

The Tribune reports: Speedwell Chapel United Methodist Church was notified by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that its proposal to build a federallyfunded \$2.4 million low and moderate income apartment

complex was approved. According to Rev. Linton H. Powell, pastor of Speedwell Chapel United Methodist Church, the development will consist of 100 units, including two-story townhouses, on 12 acres on Central Avenue, near Memorial

Speedwell Chapel is located at 7259 Skidaway Road. The apartments "will be financed at least 20 per cent by HUD," Powell said, and seed money for the project will come from National

Housing Partnerships. Consulting Developer Merilous J. Sims said that the apartments are the "first Section 8 apartments to be approved in Savannah under

sidies to families qualifying

for the program. The program, which Sims described as "very new," allows qualifying families to rent apartments paying 20 per cent of their adjusted monthly income for rent.

Sims said that HUD started receiving applications for Section 8 projects last January, and that the Speedwell project was selected from eight or nine proposed projects for this area.

Powell added that the norprofit housing project, to be known as Speedwell Apartments, Inc., will be operated by a board of directors, of which he is chairman.

Sims said that each twostory townhouse unit will house one family, and that units for the elderly and the handicapped will be specially designed. These units will have oversized doors and

bathrooms, ramps and "grab rails."

The development is intended "to try to introduce an economical mix," Sims said. "That's why it's moderate and low inco.ne."

In addition to the 100 units, 22 of which will be designated for elderly or handicapped occupants, Speedwell apartments will include a community building with meeting room, laundry, office maintenance and storage facilities, Sims said. HUD has set aside \$333,792 in rent supplements for the Speedwell Project.

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

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

Leadership And Vision Ever since the First Administration of Franklin Roosevelt, Americans have followed closely the accivity of presidents during their "first hundred days" in office. Few expect social problems to be solved in such a short period or time; nevertheless, new presidents are expected to offer fresh perspectives, articulate new goals, and advance bold proposals. Citizens correctly view the presidency as the engine of government.

The extent to which presidents identify early the most pressing issues, set forth priorities for dealing with them, and focus a sense of national resolve on them is often the key to change. At any given time a great many issues trouble citizens and beg for official notice. Great presidents are those who tackle the big issues first.

In the early summer of 1977 Americans were concerned most about the state of the economy, the critically high levels of unemployment and inflation that have persisted for several years.

Unemployment and Inflation When President Carter took office in January, unemployment stood at the highest level since the 1930s and inflation was the highest in one hundred years. This was the legacy of the previous Administration that sought to control inflation by dampening economic activity, regardless of how many people were thrown out of

The unemployment rate in the Fall of 1977 was still twice the rate in 1969 and two percentage points higher than the average rate from 1946 to 1975. It is estimated there are several million others who have given up looking for work or else who work less then fulltime involuntarily. Minorities and the young remain worst off, experiencing unemployment twice to four times the national average. The jobless rate among black teer agers in inner cities is 40% or more.

The rate of inflation has risen again in the first few months of the year, which if price trends continue, would amount to an annual race of more than 10%. The cost of basic necessities-food, housing, health care, and energy-is skyrocketing. One household in five is deprived of a decent housing unit ut an effordable price. The cost of health care has increased 1000% since 1950; the average hospital bed per day now costs \$175.

Next year the Pentagon will have nearly \$120 billion to spend. Not only does weapons spending eliminate money for social programs; it creates fewer jobs than other types of investments. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, \$1 billion in weapons purchases in 1970 generated only 76% as many obs as an equivalent amount spent on housing construction. It is estimated a single B-1 bomber will cost at least \$110 million. That is equiva-



**FUZZY EDUCATION POLICY** 

Our nation's black colleges graduated this year approximately one-half of all of the black graduates from all colleges throughout the nation. Some 86 or 87 per cent of

all black students who enter traditionally white colleges flunked out, are pushed out or simply drop out. Plans initiated by reveral

private foundations call for the elimination of all but five black colleges in the country Presently there are nearly 50 private black colleges; the five surviving black colleges would be from among that number.

There are nearly 70 public

ly supported but treditionally black-oriented colleges. Some of these are now being integrated, with increasing numbers of white students, white faculty and white administrators. Other publicly supported black colleges are being merged into statewide systems with one central administration and with past local dentities being obliterated. in the overall trend to diminish the role of black colleges in the nation's higher education, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare is considering changes in eligibility requirements which would further reduce the inadequate money currently available to needy black students.

The same proposed cuts would have the added effect of sharply reducing the numhers of blacks on targety. white college campuses. This would represent much less of a hardship, since aid to black students on white campuses

has been estimated to be only about one-third as efficient as aid to similar students on black campuses. Further, most of the presi-

dents of the black colleges met last year with federal officials in Washington and pleaded for increased black participation in policy planning and development specifically as this related to presently beleaguered black students throughout the country. What the black college president ranght was to have a permanent system created for monitoring the progress of blacks in higher education, together with research and development in minority education.

The Ford administration expressed a deep desire to implement the plans of the black college presidents. But the practical result was that no initiatives were made to adupt the black college presidents' plans; and some of the programs which were providing some minor support to black colleges and their indigent students were eliminat-

The picture here could be detailed further in almost endless ways. It might be added, as an example of the tremendous depth of the problems involved, that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has sought in vain to have colleges admitting students who are non-traditional to their experience to either adjust their teaching approaches or to offer appropriate remedial or adjustment courses.

That not much has come

of these pleas by HEW is possible evidence of a lack of responsiveness on the part of the 'argely white colleges and universities. Or it may be an indication that HEW, with all of its power of the purse, has been only shadow boxing and has no serious intent to protect or enhance the educational opportunities of black and other minority students.

At any rate, the hottom line is that serious or substantial educational opportunity for the black and other mirority proportions of the American college age public is being grossly compro-Beyond this, for all of our

colleges and universities there. promises to be at least a precipitous 13 to 20 per cem reduction in overall errollments within a period of between five and seven years. Some colleges, in anticipation of sharp decreases in support, have developed half-hearted or often ill-conceived programs for the elderiy as one means of maintaining current levels of income. But even if this effort were successful, it would not compensate for anticipated
