The new excise tax bill totally eliminates a number of these levies--such as the World War II and Korean War "nuisance taxes"--and substantially reduces others. This, it is hoped, will lead to an increase in consumer spending and a shot in the arm for the economy generally. Another hope is that the losses to the Treasury will be offset by increases in individual and corporate taxes resulting from stimulated business.

Further, Administration spokesmen have been saying that still more tax cuts are in the offing though no date has been mentioned. And Congress is undoubtedly in a tax-cutting mood these days.

All of this comes under the heading of welcome news. At the same time, there are a number of "ifs", "ands", and "buts" involved. There are factors which cannot yet be measured, and whose influence may prove to be vitally important. David Lawrence dealt with some of them in one of his recent columns, and raised questions which must ultimately be answered.

For one thing, as he pointed out, "...the states are beginning to take advantage of the situation to increase their own taxes so as to get some of the money that isn't going to be collected by the U.S. Treasury." In the next five years, state taxes may increase by a whopping 79 per cent. That will happen if the present trend continues. During this legislative year, there have been substantial tax increases in a number of the states. Sales taxes have been upped, as have income taxes, and special levies such as those on cigarettes.

Along with this, Mr. Lawrence then observed it looks as if federal spending is just about certain to materially increase, particularly if there is any slow down in business activity. And in his view, "The gamble for continuing prosperity, while ignoring treasury deficits, cannot go indefinitely." No one really knows if the tax cuts will be offset by higher revenues from the income taxes. That is still in the category of hope, and only time can tell if it is justified or not.

What concerns Mr. Lawrence, and many others, is that if the hope is not realized there may be a loss of confidence in the dollars, followed by more inflation. He recognizes that government officials are certain that the means exist to prevent inflation on a serious scale, but as he puts it, "Inflation...is often a matter of mass psychology." The anti-inflation weapons that would be brought into play might work. On the other hand, they might not.....

Mr. Lawrence concluded his piece with these words: "it remains to be seen whether the increases in the state taxes and other burdens on the national economy will demolish the Administration's optimistic theory that prosperity can be achieved by more and more government spending and more and more borrowing to meet annual deficits." This, clearly, is one of the great unanswered questions of the time. It is certainly evident that the tax cuts, already made or pending, will be of little or no value if they are offset by increased taxes of other kinds, or by a higher cost of living. The theory that deficit financing is compatible with a stable price structure is due for the test.....

The new excise tax bill totally eliminates a number of these levies--such as the World War II and Korean War "nuisance taxes"--and substantially reduces others. This, it is hoped, will lead to an increase in consumer spending and a shot in the arm for the economy generally. Another hope is that the losses to the Treasury will be offset by increases in individual and corporate taxes resulting from stimulated business.

Further, Administration spokesmen have been saying that still more tax cuts are in the offing though no date has been mentioned. And Congress is undoubtedly in a tax-cutting mood these days.

All of this comes under the heading of welcome news. At the same time, there are a number of "ifs", "ands", and "buts" involved. There are factors which cannot yet be measured, and whose influence may prove to be vitally important. David Lawrence dealt with some of them in one of his recent columns, and raised questions which must ultimately be answered.

For one thing, as he pointed out, "...the states are beginning to take advantage of the situation to increase their own taxes so as to get some of the money that isn't going to be collected by the U.S. Treasury." In the next five years, state taxes may increase by a whopping 79 per cent. That will happen if the present trend continues. During this legislative year, there have been substantial tax increases in a number of the states. Sales taxes have been upped, as have income taxes, and special levies such as those on cigarettes.

Along with this, Mr. Lawrence then observed it looks as if federal spending is just about certain to materially increase, particularly if there is any slow down in business activity. And in his view, "The gamble for continuing prosperity, while ignoring treasury deficits, cannot go indefinitely." No one really knows if the tax cuts will be offset by higher revenues from the income taxes. That is still in the category of hope, and only time can tell if it is justified or not.

What concerns Mr. Lawrence, and many others, is that if the hope is not realized there may be a loss of confidence in the dollars, followed by more inflation. He recognizes that government officials are certain that the means exist to prevent inflation on a serious scale, but as he puts it, "Inflation...is often a matter of mass psychology." The anti-inflation weapons that would be brought into play might work. On the other hand, they might not.....

Mr. Lawrence concluded his piece with these words: "it remains to be seen whether the increases in the state taxes and other burdens on the national economy will demolish the Administration's optimistic theory that prosperity can be achieved by more and more government spending and more and more borrowing to meet annual deficits." This, clearly, is one of the great unanswered questions of the time. It is certainly evident that the tax cuts, already made or pending, will be of little or no value if they are offset by increased taxes of other kinds, or by a higher cost of living. The theory that deficit financing is compatible with a stable price structure is due for the test.....
