The young Panthers, with three victories under their belt--Anderson of Austin, Hamilton Park, and Kirkpatrick of Fort Worth--fell into the hands of the Dragons of Carver-Amarillo last Saturday night 22-14, at Amarillo in a non-conference tilt.

The same two teams will meet on November 3 in Lubbock in a District 1-AAA contest.

Carver scored all of their points in the first half when Ronny Shanklin who took the pigskin 56 yards on a punt return; Dennis Turner eluded Panthers for 35 yards on a triple reverse; and later in the second quarter Donnell Owens scampered some 30 yards around end to climax the scoring plus providing enough points to win the ball game. Besides the two conversions by Johnny Allen, Aaron Hobbs added two points on a run.

Despite the effort to score in the first half, the Panthers came back in the third quarter on a screen pass from Paul Daniels to James Gary for some 55 yards. Roy Lampkin ran over the two pointer.

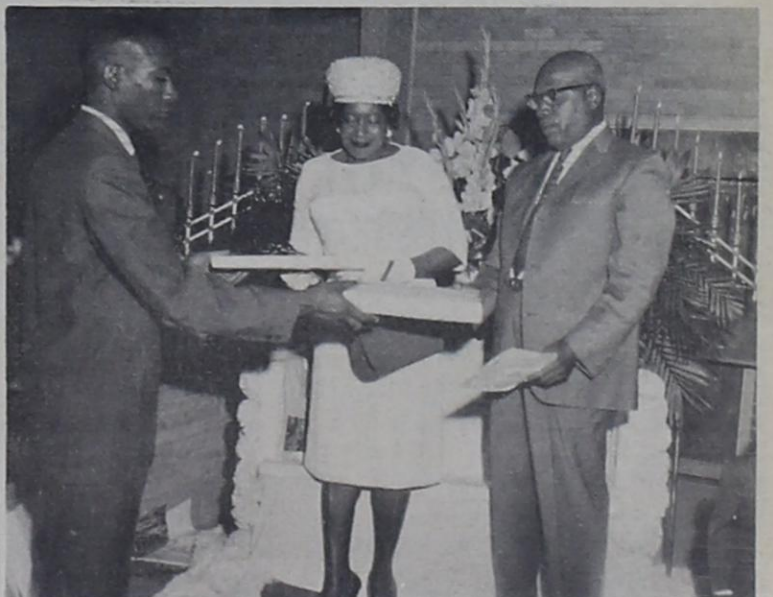
The Fourteenth Anniversary is now under way at the Greater St. Luke Baptist Church, corner 26th and Cedar, and will end on Sunday, October 9th.

KEEP 'EM IN SCHOOL

It is estimated that a million students will drop out of school this coming year. Almost inevitably a disproportionate number of these dropouts will be Negro students, who will be starting their working lives without a very bright future before them.

Unfortunately, most of these potential dropouts seldom, if ever, read the editorial pages of a newspaper, so that this appeal must be aimed at their parents and neighbors who do, in the hope that the importance of an education can be brought home to them.

Today, to get a good job, one needs a good education.....

The first thing most employers ask for is the amount of education the job applicant has accumulated, and unless you have the training necessary to handle a good job, your application generally winds up in file 13 (a trash can).

If your child is in school now....urge him to stay there, even if it means a real sacrifice to the family income. If he has already dropped out of school, remind him that he can still get plenty of valuable training outside the classroom. Send him to talk to the Youth Counselor of his local State Employment Service.

A good education makes a lot of difference in what the future holds for today's youth, mostly in a lot of practical things.....like a good job, a good salary, and a better share of the good things in LIFE.

HOW TO KEEP OUT OF TROUBLE

If children were taught in the home by their parents and in the schools and Sunday Schools by their teachers, one simple little rule of action, think of the sorrow and suffering it would save, not to mention the countless millions of dollars.

This rule of action wouldn't require any new laws, it wouldn't cost a dime of taxpayers money and it would reduce the cost of law enforcement and court trials. Respect for the rule would eventually become automatic with most children as they grew up.....

There wouldn't be so many news reports of murder, robbery, kidnapping, rape, purse snatching, automobile stealing, and many more common felonies of the present day and time.

Exactly what is the rule of action that would reduce our vicious crime record, if it became part of the thinking of children when it was taught to them daily by their parents and schools, along with suitable illustrations of what it meant?

Here is a rule that should fit the RULE OF ACTION....."KEEP YOUR HANDS OFF OTHER PEOPLE'S PROPERTY." Believe you me--it's as simple as that to KEEP OUT OF TROUBLE.....

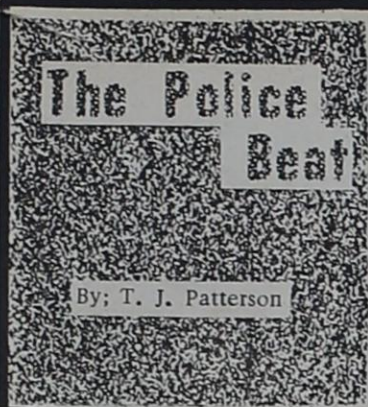
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IT WAS LIKE THIS....

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Model Life Wins Prison Escapee Freedom

Tallahassee, Fla.-(Special)-Because he has lived a model life as a father and churchman since escaping from a Georgia prison 26 years ago, Charles Kemp, 62, was spared the ordeal of returning there to serve out the remainder of a life sentence for murder.

A solution has been worked out between the governors of Georgia and Florida to squash an extradition request to return Kemp to the Georgia prison.

Kemp was sentenced in 1939 to life imprisonment for the murder of another Negro but escaped to Fort Myers, Florida, after serving

16 days of the sentence. He has lived a model life since.

Kemp's prison background was revealed after he was arrested on a traffic charge. The arresting officer was among Fort Myers citizens pleading for the freedom of the father of five children.

Unfortunately, most of these potential dropouts seldom, if ever, read the editorial pages of a newspaper, so that this appeal must be aimed at their parents and neighbors who do, in the hope that the importance of an education can be brought home to them.

Today, to get a good job, one needs a good education.....

The first thing most employers ask for is the amount of education the job applicant has accumulated, and unless you have the training necessary to handle a good job, your application generally winds up in file 13 (a trash can).

If your child is in school now....urge him to stay there, even if it means a real sacrifice to the family income. If he has already dropped out of school, remind him that he can still get plenty of valuable training outside the classroom. Send him to talk to the Youth Counselor of his local State Employment Service.

A good education makes a lot of difference in what the future holds for today's youth, mostly in a lot of practical things.....like a good job, a good salary, and a better share of the good things in LIFE.

HOW TO KEEP OUT OF TROUBLE

If children were taught in the home by their parents and in the schools and Sunday Schools by their teachers, one simple little rule of action, think of the sorrow and suffering it would save, not to mention the countless millions of dollars.

This rule of action wouldn't require any new laws, it wouldn't cost a dime of taxpayers money and it would reduce the cost of law enforcement and court trials. Respect for the rule would eventually become automatic with most children as they grew up.....

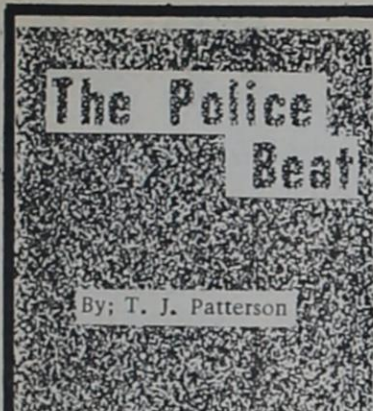

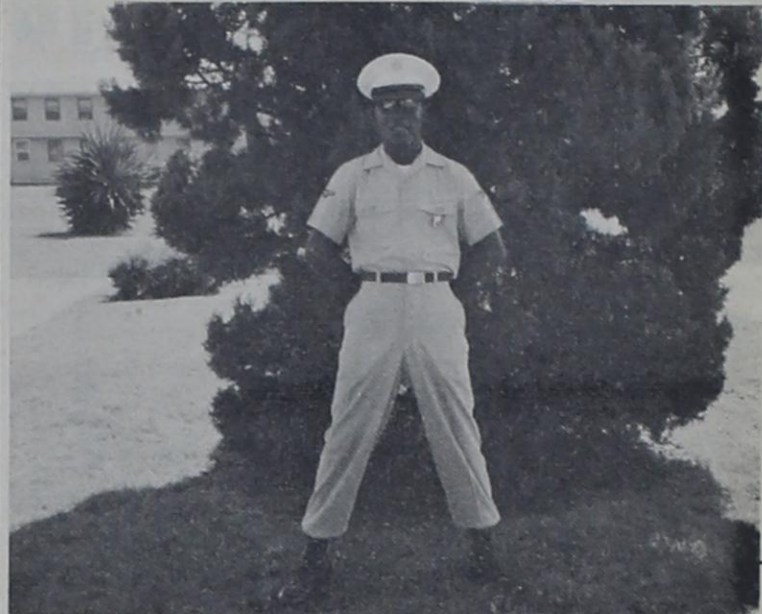

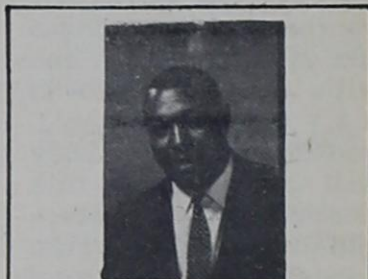

Model Life Wins Prison Escapee Freedom

Tallahassee, Fla.-(Special)-Because he has lived a model life as a father and churchman since escaping from a Georgia prison 26 years ago, Charles Kemp, 62, was spared the ordeal of returning there to serve out the remainder of a life sentence for murder.

A solution has been worked out between the governors of Georgia and Florida to squash an extradition request to return Kemp to the Georgia prison.

Kemp was sentenced in 1939 to life imprisonment for the murder of another Negro but escaped to Fort Myers, Florida, after serving 16 days of the sentence. He has lived a model life since.

Kemp's prison background was revealed after he was arrested on a traffic charge. The arresting officer was among Fort Myers citizens pleading for the freedom of the father of five children.

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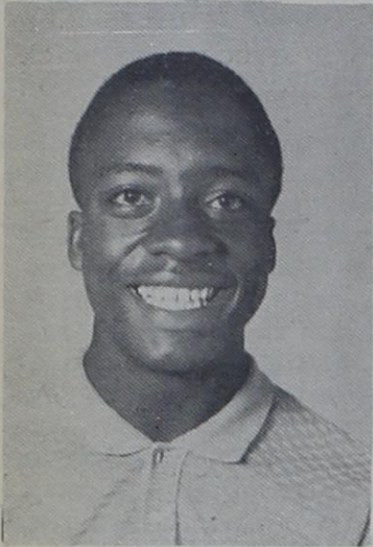

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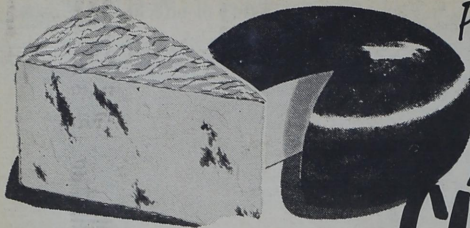
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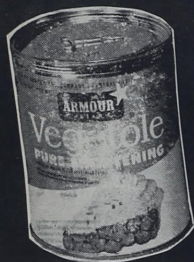
