 tax rate was \$1.65 per \$100 of assed value. It is hoped that the new equalization program will allow this rate to be reduced to approximately \$1.55 per \$100 of assessed value. The City's 1964 tax rate was \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value. It is hoped that this program will allow the City's rate to be reduced to approximately \$1.25 per \$100 of assessed value.

The 1965 Board of Equalization requests that if you feel the assessed value on your property is more than 2/3 of fair market value, please do

the following:

- 1. Check with the Tax Department at City Hall for an explanation of how your tax value was determined. Also, see if there are any possible errors made as to the type of construction and age of your property.
- 2. In the event you are not satisfied with the explanation of the Tax Department and desire to file a reguest for a hearing before the Board of Equalization, please register with the Tax Department.
- When you appear before the Board, be prepared to give only figures and facts as to why you feel your tax value is more than 2/3 of fair market value.
- 4. The Board of Equalization will give full consideration to all facts concerning the fair market value of your property as of January 1, 1965.

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



The point is that in the past, property has been assessed on the basis of 2/3 of 1949 market values. Assessments will now be based on 2/3 of market values as of January 1, 1965.

Market Value is the 1965 value of your property. It is the price that might be agreed on between a willing buyer and a willing seller.

For example, if your property is worth \$8,000 ---your assessed value would be 2/3 of \$8,000 which is about \$5,334.00.

Another question you may ask is: "How do I

figure my taxes?"

The School District's 1964 tax rate was \$1.65 per \$100 of assed value. It is hoped that the new equalization program will allow this rate to be reduced to approximately \$1.55 per \$100 of assessed value. The City's 1964 tax rate was \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value. It is hoped that this program will allow the City's rate to be reduced to approximately \$1.25 per \$100 of assessed value.

The 1965 Board of Equalization requests that if you feel the assessed value on your property is more than 2/3 of fair market value, please do

the following:

- 1. Check with the Tax Department at City Hall for an explanation of how your taxvalue was determined. Also, see if there are any possible errors made as to the type of construction and age of your property.
- In the event you are not satisfied with the explanation of the Tax Department and desire to file a reguest for a hearing before the Board of Equalization, please register with the Tax Department.
- 3. When you appear before the Board, be prepared to give only figures and facts as to why you feel your tax value is more than 2/3 of fair market value.
- 4. The Board of Equalization will give full consideration to all facts concerning the fair market value of your property as of January 1, 1965. **********

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



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
