

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

Absentee Voting Underway in Three Elections

Absentee voting for Springlake and Earth for city and the school board election began Monday and will continue through M. rch 28.

Absentee voting for Earth city elections can be done at the city hall any time during the office hours for the city, according to Mis. Bettye McAl-Pine.

Absentee voting for the school election can be done from 8:30 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. Mon day - Friday at the tax office at school.

Absentce voting for Springlake city elections can be done from 3 a.m. through 12 noon. Monday through Friday at the city secretary's office in Springlake.

A new voter registration law requires that each registered voter must present his voter registration card at the place where he is voting and the voter must sign a list of qualified voters exactly as he has signed h is voter registration card.

The law also states that a voter must live in the precinct six months and in the state one year before he can vote in an election.

Anyone who is not a bonafide resident of the precinct is not eligible to vote.





Chronic Drug Users?

The familiar claim that Americans have become chronic drug users does not appear to be valid, according to new research evidence.

A scientific study carried out by university, government, and psychiatric institute researchers challenges the claim and indicates that most Americans who do use psychotherapeutic drugs do not take them on a regular or long-term basis.

Instead, most people seem to be relatively conservative in their use both of prescription and over-the-counter psychotherapeutic drugs.

Unlike previous surveys based solely on drugstore records, data were obtained by interviewing a population cross-section of adults 18 and older, from whom the researchers drew a profile of usage patterns and reasons for drug use.
