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The Rise of the State NAACP in Texas

The organizers of the State nference of NAACP branch Conference of NAAC response to the first to espouse the NAACP's program of equal counts in Texas. In 1918, four rights in Texas. In 1918, four local branches sprang up to join the El Paso chapter established in 1915. The Great War gener-

the El Paso chapter established in 1915. The Great War generated a renewed racial awareness, leading more Blacks to confront discrimination. NAACP memberships nationwide soared from 10,000 in 1917 to almost 80,000 in 1919. In December 1918, national board member Mary B. Talbert toured Texas promoting Liberty Loans and organizing NAACP branches in nipe cities. By 1919 Texas had become the Association's leading state with 7,046 members and thirty-one branches.

Several events that year, however, revealed bow far the state actually was from harmonious race relations. In July a Longview mob burned Black homes and businesses and beat a Negro teacher during "The Red Summer Riots". Soon afterward the state antonney general subpoenaed the Austin branch's records to scrutinize its right to conduct business in Texas. When NAACP National Secretary John Shillady learned of the impending challenge, he traveled to Austin to meet with the appropriate state officials. traveled to Austin to meet with the appropriate state officials. Shillady soon found himself an inwelcomed visitor and after austaining verbal abuse, a gang comprised in part of local officials brutally beat him. When the NAACP's Vice President protested this violent act. Gov. William Hobby blamed Shillady and recommended that the organization stay out of Texas.

By 1920, Texas lead the nation in lynchings and amid this atmosphere of fear, many of the state's branches discontin-

As they revived the five langual branches of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, they built a statewide organization, the Texas State Conference of Branches Through this structure they mobilized local branches and coordinated their programs with the policies and strategies of the NAACP's national office in New York. They also planned and initiated lawsuits against racial discrimination in the areas of voting rights, jury service. of voting rights, jury service, employment, housing, educa-tion, and public accommoda-

One man whose vision of a statewide NAACP organization was especially influential. Antonio Maceo Smith Not only was he instrumental in its development, but he also spearheaded its activities for two headed its activities for two decades. A gifted practitioner of the political arts of compromise and consensus, he combined the administrative talents of the bureaucrats with the promotion

bureaucrats with the promotional skills of an insurance executive Confident and charismatue, he was above all an organizer.

Born in Texarkana in 1903, Macco Smith was educated in Fisk University and New York University, where he received degrees in business. Returning to Texas in 1929 after the death of his father, Smith moved to Oklahoma City in 1932. In January of 1933, he came to Dallas to organize a life insurance company. Two Cases of Swine Flue Discovered In Texas

State Health Services has con-firmed two cases of swine influenza A in Guadalupe County near San Antonio Both confirmed cases experienced mild symptoms and neither was hountfalled. Both has research hospitalized. Both have recov-ered from the illness. This comes on the tail of five confirmed swine influenza A cases in Southern California Only in Southern California Only one required hospitalization and all have recovered. To date there have been no cases of swine influenza reported in Lubbock County.

Symptoms of swine flu in people are similar to those of regular or seasonal flu and include sudden onset of fever (101°F-c), severe fatigue or exhaustion, chills, severe

exhaustion, chills, severe coughing, and muscle aches Some swine flu victims have also reported other symptoms

such as runny nose, sore throat, nausea, diarrhea, and vorniting Public health officials from the City of Lubbock Health Department advise that the pub-Department advise that the pub-lic should take standard precauns against the flu in o reduce the spread of any resp tory illness including.



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
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NEW IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOOL Beginning August 1, 2009

Hepatitis A vaccine: All students entering kindergarten will be required to have 2 doses of Hepatitis A vaccine.

Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR) Vaccine: All students entering kindergarten will be required to unve 2 doses of MME vaccine.

Varicella Vaccine (Chickenpox): All students entering kindergarten <u>and</u> 7^m grade will be required to have 2 doses of MMR vaccine if they have not had the disease. If they have had the disease a writte statement is required with month and date and should be provided to the school.

Tetanus, Diphtherio, and acellular pertussis-containing vaccine (Tdap): All students entering 7th grade will be required to have one dose of Tdap vaccine if it has been five years since their last dose of tetanus-containing vaccine. Students in grades 8-12 are required to have a booster dose of Tdap if it has been ten years since their last dose of a tetanus-containing vaccine.
